WHEREAS it is enacted by Section 6 of the Petty Sessions Clerk (Ireland) Act, 1858, that it shall be lawful for the Lord Lieutenant to order and declare that from a certain time therein to be named two or more districts shall be served by one and the same person as Clerk:

And Whereas by the Government of Ireland Act, 1920, the Orders made thereunder and the Irish Free State (Consequential Provisions) Act, 1922, the powers of the Lord Lieutenant in this respect became vested in and are now exercisable by the Governor of Northern Ireland:

And Whereas by the Petty Sessions Fees and Administration Act (Northern Ireland), 1923, it is provided that the power of the Governor of Northern Ireland to make an Order declaring that two or more Petty Sessions Districts shall be served by one and the same person as Clerk shall be exercisable in respect of any districts, whether they are all situate in the same county or not, and it is thereby further provided that the appointment of a person to be the Clerk of such two or more Districts shall, on the first occasion for such appointment, in pursuance of the Order, be made by the Governor of Northern Ireland, who shall select for appointment some one of the persons who filled the office of Petty Sessions Clerk in any of those districts immediately before the coming into force of the Order, or, in the case of the unfitness of all such persons, then some other proper and fit person, and that the salary to be paid to the Clerk so appointed on the first occasion aforesaid for two or more districts shall notwithstanding anything in Section 6 of the Petty Sessions Clerk (Ireland) Act, 1858, be such as

the Governor of Northern Ireland in his discretion may fix:

Now I, James Albert Edward, Duke of Abercorn, K.G., K.P., Governor of Northern Ireland, in pursuance of the powers conferred upon me by the above-mentioned Acts and all other powers me thereunto enabling, do hereby order and declare that the Petty Sessions Districts of Carrickfergus and Whiteabbey, in the County of Antrim, shall from the 1st day of January, 1931, be served by one and the same person as Clerk:

And I do further appoint William Young, at present Clerk of Petty Sessions for the district of Carrickfergus, County Antrim, to be Clerk of the districts of Carrickfergus and Whiteabbey, County Antrim:

And I do further fix the salary of the said William Young, as Clerk of the aforesaid districts of Carrickfergus and Whiteabbey, at the annual sum of One Hundred and Seventy-six Pounds.

And I do further fix the salary of the said Nathaniel Milligan Clarke as Clerk of the aforesaid districts of Antrim, Randalstown, Toomebridge and Templepatrick at the annual sum of Two Hundred and Twenty-one Pounds.

**WIDOWS', ORPHANS' AND OLD AGE  
CONTRIBUTORY PENSIONS ACTS  
(NORTHERN IRELAND), 1925 and 1929.**

The Ministry of Labour for Northern Ireland hereby gives notice that Regulations have been made under Sub-section 2 (a) of Section 21 of the Widows', Orphans' and Old Age Contributory Pensions Act (Northern Ireland), 1929,

as amended by the National Health Insurance Act (Northern Ireland), 1930, prescribing the time limit subject to which weeks in respect of which contributions were paid as an exempt person may, in the case of a man who, having ceased to be an exempt person, subsequently became an employed contributor, be included in calculating the qualifying period of employment and insurance necessary to establish a title to become a voluntary contributor under Section 1 (3) (a) of the National Health Insurance Act, 1924.

**WIDOWS', ORPHANS' AND OLD AGE  
CONTRIBUTORY PENSIONS ACTS  
(NORTHERN IRELAND), 1925 and 1929.**

The Ministry of Labour for Northern Ireland hereby gives notice that Regulations have been made under Sub-section (2) of Section 14 of the Widows', Orphans' and Old Age Contributory Pensions Act (Northern Ireland), 1925, as amended by the National Health Insurance Act (Northern Ireland), 1930, prescribing the period during which an exempt person being a man shall be deemed to continue to be insured for the purposes of the Widows', Orphans' and Old Age Contributory Pensions Acts (Northern Ireland), 1925 and 1929, relating to Widows' and Orphans' Pensions, after having ceased to be employed within the meaning of the National Health Insurance Acts (Northern Ireland), 1924-1930:

**THE SAFEGUARDING OF INDUSTRIES  
(EXEMPTION) No. 4 ORDER, 1930,  
dated 17th December, 1930, made by the  
Treasury under Section 10 of the Finance  
Act, 1926 (16 & 17 Geo. 5, c. 22).**

WHEREAS it is provided by Sub-section (5) of Section 10 of the Finance Act, 1926 (16 & 17 Geo. 5, c. 22) that the Treasury may by Order exempt from the duty imposed by Section 1 of the Safeguarding of Industries Act, 1921 (11 & 12 Geo. 5, c. 47), as amended by the Finance Act, 1926, for such period as may be specified in the Order, any article in respect of which the Board of Trade are satisfied on a representation made by a consumer of that article that the article is not made in any part of His Majesty's Dominions in quantities which are substantial having regard to the consumption of the article for the time being in the United Kingdom, and that there is no reasonable probability that the article will within a reasonable period be made in His Majesty's Dominions in such substantial quantities.

