THE KING'S MOST EXCELLENT
MAJESTY IN COUNCIL.

WHEREAS it is expedient that the exportation of certain goods should be prohibited:—

NOW, THEREFORE, in exercise of the powers vested in Him by section 8 of the Customs and Inland Revenue Act, 1879^(a) as amended by section 17 of the Finance Act, 1921^(b), and of all other powers enabling Him in that behalf, His Majesty is pleased, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, to order, and it is hereby ordered, as follows:—

1. Subject as hereinafter provided, the exportation from the United Kingdom of the goods described in the Schedule hereto is prohibited:

Provided that the said prohibition shall not apply to any exportation of any such goods which shall be expressly permitted by a licence given by the Board of Trade and in accordance with the conditions (if any) of such licence.

2. This Order may be cited as the Export of Goods (Prohibition) Order, 1939.

MILK AND MILK PRODUCTS ACTS
(NORTHERN IRELAND), 1934 to 1938.
DETERMINATION OF THE JOINT MILK
COUNCIL FOR NORTHERN IRELAND IN
RESPECT OF THE PERIOD 1st OCTOBER,
1939, to 30th SEPTEMBER, 1940.

The Joint Milk Council for Northern Ireland in exercise of its powers under Section Six of the Milk and Milk Products Act (Northern Ireland), 1934, hereby determines as follows:—

PART I. PRODUCER'S PRICES

(1) During the periods specified hereunder milk of Grade A, Grade B, and Grade C, sold otherwise than in bottles or cartons by the holder of a Producer's licence (hereinafter referred to as the "Producer"), to the holder of a Distributor's licence (hereinafter referred to as the "Distributor"), shall be sold at the following prices for level quantities of not less than two gallons per day delivered at the distributor's premises:—

1st October, 1939, to 30th April, 1940, inclusive.

Grade A—not less than 1/5d. per gallon.

Grade B—1/3d. per gallon.

Grade C—1/3d. per gallon.

1st May, 1940, to 30th September, 1940, inclusive.

Grade A—not less than 1/3d. per gallon.

Grade B—1/1d. per gallon.

Grade C—1/1d. per gallon.

(2) Where milk is bottled by the Producer, the Distributor shall pay to the Producer not less than 1½d. per gallon in respect of this service, bottles and caps being supplied by the Distributor.

(3) The above prices are subject to a deduction in respect of carriage (hereinafter referred to as a "Collecting Charge"), when this service is performed by the Distributor.

(4) The maximum collecting charges which may be deducted from the above prices are as follows:—

(a) When the distance between the Distributor's premises and the point at which the milk is collected or the Producer's Farm (whichever is the nearer to the Distributor's premises)—

	per gallon.
does not exceed 5 miles ...	¾d.
exceeds 5 miles but does not exceed 10 miles ...	1d.
exceeds 10 miles but does not exceed 15 miles ...	1½d.
exceeds 15 miles but does not exceed 20 miles ...	1½d.
exceeds 20 miles but does not exceed 25 miles ...	1½d.
exceeds 25 miles but does not exceed 35 miles ...	2d.
for each 10 miles or part thereof in excess of 35 miles an additional charge of ...	½d.

(b) Where the Distributor's premises are situated in the County Borough of Belfast, the scale of maximum collecting charges set forth above shall apply with the substitution of the General Post Office for the Distributor's premises.

(c) Where milk is delivered by rail to Belfast County Borough so as to arrive after 9.30 a.m., the Distributor may deduct ¾d. per gallon from the price payable to the vendor, in addition to any collecting charge which may be deducted in respect of the carriage of the milk by the Distributor from the railway terminus in Belfast County Borough to his premises.

PART II. SALE BY CONTRACT.

(1) From the 1st day of October, 1939, until the 30th day of September, 1940, inclusive, all milk of Grade A, Grade B, or Grade C sold by a Producer to a Distributor in quantities of not less than two gallons per day shall be bought and sold under contract duly registered by the Joint Milk Council (hereinafter referred to as "the Council"). Subject to the provisions of Section Seven of the Milk and Milk Products Act (Northern Ireland), 1934, all such contracts shall be in the form prescribed in the Schedule to this Deter-

mination, or in a form to a like effect, and the terms of such contracts shall be in accordance with the provisions of Part I of this Determination entitled "Producer's Prices." All such contracts shall be submitted to the Council for registration and shall be void and unenforceable until so registered.

