Notice is hereby given that the Department of Health and Social Services in exercise of the powers conferred on it by sections 4, 7, 68 and 68A of the Food and Drugs Act (Northern Ireland) 1958 has made regulations entitled: "Honey Regulations (Northern Ireland) 1976" (S.R. 1976 No. 387).

These regulations, which implement Council Directive 74/409/E.E.C. on the harmonisation of the laws of Member States on honey,

- (a) define and lay down compositional requirements for the various types of honey;
- (b) reserve the word 'honey'; and certain expressions containing that word, for honey and the types of honey as defined by the regulations;
- (c) require the name 'honey' amplified in certain cases by specified qualifications to be applied to the product when traded;
- (d) specify how honey is to be labelled;
- (e) make consequential amendments to the labelling of Food Regulations (Northern Ireland) 1970 (S.R. & O. (N.I.) 1970 No. 80), as amended.

The regulations will come into force on 1st May, 1977, except for regulations 2 and 13 which come into force on 14th February, 1977, to enable products which comply with the remainder of the regulations to be sold from that date.

REDEMPTION AND CONVERSION OF 7% ULSTER DEVELOPMENT BONDS (SECOND CONVERSION ISSUE)

The Department of Finance gives notice, that 7% Ulster Development Bonds (Second Conversion Issue) dated 1st January, 1972, will be repayable, upon application by the holders, at the rate of £103.00 for each £100.00 of Bonds on the maturity date, viz 1st June, 1977, unless the holders accept an offer of conversion into 8½% Ulster Development Bonds (Second Conversion Issue), which security has been created by an Order dated 15th June, 1976, made by the Department of Finance under Section II of the Exchequer and Financial Provisions Act (Northern Ireland) 1950. Holders of Bonds concerned will be invited to exchange their holdings, in whole or in part, in multiples of £5, into 8½% Ulster Development Bonds (Second Conversion Issue) on 1st June, 1977, at the rate of £5 of such Bonds for each £5 of Bonds tendered for exchange.

Holders of maturing Bonds who decide not to accept the conversion offer should apply for repayment. No interest will be payable on the Bonds after they mature on 1st June, 1977, and they can only be repaid upon application by the holders.