And whereas, by the Safeguarding of Industries (Exemption) No. 4 Order, 1929 (a), made by the Treasury, the article specified in the Schedule to this Order was, *inter alia*, exempted from the duty imposed by Section 1 of the Safeguarding of Industries Act, 1921, as amended by the Finance Act, 1926, for a period ending on the 31st December, 1930.

And whereas the Board of Trade are satisfied on representations by consumers of the article specified in the Schedule to this Order that this article is not made in any part of His Majesty's Dominions in quantities which are substantial, having regard to the consumption of this article for the time being in the United Kingdom, and that there is no reasonable probability that this article will, within a reasonable period, be made in His Majesty's Dominions in such substantial quantities.

Now, therefore, we, being two of the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury, in pursuance of the powers conferred on us by the said Section 10 of the Finance Act, 1926, and of all other powers enabling us in that behalf, hereby order as follows:—

1. The article mentioned in the Schedule to this Order shall continue to be exempt from the duty imposed by Section 1 of the Safeguarding of Industries Act, 1921, as amended by the Finance Act, 1926, from the expiration of the period prescribed by the above-mentioned Order until the 30th day of June, 1931, inclusive.

2. This Order may be cited as the Safeguarding of Industries (Exemption) No. 4 Order, 1930.

KING'S BENCH DIVISION.—IN BANKRUPTCY.

His Grace the Governor has been pleased to appoint Senator the Viscount Bangor, O.B.E., to be a Member of the Privy Council of Northern Ireland.

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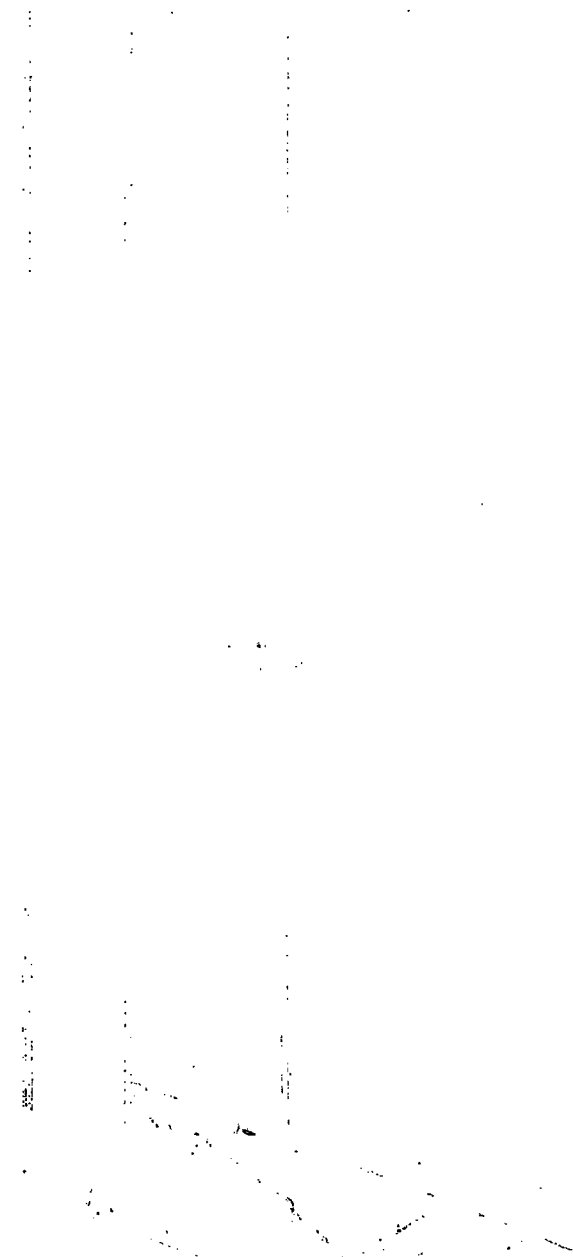
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
