BY THE GOVERNOR AND PRIVY COUNCIL OF NORTHERN IRELAND.

ABERCORN.

EDUCATION ACT  
(NORTHERN IRELAND), 1923.

WHEREAS it is provided by section seventy-nine of the Education Act (Northern Ireland), 1923, (in this Order referred to as "the Act"), that the Governor of Northern Ireland may by Order in Council apply as respects teachers in agricultural subjects any of the provisions of the Act respecting:—

- (a) the training and certification of teachers;
- (b) the terms of employment of teachers;
- (c) the remuneration of teachers;
- (d) the superannuation of teachers; and
- (e) the making of regulations for the purpose of giving effect to the provisions of the Act applied as hereinbefore mentioned;

and that upon the coming into effect of any such Order in Council the said provisions shall apply accordingly, subject to such modifications as may be made by the Order in Council, for the purpose of making the said provisions so applicable:

Now I, James Albert Edward, Duke of Abercorn, Governor of Northern Ireland, by and with the advice of the Privy Council of Northern Ireland, do hereby order as follows:—

1. The provisions of sections seventy and seventy-one of the Act are hereby applied as respects teachers in agricultural subjects, with the following modifications:—

- (a) The Ministry of Finance for Northern Ireland shall frame the superannuation scheme to which the said sections relate

in consultation with the Ministry of Agriculture for Northern Ireland, and may, if the Ministry of Education for Northern Ireland consents, frame the scheme so as to form part of a scheme framed under the said sections for application to a class of teachers other than teachers in agricultural subjects;

- (b) Sub-section (3) of the said section seventy shall not apply.
2. The provisions of the Act which are set out in the Schedule to this Order (in this Order and in the said Schedule referred to as "the scheduled provisions") are hereby applied as respects teachers in agricultural subjects with the modifications appearing in the scheduled provisions.

3. In the scheduled provisions—

The expression "teachers" means teachers (by whatever title designated) in agricultural subjects:

The expression "committee of agriculture" means a committee appointed under section fourteen of the Agriculture and Technical Instruction (Ireland) Act, 1899, by the council of any county for the purposes of agriculture and other rural industries, and includes—

- (a) a joint committee appointed under that section by any two or more public bodies for those purposes; and
- (b) to the extent to which any powers exercisable under the scheduled provisions remain vested in the county council or public body appointing or represented on any such committee, that county council or public body:

The expression "agricultural institution" means the North West Agricultural School,

Strabane, the Ulster Dairy School, Cookstown, and any similar agricultural institution which may be established and managed by the Ministry of Agriculture for Northern Ireland.

#### SCHEDULE.

#### PROVISIONS OF THE ACT REFERRED TO IN ARTICLE 2 OF THIS ORDER.

##### *Training and certification of teachers.*

65. It shall be the duty of the Ministry of Agriculture to make regulations as to the training and certification of teachers for schools or schemes to or in respect of which grants may be made by that Ministry out of moneys provided by Parliament, and teachers for agricultural institutions.

##### *Appointment of teachers.*

66. Every teacher appointed by a committee of agriculture in connection with a school or scheme to or in respect of which grants are made out of moneys provided by Parliament, or appointed by the Ministry of Agriculture to teach at an agricultural institution, shall have such qualifications as may be approved by that Ministry.

##### *Terms of employment by committees of agriculture.*

67. The terms upon which a teacher is employed by a committee of agriculture shall be set forth in the agreement entered into between the teacher and the committee, and such agreement shall be in such form as may be approved by the Ministry of Agriculture.

##### *Procedure on dismissal of teacher.*

68. If, at any time within six weeks after a teacher employed by a committee of agriculture in connection with a school or scheme to or in respect of which grants are made out of moneys provided by Parliament has been notified of dismissal from the employment of the committee, a petition is presented to the Ministry of Agriculture by the teacher praying for an inquiry into the reasons for his dismissal, that Ministry shall cause to be made such inquiry as it thinks fit; and if, as the result of such inquiry (at which the teacher may be represented) the Ministry of Agriculture is of opinion that the dismissal is not reasonably justifiable, that Ministry shall communicate such opinion to the committee of agriculture and to the teacher, with a view to reconsideration of the decision, and, in the event of the committee of agriculture not departing from their decision the Ministry of Agriculture may withhold or reduce any grant payable to or in respect of the school or scheme out of moneys provided by Parliament, but the teacher affected may be paid a salary for a period not exceeding twelve months:

Provided that nothing in this section shall effect the power of a committee of agriculture summarily to suspend any teacher from the performance of duty.

