### CONSTABULARY (NORTHERN IRELAND).

#### REGULATIONS MADE BY THE MINISTER OF HOME AFFAIRS FOR NORTHERN IRELAND WITH RESPECT TO THE APPOINTMENT AND POSITION OF SPECIAL CONSTABLES.

WHEREAS by the Special Constables Act, 1914, as adapted by the Government of Ireland (Adaptation of Enactments) (No. 1) Order, 1922, and as extended by Section 8 of the Constabulary Act (Northern Ireland), 1922, power is conferred upon the Minister of Home Affairs to make Regulations relating to the appointment and position of Special Constables in Northern Ireland, and by these Regulations to provide, among other things, for the application to Special Constables to which the Regulations apply, of any of the provisions of the enactments relating to the Royal Ulster Constabulary, subject to such modifications as may be specified in the Regulations:

Now, therefore, I, The Right Honourable Sir Richard Dawson Bates, D.L., M.P., Minister of Home Affairs, do Order and it is hereby ordered as follows:—

The provisions of sub-section (5) of Section 4 of the Constabulary Act (Northern Ireland), 1922, as amended by the Constabulary Act (Northern Ireland), 1928, shall apply to all Special Constables appointed under the aforesaid enactments; and for the purposes of this Order the said sub-section shall be

read as though the words "Special Constabulary" were substituted for the words "Royal Ulster Constabulary" where such words occur in the sub-section.

### CIVIL AUTHORITIES (SPECIAL POWERS) ACT (NORTHERN IRELAND), 1922. ORDER.

WHEREAS by Regulation 26 of the Regulations contained in the Schedule to the Civil Authorities (Special Powers) Act (Northern Ireland), 1922, it is provided that the Civil Authority may, by notice, prohibit the circulation of any newspaper for any specified period, and that any person circulating or distributing any such newspaper within such specified period shall be guilty of an offence against the Regulations in the said Schedule:

Now I, The Right Honourable Sir Richard Dawson Bates, Minister of Home Affairs for Northern Ireland, being the Civil Authority under the said Act, do hereby prohibit the circulation of the newspaper "IRISH FREEDOM—SAOIRSE NA H'EIREANN" from the 15th day of February, 1929, until the 14th day of February, 1930.
