BY THE KING A PROCLAMATION FOR A GENERAL FAST.

GEORGE R.

E, taking into our most ferious consideration the ind ration the just and necessary war in which we are engaged, and putting our trust in ALMIGHTY GOD that he will graciously blefs our arms, both by fea and land, have refolved, and do, by and with the advice of our Privy Council, hereby command, that a public day of falling and humiliation be observed throughout that part of our kingdom of Great Britain called Scotland, on Thursday the 20th day of October next, that so both we and our people may humble ourselves before ALMIGHTY GOD, in order to obtain pardon of our fins, and in the most devout and folemn manner, fend up our prayers and fupplications to the DIVINE MAJESTY, for a verting those heavy judgments which our manifold provocations have most justly deserved; and for imploring his bleffing and affiftance on our arms for the restoration of peace, and prosperity to us and our dominions: And we do strictly charge and command, that the faid public fast be reverently and devoutly observed by all our loving subjects in Scotland, as they tender the fayour of ALMIGHTY God, and would avoid his wrath and indignation: and upon pain of fuch punishment as we may justly inflict on all fuch as contenn, and neglect the performance of fo religious and negett the performance of the gious and neceffary a duty—our will is therefore, and we charge, that this our proclamation feen, ye forthwith pass to the Market-cross of Edinburgh, and all other places needful, and there, in our name and authority, make publication hereof, that none pretend ignorance: And our will and pleasure is, that our Solicitor do cause printed copies hereof to be fent to the Sheriffs of the feveral shires, Stewarts of stewartries, and Bailiffs 1

of regalities, and their clerks, whom we ordain I to see the same published; and we appoint them to fend copies hereof to the feveral parish churches within their bounds, that upon the Lord's day immediately preceding the day above mentioned, the same may be published, and read from the pulpits, immediately after divine fervice.

Given at our Court at St James's, the fourteenth day of September, one thoufand eight hundred and three, in the forty-third year of our reign.

Copy of a Letter from Rear-Admiral Sir John Thomas Duckworth, K. B. Commander in Chief of his Majesty's ships and vessels at Jamaica, to Sir Evan Repean, Bart. dated at Port Royal, the 14th of July 1803.

Since my letters, with the various details of fervice, by the Queen Charlotte packet, his Ma-JESTY's ship Cumberland arrived from cruizing off St Domingo with the French frigate Creole, taken by the fquadron under CAPTAIN BAYNflus, for the particulars of which transaction I fhall refer the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty to his letter, as also to CAPAIN BRIS-BANE's, for the capture of La Mignonne, mentioned in my letter of the 3d, fince when the fquadron has fent in the national brig L'Aiguille, of eight guns, cotter built, and very old; also the Vigilant brig, of 18 guns, new, and a fine vessel; there are likewise two schooners, La Superieure and Le Poisson Volant, both coppered, and very fine vessels.

His Majesty's ship Cumberland, between Jean Rabel and Cape Nichola Mole, 30th June 1803.

Having parted with the convoy, as I had the informing you in my letter of yesterhonour of day, I stretched in with the squadron, during the night, for St Domingo; foon after day light a large tail was feen near the Fortugas, fleering down Cape Nichola Mole, and from the cut of

fails I judged her to be a French ship of war; the Cumberland, with the Vanguard, were foon close up to her, the latter on the starboard side, and the former on the larboard bow; in this position she received a few shot from the Vagnuard, and, having fired one, struck to his MAJESTY'S squadron, and was immediately taken possession of. She proved to be the Creole, a remarkable fine national French frigate of 44 gnns, carrying 18 pounders, and commanded by CITIZEN LE BASTARD, from Cape Francois bound to Port-au-Prince, at fea one day, having GENERAL MORGAN (the fecond in command at St Domingo) and Staff, with 530 troops on board, and crew of the frigate confifting only of 150 men, two or whom were badly wounded. While we were taking possession of the prize, a small national schooner, commanded by a Lieutenant, came in to the fquadron and was taken; she came from Care Francois, and bound to Port-au-Prince, having on board 100 blood hounds from Cuba, intended to accompany the army ferving against I have the honour to be, &c. the blacks.

Extract of a letter from Captain Biffell, of his Majesty's fhip Racoon, to Rear Admiral Sr John Thomas Duckworth, K. B.

Kacoon, off the East End of Jamaica,

SIR, 16th July, 1803.

I beg leave to acquaint you, that at half past eleven on Monday morning the 11th inst. while working between the island of Guapaba and St Domingo, I observed a French national brig lying at anchor in Leogane Roads, and immediately bore up for her. On approaching I found them preparing to receive us with springs on their cables, &c. At a quarter before three (P.M.) I anchored with springs within 30 yards of him, and

immediately commenced an action, which was continued on both fides for 30 minutes, when the ly cut and followed her; and about ten minutes more of well-directed fire, we fo completely unrigged her that she struck her colours, and called out that they had furrendered. We were obliged to anchor again immediately to prevent driving on shore. She proves to be Le Lodi, pierced for 20 guns, but had only 10 mounted, commanded by M. PIERRE ISAAC TOUPIER, Capitaine de frigate. Our fails and rigging are a good deal cut, but I am happy to fay I had not a man kill. ed; and the only person wounded is Mr Tho.
MAS GILL, master's mate, whose left arm was carried off by a shot; a very worthy promising young man, who has ferved his time in the navy, and will, if he survives, do credit to your patronage. The loss of the enemy is one killed and 13 or 14 wounded, by their account.

The conduct of Mr JAMES ALEXANDER GOR. DON, the First Lieutenant, on this, as well as many other recent occasions, has been highly exemplary and praife-worthy; and I have much pleafure in informing you, that the whole of the officers and ship's company behaved fully to my

fatisfaction.

I have the honour to inform you, that his Majesty's ship under my command last night captured the French privateer La Chiffonette, of fourteen guns and eighty men. She has been twenty-fix days from Bourdeaux, and has captured a brig belonging to Jersey, from Santa Ciuz bound to Hamburgh, which has been since recaptured by his MAJESTY's ship Endymion. She fails remarkably falt, has been chased by several frigates, and once by this ship.

When the Chiffonette was first discovered she was in the act of boarding an English brig, but quitted her on our approach .- I am, &c.
