## MERCHANDISE MARKS ACT, 1926. IMPORTED BUTTER

It is announced that an application for an Order in Council under the above-mentioned Act, to require the marking of imported butter (including blends of butter consisting of or containing imported butter) with an indication of origin, has been referred for inquiry to the Standing Committee set up under the Act by the Minister of Agriculture and Fisheries, the Secretary of State for the Home Department and the Secretary of State for Scotland, acting jointly.

Attention is called to the fact that, under the provisions of the Act, while the Committee in every case referred to them must consider whether the goods shall bear the indication of origin at the time of sale or exposure for sale, they may also, at their discretion, consider and report upon the question whether such goods should bear an indication of origin at the time of importation.