(2) Subject to the provisions of Section Seven of the Milk and Milk Products Act (Northern Ireland), 1934, the Council may refuse to register a Contract which is not in accordance with the aforesaid terms or in the prescribed form.

(3) The Council may refuse to register a contract if one of the parties thereto has previously been a party to a contract registered with the Council, and has, in the opinion of the Council, unreasonably failed in the performance of the terms thereof.

(4) The Distributor shall, at the time when payment is being made to the Producer for milk supplied under contract, forward to the Producer a statement showing the period and the number of gallons to which the payment relates, and shall retain for the information of the Council a copy of such statement.

PART III. RETAIL PRICES.

(1) Subject to the provisions of Section Seven of the Milk and Milk Products Act (Northern Ireland), 1934, milk of Grade A, Grade B and Grade C sold by retail or to a Distributor by a Producer in quantities of less than two gallons per day, and delivered to the purchaser in the following areas in Northern Ireland shall, during the periods indicated, be sold at the following prices:—

(a) In the County Boroughs of Belfast and Londonderry, the Boroughs of Bangor and Newtownards, the Urban Districts of Carrickfergus, Holywood and Lisburn, the Rural Districts of Belfast and Castlereagh, the portion of the Hillsborough Rural District comprised in the District Electoral Division of Breda, the portions of the Larne Rural District comprised in Eden town, the District Electoral Division of Carrickfergus Rural and the townland of Kilroot, the portions of the Lisburn Rural District comprised in the District Electoral Divisions of Dunmurry, Lambeg and Malone:

(i) from the 1st day of October, 1939, to the 30th day of June, 1940, inclusive, and from the 1st day of September, 1940, to the 30th day of September, 1940, inclusive,

Milk of Grade A—not less than 2/2d. per gallon.

Milk of Grade B—2/- per gallon.

Milk of Grade C—1/10d. per gallon.

(ii) from the 1st day of July, 1940, to the 31st day of August, 1940, inclusive,

Milk of Grade A—not less than 2/- per gallon.

Milk of Grade B—1/10d. per gallon.

Milk of Grade C—1/8d. per gallon.

Provided that milk of Grade B or Grade C sold by retail in bottles containing not more than one-third pints may be sold at not less than the appropriate price per gallon set out above.

- (b) In the Boroughs of Coleraine, Ballymena and Larne, and the Urban Districts of Armagh, Ballymoney, Banbridge, Dungannon, Enniskillen, Lurgan, Newry, Omagh, Portadown and Strabane:

- (i) from the 1st day of October, 1939, to the 30th day of April, 1940, inclusive,

Milk of Grade A—not less than 2/- per gallon.

Milk of Grade B—not less than 1/10d. per gallon.

Milk of Grade C—not less than 1/8d. per gallon

- (ii) from the 1st day of May, 1940, to the 30th day of September, 1940, inclusive,

Milk of Grade A—not less than 1/10d. per gallon

Milk of Grade B—not less than 1/8d. per gallon.

Milk of Grade C—not less than 1/6d. per gallon.

- (c) In the Urban Districts of Ballycastle, Donaghadee, Newcastle, Portrush, Portstewart, Warrenpoint, and Whitehead:

from the 1st day of October, 1939, to the 30th day of September, 1940, inclusive,

Milk of Grade A—not less than 2/- per gallon.

Milk of Grade B—not less than 1/10d. per gallon.

Milk of Grade C—not less than 1/8d. per gallon.

- (d) In all other areas in Northern Ireland:

- (i) from the 1st day of October, 1939, to the 30th day of April, 1940, inclusive.

Milk of Grade A—not less than 1/10d. per gallon.

Milk of Grade B—not less than 1/8d. per gallon.

Milk of Grade C—not less than 1/6d. per gallon.

- (ii) from the 1st day of May, 1940, to the 30th day of September, 1940, inclusive,

Milk of Grade A—not less than 1/8d. per gallon

Milk of Grade B—not less than 1/6d. per gallon.

Milk of Grade C—not less than 1/4d. per gallon.

- (2) Exceptions:

- (a) (i) A daily quantity of not less than two gallons of milk of Grade A or milk of Grade B in bottles or cartons or of milk of Grade C may be sold to one consumer at not more than 4d. per gallon less than the appropriate retail price.

