AT the Council Chamber, *Whitehall*, the 20th Day of March, 1760,

P R E S E N T,

The Lords of His Majesty's most Honourable Privy Council.

WHEREAS the Time limited by His Majesty's Proclamation of the 15th of May last, "For giving Encouragement to Seamen and able bodied Landmen to enter themselves on board His Majesty's Ships of War; for granting Rewards for discovering such Seamen as shall conceal themselves; for pardoning such Seamen as have deserted and shall return into the Service; and also for taking up all straggling Seamen," hath been prolonged and extended to the 24th of this Instant March; — And whereas it is judged expedient for His Majesty's Service, that the same should be continued for some Time longer—It is therefore hereby ordered in Council, that the said Time be prolonged and extended from the aforesaid 24th Day of this Instant March, to the 10th Day of May next; and that the Bounties and Rewards given and granted by His Majesty's aforementioned Proclamation, be continued to be paid until the said 10th Day of May next. — Whereof all Persons concerned are to take Notice, and govern themselves accordingly.

*Copenhagen, March 1.* The King of Denmark, whose Health seems to have been rather mended by his late Illness, not only appears at the Apartments and Balls at Court, but has also began again, as usual, to accept of Entertainments in Town. His Danish

Majesty, from his particular Regard to the Princes of Hesse Cassel, has just given the Regiment of Falster (Infantry) to Prince Charles. At the same Time Prince Frederick received the Rank of Colonel in his Danish Majesty's Service, and will probably not be long without a Regiment. To-morrow this Court goes into a Mourning of three Weeks for the late Landgrave of Hesse Cassel.

*Copenhagen, March 8.* Christian Friderick Count Moltke, eldest Son of the Grand Marshal, is constituted Marshal of the Court. 'Tis said the King of Denmark intends this Summer to take a Turn again into Holstein, in order to view his Troops. The Time for his Departure is not yet fixed; but in all Probability it will not be till the Middle of June. Yesterday Morning the *Jutland*, of 70 Guns, the *Falster*, of 30, and the *Amack*, of 12, three new built Ships, were launched from the Royal Wharf.

*Lisbon, March 10.* On the 7th Instant, in the Evening, his Britannick Majesty's Ship the *Windfor*, having on board the Earl of Kinnoull, Ambassador Extraordinary and Plenipotentiary to this Court, anchored below the Castle of Belem; and the Honourable Mr. Hay, his Britannick Majesty's Envoy Extraordinary, and Sir Henry Frankland, Consul General, immediately went on board. The next Morning, being the Time appointed for his Excellency to go on Shore, three of his most Faithful Majesty's Barges came a long-fide of the *Windfor* to receive him and his Retinue. The Captains of the *Windfor*, and of three Frigates which were in the River Tagus, attended him in their Barges to the Shore, and the said Ships, as well as two Packet Boats, all saluted him, as did the Castle of Belem when he passed it. At his Excellency's Arrival at the Stairs above Belem, he was received by the Conde d'Avintes, who was nominated by the King of Portugal for that Purpose, and conducted by him, in one of the King's Coaches, preceded by two others, with his Retinue, to his House.

*Hague, March 11.* The French have made a Shew of attacking the Chain, in the Front of the Quarters of that Part of the Allied Army cantoned in the Country of Hesse, with a Body of Four or Five Thousand Men; but without any Success. It was on the 29th of last Month, that one Body came to Marburg, and took away two Hostages; they broke the Gates of the Town, but were forced to abandon it, by the Fire of the Castle, from whence some Hussars pursued them, and took several Prisoners. They appeared likewise before Hombourg, Alseldt,
