## BY THE GOVERNOR OF NORTHERN IRELAND.

#### ABERCORN.

WHEREAS by Section 29, Sub-section 2, of the Widows', Orphans' and Old Age Contributory Pensions Act (Northern Ireland), 1925, it is provided that an Umpire may be appointed by the Governor of Northern Ireland for the purposes of that Act:

And whereas it is desirable than an Umpire should be appointed for Northern Ireland:

Now, therefore, I James Albert Edward, Duke of Abercorn, Governor of Northern Ireland, in exercise of the powers vested in me by that Act, do hereby appoint John Edmond Warnock, Esquire, Barrister-at-Law, to be Umpire for the purposes of the said Act, for one year from this date.

#### EXPLOSIVES ACT, 1875.

In virtue of the power conferred on me by Section 53 of the Explosives Act, 1875, and of every other power enabling me in this behalf, I, the Right Honourable Sir Richard Dawson Bates, being the Minister of Home Affairs for Northern Ireland, hereby appoint Sergeant Francis McAree (No. 1627), of the Royal Ulster Constabulary, as an Inspector for Northern Ireland under the said Act, and do hereby direct him to exercise only such

powers and to perform such duties under the said Act as I shall from time to time assign to him.
