**NORTHERN IRELAND WINTER ASSIZE
AMENDING ORDER, 1922.**

By the Lord Lieutenant and Privy Council of
Ireland.

FITZALAN OF DERWENT.

NORTHERN IRELAND WINTER ASSIZES, 1922.

WHEREAS, in pursuance of the Winter Assizes Act, 1876, and of the Supreme Court of Judicature Act (Ireland), 1877, and of the Government of Ireland Act, 1920, and the Orders made by His Majesty in Council under the last-mentioned Act, and of all other powers in that behalf, We, the Lord Lieutenant-General and General Governor of Ireland did, on the Twenty-Fourth day of October, 1922, by and with the advice and consent of the Privy Council of Ireland make an Order providing amongst other things that the county of Antrim, the county of Down, the county of Armagh, the county of Londonderry, the county of the city of Londonderry, the county of Fermanagh and the county of Tyrone should, for the purposes of the Northern Ireland Winter Assizes to be held next after the date of the said Order, and for the purposes of the said Order, be united together and form one county under the name of the Northern Ireland Winter Assize County:

And whereas We are empowered by section three of the said Winter Assizes Act (as ex-

tended to Northern Ireland in pursuance of the other Acts above-cited), from time to time, by and with the advice and consent aforesaid, to revoke, alter or add to any Order made in pursuance of that Act:

Now, therefore, We, the Lord Lieutenant-General and General Governor of Ireland, by and with the advice and consent of the Privy Council of Ireland, do hereby order as follows:—

1. The said Order dated the Twenty-Fourth Day of October, 1922, shall have effect as from the said date with the following alterations, that is to say—

(a) Article 2 of the said Order is hereby revoked, and the following article is hereby substituted therefor:—

“2. The next Winter Assizes for the said Winter Assize County shall be held in the Court House of the county of Antrim at Belfast in the county of the city of Belfast.”

(b) For references in the said Order to the Sheriff of the county of the city of Belfast there shall be substituted references to the Sheriff of the county of Antrim.

(c) For references in the said Order to Grand Jurors or Petty Jurors from the county of the city of Belfast there shall be substituted references to Grand Jurors or Petty Jurors from the county of Antrim.

(d) In Article 8 of the said Order for references to the county of the city of Belfast

there shall be substituted references to the county of Antrim.

2. The Northern Ireland Winter Assizes referred to in the said Order shall be held on the Fourth day of January, 1923, or such other day as may be fixed by the Judge of Assize.
