BY THE GOVERNOR OF NORTHERN IRELAND.

A B E R C O R N .

WHEREAS by Section 17 of the Criminal Justice Administration Act, 1914, as modified by Section 43 of the said Act, it is amongst other things provided that the Lord Lieutenant may from time to time by any general or special rule under the Prisons (Ireland) Acts, 1826 to 1907, appropriate either wholly or partially, particular prisons within his jurisdiction to particular classes of prisoners, and that a prisoner sentenced to imprisonment or committed to prison on remand or pending trial or otherwise may be lawfully confined in any prison to which the Prisons (Ireland) Acts, 1826 to 1907, apply, and it is thereby further provided that prisoners shall be committed to such prisons as the Lord Lieutenant may from time to time direct, and may on the like direction be removed therefrom during the term of their imprisonment to any other prison :

And whereas various rules and orders have from time to time been made with respect to the committal of prisoners :

And whereas by the Government of Ireland Act, 1920, the Orders made thereunder, and the Irish Free State (Consequential Provisions) Act, 1922, the aforesaid powers of the Lord Lieutenant are

now exercisable in Northern Ireland by the Governor of Northern Ireland :

And whereas it is desirable to amend and consolidate the various rules and orders so made :

Now I, the Governor of Northern Ireland, in pursuance of the powers conferred upon me by the said Acts, and of every other power enabling me in this behalf, do hereby order and direct that from and after the 30th day of September, 1925, the various rules and orders set forth in the 4th Schedule hereto with respect to the committal of prisoners to Prisons in Northern Ireland shall be, and the same are hereby revoked, and that from and after the 30th day of September, 1925, prisoners shall be committed as follows, namely :—

Male persons committed for trial at, or committed from, Assizes, Commissions, and Quarter Sessions, held in and for the counties and county boroughs named in the First Schedule attached hereto shall be committed to the prisons named in the said First Schedule opposite the names of such counties and county boroughs, respectively, as therein set forth.

Male persons remanded or sentenced to imprisonment, by a magistrate or magistrates, at Petty Sessions or otherwise, from the counties and county boroughs mentioned in the Second Schedule attached hereto shall be committed to the prisons named in the said Second Schedule opposite the names of such counties and county boroughs, respectively, as therein set forth.

Male persons who may lawfully be committed to an ordinary prison in Northern Ireland, and who are committed otherwise than as described in the foregoing paragraphs and in the First and Second Schedules referred to therein, shall be committed to the prisons named in the Third Schedule attached hereto, as therein set forth.

All female persons committed for trial or committed, remanded, or sentenced to imprisonment

or otherwise committed, as in any of the three last foregoing paragraphs mentioned, shall be committed to Armagh Prison.

Provided that where the arrest of a person for whose committal to prison a warrant has been issued takes place in any other county than that in which the warrant has been issued, such person may be committed to any one of the prisons to which he might have been committed if the warrant had been issued in the district where the arrest takes place, even though this prison may not be the prison named in the warrant:

And I do hereby further order and direct that in cases where, owing to distance or the absence of facilities for conveyance, a prisoner cannot be directly conveyed to one or other of the prisons to which it is directed in this order that he be committed, the Court in any such case may, by an order endorsed on the warrant of committal, commit such prisoner in the first instance to the most convenient ordinary prison, with a direction that he be transmitted from it to the prison named in the body of the warrant of committal.

And I do hereby further order and direct that in the event of the formation of a new Petty Sessions District the various classes of prisoners committed therefrom may be committed to any of the prisons to which the same classes of prisoners may be committed respectively from the petty Sessions Districts from which the new district is formed.

This Order shall not affect the validity of any act done under the Orders which are hereby revoked prior to the date of this Order.

TRADE BOARDS ACT (NORTHERN
IRELAND), 1923.DRESSMAKING AND WOMEN'S LIGHT
CLOTHING TRADE BOARD
(NORTHERN IRELAND).

The Trade Board established by the Ministry of Labour for Northern Ireland under the powers conferred on it by the Trade Boards Act (Northern Ireland), 1923, for the Dressmaking and Women's Light Clothing Trade in Northern Ireland, as defined in the Schedule to the Trade Boards (Dressmaking and Women's Light Clothing Trade, Northern Ireland) (Constitution, Proceedings and Meetings) Regulations, 1925, dated 20th May, 1925, having, as required by Regulations made by the Ministry of Labour under Section 24 of the Trade Boards Act (Northern Ireland), 1923, dated 25th April, 1924, given due notice on the Sixteenth day of July, 1925, of proposal to vary minimum rates of wages for female workers employed in the Retail Bespoke Dressmaking Branch of the said trade.

