ORDER.

CIVIL AUTHORITIES (SPECIAL POWERS) ACT (NORTHERN IRELAND), 1922.

WHEREAS there is reason to believe that an assembly of persons has been or is about to be convened for the purpose of holding a meeting on the 31st March, 1929, at or near Milltown Cemetery or elsewhere in the City of Belfast for the purpose of organising and holding a procession to or from Milltown Cemetery:

And Whereas there is reason to apprehend that such assembly of persons and the holding of such meeting and procession will give rise to grave disorder and conduce to a breach of the peace or will promote disaffection:

Now, therefore, I, The Right Honourable Sir Richard Dawson Bates, Minister of Home Affairs for Northern Ireland, being the Civil Authority under the said Act, do hereby prohibit the holding of any such meeting or procession.
