### CIVIL AUTHORITIES (SPECIAL POWERS) ACTS (NORTHERN IRELAND), 1922 and 1933.

WHEREAS by section 26 of the Regulations contained in the Schedule to the Civil Authorities (Special Powers) Acts (Northern Ireland), 1922 and 1933, it is provided that the Civil Authority may by Notice prohibit the circulation of any newspaper for any specified period and that the person circulating or distributing such newspaper within such specified period shall be guilty of an offence against the Regulations in the said Schedule:

Now, I, the Right Honourable Sir Richard Dawson Bates, Bart., Minister of Home Affairs for Northern Ireland, being the Civil Authority under the said Act, do hereby prohibit the circulation of the following newspapers entitled:—

Press”
- “The Irish World and American Industrial Liberator”

"Republican Congress"

or under any other title or alias whatever in Northern Ireland from the 1st day of January, 1938, until the 31st day of December, 1938.

## ROAD AND RAILWAY TRANSPORT. ACQUISITION OF UNDERTAKINGS.

### EXTENSION OF PERIOD.

I, the Right Honourable Sir Richard Dawson Bates, Baronet, Minister of Home Affairs for Northern Ireland, in pursuance of the powers vested in me by Section 5 of the Road and Railway Transport Act (Northern Ireland), 1935, and of all other powers in that behalf enabling me, but without prejudice to any further exercise of such powers, hereby order and direct that the period within which the Northern Ireland Road Transport Board may acquire every road motor undertaking operated for hire or reward in Northern Ireland, including the passenger and freight road transport services of any railway company operating in Northern Ireland, shall be extended to the 31st day of December, 1938.

AGRICULTURAL MARKETING (PIG  
INDUSTRY) ACT (NORTHERN  
IRELAND), 1934.

DETERMINATION OF PIG INDUSTRY  
COUNCIL FOR NORTHERN IRELAND.

The Pig Industry Council for Northern Ireland (hereinafter referred to as "the Council") in exercise of their powers under Section Five of the Agricultural Marketing (Pig Industry) Act (Northern Ireland), 1934, hereby determine as follows:—

I.

PRICES FOR PIGS.

As and from the first day of January, 1938, until further notice, pigs sold by a producer shall be sold at the following prices:—

The price for pigs sold dead which weigh not less than 1 cwt. 0 qr. 0 lb. and not more than 1 cwt. 0 qr. 20 lb. shall be 4/- less than the basic Roll and Ham pig prices.

GENERAL.

1. There shall be no fixed prices in the following cases:—

- Carcases weighing less than 1 cwt. 0 qr. 0 lb. or more than 2 cwt. 0 qr. 14 lb.
- Wholly black pigs.  
Boars.  
Rigs or stags.  
Sucked sows.  
Emaciated or screw pigs.  
Pigs visibly diagnosable as diseased before despatch by the producer and subsequently condemned.  
Smelling pig carcasses with definite indications of putrefaction.  
Pig carcasses badly abused or damaged before being handed over by the producer to the curer.

DEAD PIGS.

A. For pigs sold dead and weighing not less than 1 cwt. 0 qr. 0 lb. and not more than 2 cwt. 0 qr. 14 lb.

In accordance with the basic Roll and Ham pig price which shall be determined in respect of each calendar month in the manner set forth in Part I. of the Schedule to this Determination.

Such price shall apply in respect of pigs weighing not less than 1 cwt. 1 qr. 14 lb. and not more than 1 cwt. 3 qr. 14 lb. dead weight which are classified as Grade 2 or Grade B in accordance with the provisions of the Pigs Marketing (Grading) (Northern Ireland) Order, 1936, dated 31st December, 1936, as amended.

