CHILDREN ACT, 1908.

WHEREAS the Middletown Industrial School for Roman Catholic girls, County Armagh, was certified on the 6th day of May, 1912, by the Chief Secretary of the Lord Lieutenant of Ireland, under the Children Act, 1908, as fit for the reception of female children to be sent there under the said Act:

And whereas the Management of the said Middletown Industrial School is willing to set apart a portion of the said School premises for the reception of Roman Catholic female youthful offenders to be committed to a Reformatory under the said Act;

Now, therefore, I, the Right Honourable Sir Richard Dawson Bates, Minister of Home Affairs for Northern Ireland, certify by this writing under my hand that the said portion of the Middletown Industrial School Premises, County Armagh, is fit for the reception of female youthful offenders to be sent there under the Children Act, 1908.

PUBLIC HEALTH PORT SANITARY
REGULATIONS (NORTHERN
IRELAND), 1933.

The Ministry of Home Affairs hereby gives notice that Article 6 of the above Regulations

shall apply as from the first day of November, 1933, to the Port of Belfast.

The Article requires that the Master of any foreign-going ship fitted with suitable wireless transmitting apparatus, on approaching the district from a foreign port shall, if any person on board has symptoms which may be indicative of infectious disease other than tuberculosis, or if there are any circumstances requiring the attention of the Medical Officer, send to the Sanitary Authority either directly or through an agent approved by the Sanitary Authority, a wireless message embodying such of the items of information specified in the Regulations as are applicable.

The agents of the following Shipping Companies have been approved by the Belfast Port Sanitary Authority:—

The Anchor Donaldson, and
The White Star.

Where messages are sent directly to the Sanitary Authority they shall conform with the Section relating to Routine Quarantine Messages of the 1931 International Code of Signals.

Messages sent through agents may be sent in private code.
