MARKETING OF MILK PRODUCTS ACT (NORTHERN IRELAND), 1958

Order dated 31st December, 1958, made by the Minister of Agriculture under sub-section (2) of Section Eighteen of the Marketing of Milk Products Act (Northern Ireland), 1958.

WHEREAS by subsection (2) of Section Eighteen of the Marketing of Milk Products Act (Northern Ireland), 1958 (hereinafter referred to as "The Act") it is provided that the Act shall come into operation on such day or days as the Minister of Agriculture shall by order appoint.

Now, therefore, I, the Rev. the Rt. Honourable Robert Moore, Minister of Agriculture, hereby appoint the first day of January, 1959, to be the date on which the Act shall come into operation.

MINISTRY OF COMMERCE FOR NORTHERN IRELAND

SYDENHAM BY-PASS ROAD

In accordance with the provisions of the First Schedule to the Roads Act (Northern Ireland), 1948, the Ministry of Commerce hereby gives notice that it proposes to make an Order under Section 17 of the Act which will authorise the Belfast County Borough Council to take the following steps rendered necessary by the construction of the Sydenham By-Pass Road:—

1. To abandon portions of Foundry Street, O'Kane's Lane, Clonallon Street, Harland Street and the back streets at the rear of Ardilaun Street and Fraser Street.
2. To stop-up to vehicular traffic the junctions between Middlepath Street and Newtownards Road and between Foundry Street and Newtownards Road, and
3. To stop-up wholly Foundry Street, O'Kane's Lane, Clonallon Street, Harland Street and the back streets at the rear of Ardilaun Street and Fraser Street at the points where they will meet the By-Pass Road.

The aforementioned works are delineated on a map, a copy of which, together with a copy of the draft Order, may be inspected by any person free of charge at all reasonable hours during a period of 40 days from the 8th day of January, 1959, at the offices of the Ministry of Commerce, Chichester House, Chichester Street, Belfast, or of the Belfast County Borough Council, City Hall, Belfast.

Any person may within the said period of forty days object to the making of the Order by written notice to the Ministry.

POISONS

The Minister of Home Affairs has made the Poisons (Amending) (No. 2) Regulations (Northern Ireland), 1958, which impose appropriate restrictions and requirements regarding the new substances now added to the Poisons Schedule.

Restrictions have been made upon the sale of monofluoroacetic acid and its salts, similar to the restrictions already placed upon the sale of strychnine; provision is made for its sale to certain persons for use as a rodenticide on production of a prescribed certificate. Special restrictions are imposed on fluoroacetamide and fluoroacetanilide but relaxation is given for preparations for agriculture, horticulture or the destruction of rats and mice.

Under the Pharmacy and Poisons Act (Northern Ireland) and the Poison Regulations (Northern Ireland), 1956, the container in which a poison is sold

is required to be labelled with the name of the poison, and for this purpose names given in the British Pharmacopoeia, the British Pharmaceutical Codex or the National Formulary are permissible. These Regulations now place the British Veterinary Codex in the same position. The change of name of the national Formulary to the British National Formulary has been recognised.

These Regulations come into operation on 1st February, 1959, and bring the Northern Ireland Poison Law generally into line with that in Great Britain.
