# PRESENT.

'The QUEEN's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

THEREAS by an Act passed in the Session of Parliament held in the fifty-second and fifty-third years of Her Majesty's reign, intituled ' An Act for the better Administration and Endow-'ment of the Universities of Scotland,' Commissioners are constituted, styled the Scottish University Commissioners:

And whereas it is further enacted in the Act aforesaid, section 13, that 'The powers of the ' Commissioners shall be in force until the first day of January one thousand eight hundred and ' ninety-two, but it shall be lawful for Her Majesty ' from time to time, by Order in Council, to continue the same for such time as Her Majesty 'thinks fit':

And whereas in pursuance of the said Act, the powers of the Commissioners have from time to time been continued until the first day of January one thousand eight hundred and ninety-five:

And whereas it is expedient that the powers of the Scottish University Commissioners shall be further continued:

Now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, is pleased to order, and it is hereby ordered, that the powers of the Scottish University Commissioners shall be in force

until the first day of January one thousand eight hundred and ninety-six.

#### PRESENT.

The QUEEN's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

HEREAS by the eleventh section of 'The VV Volunteer Act, 1863,' it is amongst other things enacted that 'Her Majesty in Council 'may from time to time declare what is requisite 'to entitle a Volunteer to be deemed an efficient 'Volunteer by an Order in Council defining for 'that purpose the extent of attendance at drill to 'be given by the Volunteer, and the course of 'instruction to be gone through by him, and the degree of proficiency in drill and instruction to 'be attained by him and his Corps, such pro-ficiency to be judged of by the Inspecting 'Officer at the Annual Inspection of the Corps, 'or otherwise, as by Order in Council is from 'time to time directed,' and that 'the draft of 'any scheme to be from time to time submitted 'to Her Majesty in Council for approval under the present section shall have been laid before 'both Houses of Parliament for one lunar month 'at least, either before or after, or partly before 'and partly after, the passing of this Act during 'the present, or for the like period, during any 'subsequent Session of Parliament before such

Scheme receives the approval of her Majesty in 'Council.'

And whereas it is deemed expedient that the Order in Council, bearing date the thirty-first day of July one thousand eight hundred and eighty, declaring what is requisite to entitle a Volunteer to be deemed an efficient Volunteer, be amended so far as relates to the particulars set forth in the Schedule hereof, a draft of which Schedule was, on the twenty-first day of June last, laid before both Houses of Parliament in the words therein mentioned and contained, and one lunar month having elapsed since that time, the amendments of the Scheme of Efficiency for which provision is made in the said Schedule have this day been submitted to Her Majesty in Council for Her approval thereof.

Now, therefore, Her Majesty having this day taken the said amendments into consideration, doth, in pursuance and exercise of the power in Her Majesty by the said Act of Parliament in that behalf vested, and by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, hereby amend, in the words of the said Schedule, the aforesaid Order in Council of the thirty-first day of July one thousand eight hundred and eighty, and both declare Her Royal approval of the amendments.

# SCHEDULE referred to in the foregoing Order in Council.

AMENDMENTS of the Scheme relative to the Efficiency of Volunteers in force under Her Majesty's Order in Council, dated thirty-first July one thousand eight hundred and eighty, made under the provisions of the Volunteer Act, 1863, or Orders since issued in amendment thereof.

- (1) To add to the existing Certificates of Efficiency for Volunteers of the several arms of the Volunteer Force, a special Certificate for Members of Volunteer Brigade Bearer Companies, in the words of Schedule A hereof.
- (2) To vary the terms of the Certificate of Efficiency for Sergeants of Volunteer Divisions of Submarine Miners, Royal Engineers, and of the Certificate of Efficiency for Non-Commissioned Officers of rank lower than that of Sergeant, and for Sappers, as shown in the Certificates attached in the words of Schedule B and C hereof.

#### SCHEDULE A.

#### CERTIFICATE OF EFFICIENCY.

FOR VOLUNTEER BRIGADE BEARER COMPANIES

I hereby certify:

Squad drills, at which not less than four rank and file are present, may be reckoned when necessary to complete the number of Company Drills. When counted, the number of Bearer Company, Company, and Squad Drills respectively attended must be stated on the Certificate granted to the Volunteer.

To constitute a Bearer Company or a Company Drill reckoning towards efficiency, twelve at least of all ranks per Company must be present, of whom not less than two must be Officers and Sergeants.

CONDITIONS OF EFFICIENCY FOR NON-COMMIS-SIONED OFFICERS AND SAPPERS.

Recruits.—Non-Commissioned Officers and Sappers with under two years' service, may be returned as efficient, who have attended 78 submarine mining drills and the continuous training for eight days. They shall pass the test examination previously specified (either at the end of their first or second year of service) before being classed as 'trained men.'

Trained Men.—Non-Commissioned Officers and Sappers with over one year's service, who have passed the test examination previously specified may be returned as efficient, provided that they shall have attended the continuous training for eight days, and 78 submarine mining drills.

Experts.—Non - Commissioned Officers and Sappers with over three years' efficient service, who have passed the test examination for experts, may be returned as efficient, provided that they shall have attended the continuous training for eight days, and 48 submarine mining drills, or the complete period of fifteen days' continuous training and 10 submarine mining drills.

Special Exemptions. — Non - Commissioned Officers and Sappers specially exempted from attendance at the continuous training under the provisions of the Volunteer Regulations, may have their certificates granted, provided that they shall have attended the following number of drills, which may be counted by attendance during a portion of the camp, at whole-day or half-day parades, or at hourly drills.

Recruits.—90 drills. Trained Men.—90 drills. Expert Men.—60 drills.

#### Notes.

Drills.—A submarine mining drill is one hour's actual submarine mining work. Periods of continuous work of not less than  $1\frac{1}{2}$ , 2,  $2\frac{1}{2}$ , 3, and  $3\frac{1}{2}$  hours, may be reckoned as equivalent numbers and fractions of drills towards efficiency.
