RULES OF THE SUPREME COURT, NORTHERN IRELAND.

Notice is hereby given that on the 29th day of March, 1934, His Grace the Governor, by Order in the Privy Council of Northern Ireland, made Rules of the Supreme Court, Northern Ireland, for the following purposes:

- (a) For certain purposes of the Foreign Judgments (Reciprocal Enforcement) Act, 1933;
- (b) With respect to the service of documents and examination of witnesses in certain cases in accordance with Conventions made with Foreign Countries.

ORDER.

CIVIL AUTHORITIES (SPECIAL POWERS) ACT (NORTHERN IRELAND), 1922.

WHEREAS there is reason to believe that an assembly of persons has been or is about to be convened for the purpose of holding a meeting on the 1st April, 1934, at or near The Old Chapel Graveyard, or elsewhere in the town of Newry, for the purpose of organising and holding a procession to or from The Old Chapel Graveyard:

And whereas there is reason to apprehend that such assembly of persons and the holding of such meeting and procession will give rise to grave disorder and conduce to a breach of the peace or will promote disaffection:

Now therefore I, the Right Honourable Sir Richard Dawson Bates, Minister of Home Affairs for Northern Ireland, being the Civil Authority under the said Acts, do hereby prohibit the holding of any such meeting or procession.
