District No. 2.—An area comprising the townlands of Ballycarn, Ballygowan, Ballylesson, Ballymullan, Ballynahatly, Ballyskeagh, Drumbeg, Drumbo (that portion north of the road from Shaw's Bridge to Lisburn), Edenderry, Largymore, Lisnatrunk and Tullynacross, in the barony of Castlereagh Upper, in the Administrative County of Down; the townlands of Lambeg South, Lisnagarvey, Old Warren, and Tonagh, in the barony of Massereene Upper in the Administrative County of Antrim, the townlands of Ballyfinaghy, Derryaghy, Dunmurry, Killeaton, Kilmakee, Lambeg North, Malone Upper and Old Forge, in the barony of Belfast Upper in the Administrative County of Antrim.

## SECOND SCHEDULE.

Prohibited Areas.

Any farm, garden, cottage plot or agricultural holding on any portion of which the disease of potatoes known as Black Scab, Wart or Warty Disease, Cauliflower Disease, Potato Canker or Potato Rosette (and caused by the fungus known as *Chrysophlyctis endobiotica* (Schilb) or *Synchytrium endobioticum* (Perc.) exists or has at any time existed.

## CONSTABULARY (NORTHERN IRELAND)

### REGULATIONS MADE BY THE MINISTER OF HOME AFFAIRS FOR NORTHERN IRELAND WITH RESPECT TO THE APPOINTMENT AND POSITION OF SPECIAL CONSTABLES.

WHEREAS by the Special Constables Act, 1914, as adapted by Article 5 (3) of the Government of Ireland (Adaptation of Enactments) (No. 1) Order, 1922, and as extended by Section 8 of the Constabulary Act (Northern Ireland), 1922, power is conferred on the Minister of Home Affairs for Northern Ireland to make regulations with respect to the appointment and position of Special Constables in Northern Ireland, Now, therefore, I, The Right Honourable Sir Richard Dawson Bates, Minister of Home Affairs for Northern Ireland, do Order, and it is hereby Ordered, as follows:—

- I.—All Special Constables shall be appointed by the Minister of Home Affairs (hereinafter called the Minister) or by such person as may be authorised for the purpose by the Minister, and upon such terms as may from time to time be prescribed by the Minister.
- II.—Every Special Constable on appointment shall be bound to serve as such for a period of 3 months or such other period as may from time to time be prescribed by the Minister from the date of his appointment, and shall continue to serve as such until his appointment as such Special Constable shall be terminated (a) at any time by and at the discretion of either the Minister or such other person as may be authorised for the purpose by the Minister, or (b) by the resignation of such Special Constable on his giving to his immediate Superior Officer 7 days' notice of same, expiring at the end of any month of his current contract of service.
