ORDER by the Secretary for Scotland, under Section 108 of the Local Government (Scotland) Act, 1889, relative to the Parish of Kippen, in the County of Stirling.

Whereas by Section 77 of the Local Government (Scotland) Act, 1889, it is enacted that in order to give effect to the provision of the said Act, that (except as in the said Section provided) every County shall be divided into Districts for the purposes of the management and maintenance of highways, and the administration of the laws relating to the public health, the County Council shall, at their first Meeting in the month of May next after the passing of the Act, and thereafter from time to time, divide the County into Districts, in such manner that each District shall comprise a group of Electoral Divisions, and that each Parish, so far as within the County, shall be wholly included in one District:

And whereas the Parish of Kippen, in the County of Stirling, consists of two detached and wholly discontinuous parts, separated from each other by an intersecting portion of the County of Perth, and the said two parts are situated at such distance from each other as to make it inexpedient that the same should be included in the same District:

And whereas by Section 108, sub-section 2, of the said Act, it is enacted that the Secretary for

Scotland, on the application of a County Council or Provisional Council, may, within six months after the day fixed for the first Election of Councillors of such Council, from time to time make such Orders as appear to him to be necessary for bringing the Act into full operation as respects the County so applying; and such Orders may modify any enactment in the said Act, or in any other Act, whether general or local and personal, so far as may appear to the Secretary for Scotland necessary for the said purpose:

And whereas the Provisional County Council of the said County of Stirling have made application to the Secretary for Scotland to make an Order modifying the enactment in Section 77 of the said Act, to the effect and extent after mentioned:

Therefore the Secretary for Scotland, in virtue of the powers conferred upon him by Section 108 of the said Act, hereby orders that, notwithstanding the provisions of Section 77 of the said Act, it shall be lawful for the County Council of the County of Stirling, until the Boundaries Commissioners appointed by the said Act shall have dealt with the said Parish of Kippen, and until their orders with respect thereto shall have been confirmed in manner provided by Section 49 of said Act, to resolve that the two detached parts of the said Parish of Kippen, in the County of Stirling, shall, for the purposes of the division of the said County into Districts under the said 77th Section of the said Act, be considered as forming parts of the Parishes of Gargunnoch and Balfron respectively.

Whereas it has been represented to the Secretary for Scotland by the Provisional Council of the County of Ross and Cromarty that, in order to bring the Local Government (Scotland) Act, 1889, into full operation as respects that County, it is necessary that, under the powers conferred on him by Section 108 (2) of the said Act, he should make an Order modifying the provisions contained in Sections 16, 17, and 77 (1) of the said Act in

regard to the formation of Districts for the purposes in the last cited Section mentioned:

Now, therefore, the Secretary for Scotland hereby makes the Order following:—

The 'Lews District' and the 'Stornoway District,' as defined by Section 79 of the Ross and Cromarty Roads Act, 1866, shall, from and after the 1st day of May 1890, be deemed to be Districts of the County of Ross and Cromarty in the same manner, to the same effect, and for the same purposes, as if they had been formed into Districts by the County Council of that County, in pursuance of and subject to the provisions of Sections 16, 17, and 77 (1) of the Local Government (Scotland) Act, 1889.