The following additions to and deductions from the said price shall apply in the case of pig carcasses belonging to each of the weight classes and grades prescribed in the First Schedule to the above-mentioned Order as follows:—

2. The price for a defective pig carcass weighing not less than 1 cwt. 0 qr. 0 lb. and not more than 2 cwt. 0 qr. 14 lb. shall be as follows:—

If any pig carcass has a broken ham or is shoulder-stuck, the appropriate grade price (or fixed price if the carcass weighs not less than 1 cwt. 0 qr. 0 lb. and not more than 1 cwt. 0 qr. 20 lb.) shall be payable but the following deductions may be made from the value of the carcass:—

- Broken Ham—Dry, shank and/or shell bone break. 5% of the total value of the carcass.
  - Broken Ham—Wet break. 12½% of the total value of the carcass.
  - Shoulder-stuck carcass. 3/- per shoulder affected.
3. Where portion of a pig carcass is condemned on account of disease the existence of which could not reasonably have been known to the producer

before despatch to the curer, the appropriate grade price (or fixed price if the carcase weighs not less than 1 cwt. 0 qr. 0 lb. and not more than 1 cwt. 0 qr. 20 lb.) shall apply. If the carcase is wholly condemned on account of disease the existence of which could not reasonably have been known to the producer before despatch to the curer, the relevant Grade 2 or Grade B' price (or fixed price if the carcase weighs not less than 1 cwt. 0 qr. 0 lb. and not more than 1 cwt. 0 qr. 20 lb.) shall apply.

The decision as to whether a pig carcase falls within Category 1 (b), 2 or 3 shall lie solely with the Ministry's grader, who shall give a certificate in writing accordingly.

#### LIVE PIGS.

- B. For pigs sold alive under direct contract to Wiltshire curers in Northern Ireland
- C. For pigs sold alive to the Pigs Marketing Board (Northern Ireland) weighing not less than 1 cwt. 0 qr. 0 lb. and not more than 1 cwt. 2 qr. 3 lb. dead weight.

On a dead weight basis in accordance with the basic Roll and Ham pig price with a premium of 6/- per cwt. or such other amount as the Council may from time to time determine.

Provided that in the case of pigs sold alive to the Pigs Marketing Board (Northern Ireland) and resold to Wiltshire curers the dead weight of such pigs shall, until such time as is otherwise determined, be computed by taking 75 per cent. of the live weight of such pigs when delivered to the said Board.

Such price shall apply in respect of pigs weighing not less than 1 cwt. 0 qr. 21 lb. and not more than 1 cwt. 2qr. 3 lb. dead weight, which are classified as Grade 2 in accordance with the provisions of the Pigs Marketing (Grading) (Northern Ireland) Order, 1936, dated 31st December, 1936, as amended.

The following additions to and deductions from the said price shall apply in the case of pigs belonging to each of the weight classes and grades prescribed in Part I. of the First Schedule to the above-mentioned Order, as follows:—

The price of pigs weighing not less than 1 cwt. 0 qr. 0 lb. and not more than 1 cwt. 0 qr. 20 lb. dead weigh suitable for manufacture into Wiltshire bacon shall be 2/- less than the Basic Roll & Ham pig price, a further cut of 2/- to apply to unsuitable pigs.

In the case of pigs weighing more than 1 cwt. 2 qr. 3 lb. dead weight sold alive under direct contract to Wiltshire curers the prices shall be those applicable to pigs of similar weights, grades and descriptions sold dead, as hereinbefore determined, save that in the case of pigs weighing from 1 cwt. 2 qr. 4 lb. to 1 cwt. 2 qr. 7 lb. dead weight, the prices per dead cwt. shall be as follows:—

Grade A. Basic Roll & Ham Pig Price plus 6/-.

Grade B. Basic Roll & Ham Pig Price plus 3/-.

Grade C. Basic Roll & Ham Pig Price.

Grade U.L. } Basic Roll & Ham Pig Price  
Grade U.F. } less 3/-.

- D. For pigs sold alive to the Pigs Marketing Board (Northern Ireland) weighing not less than 1 cwt. 2 qr. 4 lb. and not more than 2 cwt. 0 qr. 14 lb. dead weight.

On the basis of a live weight price per cwt. equivalent to the corresponding dead pig price.

Provided that the Pigs Marketing Board (Northern Ireland) may reduce the price for such pigs by a sum not exceeding 5/-

per cwt. live weight or such other amount as the Council may from time to time determine.

