THE KING'S MOST EXCELLENT
MAJESTY IN COUNCIL.

Whereas it is provided by sub-section (2) of section eighteen of the *Architects (Registration) Act, 1931*, that that Act shall not extend to Northern Ireland unless and until provision to that effect is made by an Order of His Majesty in Council made in pursuance of a resolution passed by both Houses of the Parliament of Northern Ireland:

And whereas such a resolution as is required by the said sub-section has been passed by both Houses of the said Parliament:

Now, Therefore, His Majesty, in pursuance of the said resolution and by virtue of all powers enabling him in that behalf, is pleased, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, to order, and it is hereby ordered, that the *Architects (Registration) Act, 1931*, shall extend to Northern Ireland.

CIVIL AUTHORITIES
(SPECIAL POWERS) ACT (NORTHERN IRELAND), 1922.

WHEREAS by Section 26 of the Regulations contained in the Schedule to the Civil

Authorities (Special Powers) Act (Northern Ireland), 1922, it is provided that the Civil Authority may by notice prohibit the circulation of any newspaper for any specified period, and that the person circulating or distributing such newspaper within such specified period shall be guilty of an offence against the Regulations in the said Schedule:

Now, I, The Right Honourable Sir Richard Dawson Bates, Minister of Home Affairs for Northern Ireland, being the Civil Authority under the said Act, do hereby prohibit the circulation of the following newspapers entitled

"An Phoblacht" or "The Republic"
or "The Loyalist" or "The Republican
Press,"

"The Irish World and American
Industrial Liberator,"

"Irish Freedom" or "Saoirse na
h'Eireann,"

or under any other title or alias whatever in Northern Ireland, from the 1st day of January, 1932, until the 31st day of December, 1932.