##### *Salary scales for teachers.*

69. It shall be the duty of the Ministry of Agriculture, after consultation with the Ministry of Finance, to frame, and from time to time as occasion requires to alter, minimum scales of salaries for the various classes of teachers employed by committees of agriculture in connection with schools or schemes to or in respect of which grants are made out of moneys provided by Parliament, and teachers employed at agricultural institutions; and the Ministry may by regulations require, as a condition for the payment of such grants, that the teachers shall be remunerated at rates not lower than those specified in such minimum scales. The decision of the Ministry, if any question arises as

to the eligibility of a teacher to be placed upon a scale, or as to the amount payable in accordance with a scale, shall be final.

##### *Regulations of Ministry of Agriculture.*

99. (1) The Ministry of Agriculture may make all such regulations as are required to be made by it under the scheduled provisions, or as appear to that Ministry to be necessary or proper for giving full effect to the scheduled provisions, or for adapting the provisions of any enactment (including any local Act) or Order of the Lord Lieutenant in Council in such manner as may appear to the Ministry of Agriculture to be necessary in order to bring such last-mentioned provisions into conformity with the scheduled provisions; and any such regulation shall, except as hereinafter in this section provided, have effect as if enacted in the Act, but may be varied or revoked by a subsequent regulation.

(3) Regulations made by the Ministry of Agriculture shall be laid before both Houses of Parliament as soon as may be after they are made, and, if an address is presented to the Governor of Northern Ireland by either of those Houses within ten days on which that House has sat next after any such regulations are laid before it, praying that the regulations may be annulled, the said Governor may thereupon by Order in Council annul the same, and the regulations so annulled shall forthwith become void, but without prejudice to the validity of anything which in the meantime may have been done thereunder.

##### *Definitions.*

108. In the scheduled provisions the expressions "Ministry of Finance" and "Ministry of Agriculture" mean respectively the Ministry of Finance for Northern Ireland and the Ministry of Agriculture for Northern Ireland.

#### RULES OF THE SUPREME COURT (NORTHERN IRELAND).

WHEREAS by Section 61 of the Supreme Court of Judicature (Ireland) Act, 1877, as amended by Section 12 of the Supreme Court of Judicature (Ireland) (No. 2) Act, 1897, as those enactments apply to the Supreme Court of Judicature in Northern Ireland under and subject to the provisions of the Government of Ireland Act, 1920, the Irish Free State (Consequential Provisions) Act, 1922, the Supreme Court of Judicature (Northern Ireland) Order, 1921, and any other Order made by His Majesty in Council under either of the two last-mentioned Acts, it is provided that upon the recommendation and with the concurrence of a majority of all the judges of the said Supreme Court of Judicature for the time being (of which the Lord Chief Justice of Northern Ireland shall be one) and one Barrister and one Solicitor (respectively practising in Northern Ireland), to be appointed for the purpose by the said Lord Chief Justice, by writing under his hand, for such time as may be specified by him, the Governor of Northern Ireland may, by Order in Council, make Rules of Court, and alter and annul any Rules of Court made under the enactments hereinbefore mentioned and for the time being in force in Northern Ireland:

And whereas certain Rules of Court entitled "The Rules of the Supreme Court (Ireland), 1905," are in force in Northern Ireland, under and subject to the provisions aforesaid and as altered from time to time by the Lord Lieutenant and the said Governor by Orders in Council:

And whereas on the twelfth day of January, 1925, a majority of all the Judges of the said Supreme Court of Judicature and the other persons upon whose recommendation the said Governor may make, alter or annul Rules of Court as respects Northern Ireland, present at a meeting for that purpose held (of which majority the Lord Chief Justice of Northern Ireland was one) have passed the resolution set out in the Schedule hereto for the making of certain further Rules of Court :

And whereas it is provided in effect by Section one of the Rules Publication Act, 1893, in its application to the said Supreme Court of Judicature, that at least forty days before making any Rules of that Court as Statutory Rules notice of the proposal to make the said Rules, and of the place where copies of the draft Rules may be obtained, shall be published in the Belfast Gazette :

And whereas under the provisions of the said Rules Publication Act, 1893, notice was given in the Belfast Gazette of the 6th day of March, 1925, of the proposal to make the Rules of Court for which the aforesaid resolution was passed, and of the place where copies of the draft Rules might be obtained ; and all times have elapsed which are necessary for the making of the same as Statutory Rules.