#### II.

##### TERMS OF SALE.

1. In the case of a pig carcase the amount to be paid shall be the product (to the nearest penny) of the dead weight of the pig and the relevant Grade or other price per dead cwt. as published in the appropriate ready reckoner issued by the Council, less any prescribed deduction or cut.

2. The curer shall issue to the producer a carcase card in respect of each pig bought and shall issue such carcase card free of charge before the producer slaughters the pig.

3. The producer shall, unless prevented by the Public Health Authorities, deliver the pig in accordance with the terms set out on the said carcase card and in accordance with the arrangements hereinafter set forth, and the curer shall take delivery when the pig is so presented to him by the producer.

4. The producer shall be entitled to deliver dead pigs to the curer at the producer's nearest recognised pork market or other local collecting centre and the curer shall pay all transport and handling costs subsequent to such delivery. Where a producer delivers dead pigs to a curer's store which is not convenient to the producer's

country delivery point, the curer shall pay all the transport charges incurred by the producer, unless it has been a custom for the producer to deliver his dead pigs at the curer's store.

5. Pig carcasses shall be weighed only at such places and by such persons as may be approved by the Council.

6. The producer shall pay for the weighing of dead pigs at markets. The curer shall not charge for weighing done at his store except in the case of a store situated in an area where a special charge is required to be paid under an existing statute, legal right, or Charter.

7. The producer may request payment direct by post from the curer and the curer shall comply with such request within four days, or if the producer so requests the curer shall make payment in cash not later than the date of the market following that in which the sale took place. If payment is made otherwise than by post the producer shall hand the weigh ticket or the curer's delivery receipt to the curer, or his representative, at the time of payment.

8. The curer shall supply to the producer at the time payment is made, a purchase and grading statement, in a form approved by the Council, showing the name and address of the curer, the name and address of the producer, the date of delivery, the serial number of the carcass card, the dead weight, the weight class and quality grade, the price per dead cwt., the value of each pig, the total value of consignment, authorised deductions and the nett payment. A copy of this statement shall at the end of the week be sent to the Ministry of Agriculture or such other person as the Ministry may direct, and a copy shall be retained by the curer.

### III.

#### SALE BY CONTRACT.

As and from the first day of January, 1938, until further notice all pigs sold alive by a producer to a Wiltshire bacon curer otherwise than through the Pigs Marketing Board (Northern Ireland) shall be sold under contract. Subject to the provisions of Section 9 of the Agricultural Marketing (Pig Industry) Act (Northern Ireland), 1934, all such contracts shall be on the terms and in the form approved by the Council. All such contracts shall be void and unenforceable unless and until they shall have been registered with the Council.

### SCHEDULE.

#### PART I.

#### METHOD OF DETERMINING THE BASIC ROLL AND HAM PIG PRICE.

The price for each calendar month for pigs sold dead and weighing not less than 1 cwt. 0 qr. 0 lb. and not more than 2 cwt. 0 qr. 14 lb. shall be ascertained by means of a formula which takes into account the prices of roll bacon and hams, fresh meats and selected feeding stuffs ascertained in respect of definite periods.

#### ROLL AND HAM PIG PRICE FORMULA.

The formula shall assume a price of 58/- per cwt. for pork taking the retail cost of a standard ration at 7/3d per cwt., dried roll bacon and hams at 97/6d per cwt., and fresh meats (or offals) at 12/- per carcass.

#### 1. RETAIL COST OF THE STANDARD RATION.

(a) The standard ration shall be as follows:—

Barley Meal	30%
Maize Meal	30%
Pollards (White)	20%
Bran (White)	10%
Meat Meal (60% protein)	10%

(b) The cost of the standard ration per cwt. shall be calculated from the average retail prices of the above-named feeding stuffs at representative centres in Northern Ireland, as certified by the Ministry of Agriculture for Northern Ireland.

(c) The retail prices of the above-named feeding stuffs shall be ascertained each week over a period of sixteen consecutive weeks ending on the Saturday nearest to the twenty-first day of the month preceding the month to which the price will relate.

(d) All calculations shall be made to the nearest farthing.