- (ii) A daily quantity of not less than

two gallons of milk of Grade A or milk of Grade B in sealed churns may be sold to one consumer at not more than 6d. per gallon less than the appropriate retail price.

- (iii) Milk sold by retail and collected by the purchaser from the vendor's premises may be sold at not more than 4d. per gallon less than the appropriate retail price.

Provided that in no case may milk be sold at less than the appropriate producer's price fixed by Part I of this Determination.

- (b) Milk of Grade A, Grade B, or Grade C, sold for the purpose of the manufacture of ice cream to a person whose main business is the manufacture and sale of ice cream, may be sold at not less than one penny per gallon more than the appropriate producer's price fixed by Part I of this Determination.

- (c) Milk sold to public hospitals, to an education authority within the meaning of the Education Acts (Northern Ireland), 1923 to 1936, for the purpose of a scheme for the provision of meals for children in attendance at public elementary schools within the education area, to a nursery school recognised by the Ministry of Education under the Education Acts (Northern Ireland), 1923 to 1936, to camps for unemployed men approved by the Ministry of Labour (Northern Ireland), or to physical training classes for unemployed men conducted by the Ministry of Labour (Northern Ireland), may be sold at not less than the appropriate producer's price fixed in Part I of this Determination.

PART IV. GENERAL.

This Determination may be varied or amended by a subsequent Determination of the Joint Milk Council.

MARKETING OF EGGS (DETERMINATION OF WHOLESALE DEALERS' PRICES) (No. 34) ORDER (NORTHERN IRELAND), 1939.

Notice is hereby given that an Order has been made by the Ministry of agriculture determining that the prices payable by licensed wholesale dealers for eggs delivered during the week ended Saturday, 26th August, 1939, shall be as follows:—

- (a) (i) For hen eggs purchased from a producer 10½d. per lb.

Where the eggs were delivered by the vendor to premises used by a licensed wholesale dealer of Class A for the testing, grading, and packing of eggs, or to a collecting depot specified in the schedule to the above-mentioned Order, an additional halfpenny per lb. shall be paid.

- (ii) For hen eggs purchased by a licensed wholesale dealer of Class A from a licensed wholesale dealer of Class B, 11 3-16d. per lb.
Deductions:—Seconds ½d. per egg;
Rejects 1½d. per egg.

- (b) For duck eggs purchased from a producer 1/1½d. per dozen.

Where the eggs were delivered by the vendor to premises used by a licensed wholesale dealer of Class A for the testing, grading, and packing of eggs, or to a collecting depot specified in the schedule to the above-mentioned Order, an additional three-farthings shall be paid for each complete dozen so delivered.

Deductions:—Rejects, 1d. per egg.

OPEN GENERAL EXPORT LICENCE.

In pursuance of the powers conferred upon them by the Export of Goods (Prohibition) Order, 1939, the Board of Trade do hereby authorise and permit the exportation from any port in Great Britain or Northern Ireland of any of the goods specified in the aforementioned Order to the destinations set out in the Schedule hereto upon the following conditions—

- (1) That the owner or shipper of the said goods, if so required by the Commissioners of H.M. Customs and Excise, shall produce to them, within such time as they may allow, proof to their satisfaction that the said goods were duly delivered at a destination to which this licence applies.

- (2) That this licence shall be deemed void and of no effect in the event of non-compliance with condition (1) as set out above.

- (3) That this licence may be modified or revoked at any time by the Board of Trade without reason given.

His Majesty's dominions, territories under His protection, territories of any Ruler under His suzerainty or protection, territories in respect of which a mandate on behalf of the League of Nations has been accepted by His Majesty and is being exercised by the Government of any part of His dominions (other than any mandate in respect of a territory referred to in the fourth paragraph of Article 22 of the Covenant of the League of Nations).

THE SAFEGUARDING OF INDUSTRIES (EXEMPTION) No. 4 ORDER, 1939, DATED 21st AUGUST, 1939, MADE BY THE TREASURY UNDER SECTION 10 OF THE FINANCE ACT, 1926 (16 & 17 GEO. 5 c. 22).

