WAGES COUNCILS ACT (NORTHERN IRELAND), 1945

BRUSH AND BROOM WAGES COUNCIL (NORTHERN IRELAND)

The Brush and Broom Wages Council (Northern Ireland) hereby gives notice of its intention to submit to the Ministry of Labour and National Insurance proposals for the further amendment of the Brush and Broom Wages Council (Northern Ireland) Wages Regulation Order, 1948 (S.R. & O. 1948, No. 15).

Particulars of the proposals may be obtained from the Secretary of the Wages Council at the address given below.

The Wages Council will consider any written representations with respect to the above-mentioned proposals, which may be sent to it within twenty-one days from 9th November, 1951. Any such representation should be signed by the person making the same (adding his or her address) and sent to the Secretary, Brush and Broom Wages Council (Northern Ireland), Tyrone House, Ormeau Avenue, Belfast. It is desirable that persons making objections should state the precise grounds of their objections.

The Civil Service Commissioners for Northern Ireland hereby give notice of an Open Competition for the situation of Ordnance Survey Assistant Grade III to be held in Belfast under the Regulations published in the "Belfast Gazette" on the 5th June, 1948, and amended as follows:—

"3. Nationality.

Candidates must be natural-born or naturalized British subjects. They must also:—

- (a) have been born in Northern Ireland; or
- (b) have been ordinarily resident

- (i) in the United Kingdom since the 3rd September, 1939; or
- (ii) in Northern Ireland, either immediately prior to the 1st January, 1940, or for at least ten out of any period of twenty consecutive years ending on or after the 23rd December, 1947; or
- (c) be children of a parent or parents born in Northern Ireland and have been resident in Northern Ireland on the 23rd December, 1947.

For the purposes of (b) any period of absence from Northern Ireland or other part of the United Kingdom on National Service, whether in H.M. Forces or otherwise, will be disregarded.

Candidates may be exempted from complying with the above requirements as to nationality and/or residence in exceptional circumstances and where the Commissioners are satisfied that it is in the interests of the public service to grant such an exemption.

"5. Examination.

The Competition consists of:-

PART I—Written papers in the following subjects with maximum marks as indicated:—

Maximum Marks

1. English I (Essay) 100
2. English II (Language) 150
3. Handwriting 50
4. Drawing 150
5. Arithmetic 100
6. Elementary Mathematics ... 150
7. General Knowledge 100
Those candidates who from the statements in their application forms appear to be eligible will be invited to undergo the written examination."

No person will be admitted to the Competition from whom the Secretary of the Civil Service has not received, on or before the 11th December, 1951, an application in the candidate's handwriting on the prescribed form which may be obtained from the Secretary, Civil Service Commission, Stormont, Belfast.