#### 2. PRICES REALISED FOR ROLL BACON AND HAMS AND FOR FRESH MEATS.

(a) Realised prices for roll bacon and hams shall be ascertained by taking the weighted average nett ex store price received for dried (including smoked) bacon of the description 10's, 11's and 12's rolls and dried (including smoked) hams of the weights 12 lb.-24 lb.

(b) Realised prices for roll bacon and hams and for fresh meats shall be ascertained for the period of four or five complete weeks ending on the Saturday nearest to the twenty-first day of the month

preceding the month to which the price will relate.

(c) Realised prices for roll bacon and hams and for fresh meats shall be ascertained from Northern Ireland roll and ham curers each of whom purchased 6,000 or more pig carcasses in 1937 for curing.

The prices so obtained shall be weighted in proportion to the output of the particular curers before being averaged.

(d) The realised prices for roll bacon and hams and for fresh meats shall be ascertained by the Ministry of Agriculture for Northern Ireland.

(e) Fresh meats shall include rough lard, fillets, steaks, griskins, ribs, tongues, knees, heads, feet, parings (including trimmings and ham ends), knobs, neck bones, tail bones, neck griskins, bones, back bones, blade and marrow bones. They shall also include meats which have been pickled.

(f) All prices shall be ascertained to the nearest penny.

### 3. BASIC ROLL AND HAM PIG PRICE.

(a) The initial Roll and Ham pig price per cwt. dead weight shall vary in accordance with the following scale:—

Retail Cost of Standard Ration (per cwt.)	Initial Roll and Ham Pig Price (per cwt.)
6/9	55/8
7/-	56/10
7/3	58/-
7/6	59/2
7/9	60/4

and so on, in proportion up or down. No fraction of 3d above or below 7/3 in the retail cost of the standard ration shall be taken into account.

(b) A standard ration cost of 7/3d per cwt. shall equal an initial price of 97/6 for 1 cwt. of dried roll bacon and hams (provided fresh meats have realised 12/- per carcass). For every 1/2d change in the initial Roll and Ham pig price, per cwt., there shall be a corresponding change of 2/- per cwt. in the initial price of dried roll bacon and hams.

(c) If the realised price for fresh meats shall be more or less than 12/- per carcass, the difference shall respectively be deducted from or added to the initial price of dried roll bacon and hams.

(d) For every complete sum of 2/- per cwt. by which the realised price of roll bacon and hams is above or below the initial price for roll bacon and hams, (adjusted in accordance with the provisions of the preceding paragraph) 7d per cwt. shall be added to or deducted from the initial Roll and Ham pig price per cwt. as ascertained above.

The resultant price shall be the basic Roll and Ham pig price.

## PART II.

### PUBLICATION OF PRICES.

The Ministry shall communicate in writing to the Chairman and Secretary of the Council, the Chairman and Secretary of the Pigs Marketing Board (Northern Ireland), and the Secretary of the Ulster Curers' Association, the prices realised for roll bacon and hams and for fresh meats and the retail cost of the standard ration not earlier than five days (excluding Saturdays and Sundays) before the end of the month.

These prices shall be regarded as confidential until the resultant Roll and Ham pig price is published by the Council.

- (ii) For hen eggs purchased by a licensed wholesale dealer of Class A from a licensed wholesale dealer of Class B, 1/0 2-16d. per lb.:  
Provided that where the licensed wholesale dealer of Class B had accepted delivery of the eggs during the week ended 25th December, 1937, the price payable to him for such eggs by a licensed wholesale dealer of Class A shall be 1/27-16d. per lb.

#### DUCK EGGS.

- (b) For duck eggs purchased by a licensed wholesale dealer from a producer where the eggs were produced by the producer's own ducks, 1/8d. per dozen:  
Provided that where the eggs were delivered by the vendor to premises used by a licensed wholesale dealer of Class A for the testing, grading and packing of eggs, an additional three-farthings shall be paid for each complete dozen so delivered.

2. This Order may be cited as the Marketing of Eggs (Determination of Wholesale Dealers' Prices) (No. 12) Order (Northern Ireland), 1937, and shall be construed as one with the Marketing of Eggs (Determination of Wholesale Dealers' Prices) Order (Northern Ireland), 1937.