Whereas it is provided by sub-section (5) of Section 10 of the Finance Act, 1926 (16 & 17 Geo. 5 c. 22), that the Treasury may by order exempt from the duty imposed by Section 1 of the Safeguarding of Industries Act, 1921 (11 & 12 Geo. 5 c. 47) as amended by the Finance Act, 1926, for such period as may be specified in the order, any article in respect of which the Board of Trade are satisfied on a representation made by a consumer of that article that the article is not made in any part of His Majesty's Dominions in quantities which are substantial having regard to the consumption of that article for the time being in the United Kingdom and that there is no reasonable probability that the article will, within a reasonable period, be made in His Majesty's Dominions in such substantial quantities:

And whereas it is provided by sub-section (1) of Section 5 of the Finance Act, 1936 (26 Geo. 5 and 1 Edw. 8 c. 34), that Part 1 of the Safeguarding of Industries Act, 1921, which, as extended by Section 10 of the Finance Act, 1926, was limited to expire on the 19th day of August, 1936, shall continue in force for a further period of ten years from the said day:

And whereas the Board of Trade are satisfied on representations made by a consumer of the article specified in this Order that that article is not made in any part of His Majesty's Dominions in quantities which are substantial, having regard to the consumption of that article for the time being in the United Kingdom and that there is no reasonable probability

that the article will, within a reasonable period, be made in His Majesty's Dominions in such substantial quantities:

Now, therefore, we, the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury, in pursuance of the powers conferred on us by the said Section 10 of the Finance Act, 1926, and of all other powers enabling us in that behalf, hereby order as follows:—

1. Such Diethylamine (Ethylamine, di-) as is not entered under the Customs Acts before the Thirtieth day of August, 1939, or as has not been removed from a bonded warehouse before that date, shall be exempt from the duty imposed by Section 1 of the Safeguarding of Industries Act, 1921, as amended by the Finance Act, 1926, for a period ending on the 31st day of December, 1940.

2. This order may be cited as the Safeguarding of Industries (Exemption) No. 4 Order, 1939.

TREASURY ORDER.

Whereas it is provided by paragraph 1 of Regulation 1 of the Defence (Finance) (Jersey) Regulations 1939 that the Treasury may by order give directions prohibiting, except with permission, dealings with securities which in the opinion of the Treasury are likely to be marketable outside the United Kingdom and requiring owners of such securities to make a return to the Bank of England, or to a representative in Jersey of the Bank of England.

And whereas the Treasury are of opinion that securities of the classes to which this Order applies are likely to be marketable outside the United Kingdom,

Now, therefore, the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury in pursuance of the said paragraph hereby make the following Order:—

1. No person being an owner of securities of any of the classes to which this Order applies shall on or after the date of this Order, unless permission has previously been granted by or on behalf of the Treasury, sell transfer or

do anything which involves the creation of a charge on any securities of the said classes.

2. The owners of any securities of the said classes shall before the expiration of one month from the date of this Order make a return to the Bank of England, or to a representative in Jersey of the Bank of England (on a form which may be obtained from any branch of a bank or any stockbroker in the United Kingdom or in Jersey) giving the following particulars with respect to those securities, that is to say,
 - (a) The full name and address of the owner by whom or on whose behalf the Return is made,
 - (b) A description of the security in full,
 - (c) The nominal amount of the security,
 - (d) The place where the security is deposited,
 - (e) The full name and address of the person for whose account the security is held (if other than the owner making the return).

CURRENCY RESTRICTIONS EXEMPTION ORDER, 1939.

The Treasury, in pursuance of their power under Regulation 3 of the Defence (Finance) Regulations, 1939 (which imposes restrictions, inter alia, on the export of foreign currency), by order to make exemptions from that Regulation, and of all other powers enabling them in that behalf, hereby make the following Order:—

1. There are hereby exempted from the said Regulation all transactions which would be excluded from the operation thereof if the last two references in subparagraph (b) of paragraph (1) of that Regulation to the United Kingdom and the Isle of Man included references to every part of His Majesty's dominions, except Canada, Newfoundland and Hong Kong, to

every territory in respect of which a mandate on behalf of the League of Nations has been accepted by His Majesty, and is being exercised by His Majesty's Government in the United Kingdom or in any Dominion, and every British Protectorate or protected state.

2. The Interpretation Act, 1889, applies to the interpretation of this Order as it applies to the interpretation of an Act of Parliament.

3. This Order may be cited as the Currency Restrictions Exemption Order, 1939.
