ORDER.

CIVIL AUTHORITIES (SPECIAL POWERS) ACTS (NORTHERN IRELAND), 1922 and 1928.

WHEREAS there is reason to believe that an assembly of certain persons from the Free State purporting to be members of the Irish Unemployed Workers' Movement is likely to take place on or about the 8th instant, for the purpose of forming a procession to Belfast:

And whereas there is reason to apprehend that such assembly of persons and the holding of such procession will give rise to grave disorder and conduce to a breach of the peace or will promote disaffection:

Now therefore I, the Right Honourable Sir Richard Dawson Bates, Minister of Home Affairs for Northern Ireland, being the Civil Authority under the said Acts, do hereby prohibit the holding of any such assembly or procession in Northern Ireland.

ORDER.

CIVIL AUTHORITIES (SPECIAL POWERS) ACT (NORTHERN IRELAND), 1922.

WHEREAS there is reason to believe that assemblies of persons purporting to be members of the Irish Unemployed Workers' Movement, have been or are about to be convened on the 11th October, 1933, at or near

Frederick Street or elsewhere in the City of Belfast, for the purpose of holding meetings or organising a procession or processions:

And whereas there is reason to apprehend that such assemblies of persons and the holding of such meetings and processions will give rise to grave disorder and conduce to a breach of the peace:

Now, therefore, I, the Right Honourable Sir Richard Dawson Bates, Minister of Home Affairs for Northern Ireland, being the Civil Authority under the said Act, do hereby prohibit the holding of any such meetings or processions.
