THE ROADS IMPROVEMENT (ADAPTA- TION OF ENACTMENTS) REGULA- TIONS, 1928.

NOTICE is hereby given that the Ministry of Home Affairs has made Regulations on the 7th day of December, 1928, under the Roads Improvement Act (Northern Ireland), 1928, entitled the Roads Improvement (Adaptation of Enactments) Regulations, 1928 (S.R. and O., 1928, No. 126), adapting the Second Schedule to the Housing of the Working Classes Act, 1890, for the purpose of making it conform with the Schedule to the Roads Improvement Act (N.I.), 1928.

MERCHANDISE MARKS ACT, 1926. IMPORTED TOMATOES.

It is announced that an application for an Order in Council under the above-mentioned Act to require the marking of imported tomatoes in their fresh or raw state with an indication of origin has been referred for inquiry to the Standing Committee set up under the Act by the Minister of Agriculture and Fisheries, the Secretary of State for the Home Department and the Secretary of State for Scotland, acting jointly.

Attention is called to the fact that, under the provisions of the Act, while the Committee, in every case referred to them, must consider whether the goods should bear the indication of origin at the time of sale or exposure for sale, they may also, at their discretion, consider and report upon the question whether such goods should bear an indication of origin at the time of importation.

The date of the Inquiry will be announced later.