Now I, James Albert Edward, Duke of Abercorn Governor of Northern Ireland, by and with the advice of the Privy Council of Northern Ireland, in pursuance and by virtue of the Supreme Court of Judicature (Ireland) Act, 1877, as amended and applied to the said Supreme Court of Judicature as hereinbefore mentioned, and of all other powers enabling me in this behalf, and with the concurrence of a majority of all the Judges and the other persons hereinbefore mentioned and present at the meeting aforesaid, do order and declare that the Rules of Court set forth in the Schedule hereto shall, on and from the 30th day of May, 1925, take effect and be in force as Statutory Rules of Court.

#### SCHEDULE.

We, being a majority of the Judges of the Supreme Court of Judicature of Northern Ireland and the other persons, pursuant to the twelfth Section of the Supreme Court of Judicature (Ireland) (No. 2) Act, 1897 (as adapted by Order in Council, dated 21st day of November, 1921, made under the provisions of the Government of Ireland Act, 1920, which said latter Act was subsequently modified by the Irish Free State (Consequential Provisions) Act, 1922) upon whose recommendation the Governor of Northern Ireland may make, alter or annul Rules of Court, under the sixty-first Section of the Supreme Court of Judicature Act (Ireland), 1877, present at a meeting for that purpose held (of which majority the Lord Chief Justice of Northern Ireland is one) do, pursuant to the powers conferred on Us by the Government of Ireland Act, 1920, and the adaptation of the Judicature (Ireland) Acts, 1877 to 1897, made by said Order in Council, and of all other powers Us thereunto enabling, hereby express Our concurrence in an Order being made by the

Governor of Northern Ireland in Council, annulling Rules 4 and 5 of Order LXIV. of the Rules of the Supreme Court (Ireland), 1905, and making as Statutory Rules under the Rules Publication Act, 1893, in substitution therefor, the Rules of Court hereinafter expressed and set forth.

#### ORDER LXIV.

4. No pleadings shall be amended or delivered between the 2nd day of August and 30th day of September, both days included, unless directed by a Court or a Judge.

5. The period from the 2nd day of August to 30th day of September, both days included, shall not be reckoned in the computation of the times appointed by rules for filing, amending or delivering any pleading unless otherwise directed by the Court or a Judge.

#### STAMP DUTIES.

WHEREAS Section 12 (2) of the Finance Act, 1899, provides *inter alia* that His Majesty's Commissioners of Inland Revenue may substitute, as respects any foreign or colonial currency mentioned in the Schedule to that Act, any rate of exchange for that specified in the Schedule and may add to the Schedule a rate of exchange for any foreign or colonial currency not mentioned therein, and that such Act shall be construed as if any rate of exchange for the time being substituted or added were contained in the said Schedule, and in the case of the substitution of the rate of exchange as if the rate for which the new rate is substituted were omitted from that Schedule. And whereas by notices duly advertised, pursuant to the said Section in the month of August, 1920, the said Commissioners substituted certain rates of exchange for those specified in the said Schedule. And whereas under the Government of Ireland Act, 1920, and the Orders in Council made pursuant thereto the powers of the Commissioners of Inland Revenue in relation to Taxes which the Parliament of Northern Ireland have power to impose are transferred to the Ministry of Finance for Northern Ireland. And whereas by notices duly advertised pursuant to the said Section in the months of July and August, 1923, April, 1924, and May, 1925, the said Ministry substituted certain rates of exchange for those specified in the said Schedule. Now the said Ministry hereby gives notice that they substitute the following rate of exchange for that specified in the Schedule to the Finance Act, 1899, as varied by the above-mentioned notices now in force under the said Act.