The Trade Board have further given notice that they have received notification that an Order was made by the Ministry of Labour for Northern Ireland on the Fourteenth day of August, 1925, confirming the minimum rates of wages as varied by the Trade Board as aforesaid, and specifying the Seventh day of September, 1925, as the date from which they shall become effective.

On request to the Trade Board, particulars of the minimum rates of wages above referred to and information as to their application will be given if, in the opinion of the Trade Board the applicant is likely to be affected thereby.

Investing Council with Urban
Powers for lighting Finaghy
and determining area of
charge.

THE MINISTRY OF HOME AFFAIRS FOR
NORTHERN IRELAND.

RURAL DISTRICT OF LISBURN.

To the Council of the Administrative County of Antrim; to the Rural District Council of the Rural District of Lisburn; and to all others whom it may concern:

WHEREAS by Section 1 of the Public Health (Ireland) Act, 1896, as adapted, it is enacted in

effect that the Ministry of Home Affairs for Northern Ireland, hereinafter referred to as the Ministry, may, on the application of the sanitary authority of any rural district, by order to be published in the "Belfast Gazette," or in such other manner as the said Ministry may direct, declare any provisions of the Public Health (Ireland) Act, 1878 to 1890, in force in Urban Districts to be in force in such Rural District or any contributory place therein, and may invest such authority with all or any of the powers, rights, duties, capacities, liabilities, and obligations of an Urban Authority under these Acts; and that such investment may be made either unconditionally or subject to any conditions to be specified by the Ministry as to the time, portion of the district, or manner, during, at, and in which such powers, rights, duties, liabilities, capacities and obligations are to be exercised and attach:

And whereas it is enacted by Section 22 of the Local Government (Ireland) Act, 1898, that all Urban Sanitary Authorities shall be called Urban District Councils, and that for every Rural Sanitary District there shall be a Rural District Council whose district shall be called a Rural District:

And whereas it is enacted by sub-section (1) of Section 33 of the said Local Government Act that there shall be transferred to the District Council of any Rural District the business of the Rural Sanitary Authority in the District:

And whereas it is enacted in effect by Section 232 of the Public Health (Ireland) Act, 1878, as adapted, that special expenses (as defined in the said Section 232) shall be (amongst others) the expenses of lighting where duly authorised; that special expenses shall be a separate charge on some contributory place or places; that a townland is a contributory place; that the Ministry of Home Affairs for Northern Ireland shall have power to determine on what area of charge, being a contributory place or consisting of contributory places, any special expenses shall be chargeable:

And whereas the Council of the Rural District of Lisburn (hereinafter referred to as the Council) have made application to the Ministry under the said Section 1 of the Public Health (Ireland) Act, 1896, for an Order declaring the provisions of Section 80 of the said Public Health (Ireland) Act, 1878, in force in Urban Districts to be in force in the said Rural District:

Now, therefore, the Ministry of Home Affairs for Northern Ireland, in exercise of the powers vested in them by the Public Health (Ireland) Acts, 1878 to 1907, as adapted, and by all other statutes in this behalf enabling them, hereby order, declare and determine as follows, that is to say:—

1. The provisions of Section 80 of the Public Health (Ireland) Act, 1878, are declared to be in force within the area consisting of the Townland of Ballyfinaghy, in the Rural District of Lisburn; and subject to any conditions which the Ministry may hereafter deem fit to specify in the matter and to the provisions as to rating in Rural Districts of the Local Government (Ireland) Acts, 1898 to 1902, the Council is hereby invested with all the powers, rights, duties, capacities, liabilities, and obligations of an Urban District Council under Section 80 of the Public Health (Ireland) Act, 1878, to be exercised and attach within the said limits or boundaries of the aforesaid area.

2. The Townland of Ballyfinaghy is hereby determined to be the area of charge upon which all expenses incurred by the Council in carrying out the provisions of Section 80 of the said Public

Health (Ireland) Act, 1878, within the said limits or boundaries shall be chargeable.
