NOTICE.

AN Application by Petition to the Sheriff of Aberdeen, Kincardine, and Banff at Aberdeen, has been presented by Samuel Christie, senior, residing in Gordon Terrace, Dyce, and nine other householders, within the meaning of the Burgh Police (Scotland) Act, 1892, resident in the area after described, praying the said Sheriff—

(1) To appoint and direct a proper person to ascertain and report the number of the population of the area comprised within the following boundaries, viz.:—Commencing at the point at which the Great North of Scotland Railway Company's main line crosses the Farburn, and proceeding thence down the Farburn to a point opposite the extreme east point of the farm of Upper Glen; thence by a straight line extending to two hundred and sixty yards or thereby to said east point of Upper Glen Farm; thence along the boundary of Upper Glen Farm to the bed of the Old Canal; thence in a straight line to the Berry Moss Road on the farm of Mains of Dyce; thence along said road to junction thereof with the Aberdeen and Old Meldrum Turnpike Road; thence in a straight line westward to the line of the Formartine and Buchan Railway at a point thereon three hundred and ninety yards north-east of the bridge which carries the Dyce Road across said Railway; thence in a straight line in a south-westerly direction to the Great North of Scotland Railway where the same is crossed by the road leading from the Dyce Road to the farm of Raiths; thence following the west boundary of that Railway to the burn leading to Meikle Dyce, and keeping along that burn a distance of four hundred yards or thereby to a point directly opposite the extreme south-west point of Butler's Croft; thence in a straight line to the Farburn to said last-mentioned point; and thence along the Farburn to the starting point; all as delineated on the Plan thereof produced with the said Petition, which area forms a populous place within the meaning of the "Burgh Police (Scotland) Act, 1892," and is commonly known as the Village of DYCE, and thereafter to determine whether the area included in the said boundaries, or any part thereof, considering the number of dwelling-houses within it and the density of the population, is in substance a town, and is suitable for being formed into a Police Burgh; and on the Court being satisfied on these points, to define, in a written Deliverance, the boundaries of the said populous place: (2) to find and declare that the said populous place, as so defined, is a Burgh within the meaning of the said Act: (3) to grant Warrant to record the said application and the Deliverances thereon in the books of the Court: and (4) to find and declare that the whole expenses incurred by the Pursuers and the Court in carrying out the proceedings under the said Petition shall be defrayed out of the Burgh General Assessment to be levied within the said Burgh, in terms of the said Act.

Upon which Petition the Sheriff has pronounced a Deliverance, of date 7th July 1897, ordering advertisement in terms of the said Act, and directing all persons desirous of opposing the prayer of the Petition, or to be heard in relation thereto, to lodge a Notice of Appearance in the hands of the Clerk of Court at Aberdeen, within seven days from the latest date of intimation, appointing the Plan referred to in the Petition to remain in the hands of the Clerk of Court at Aberdeen for inspection until further order; appointing James Bowman, Registrar of Births, &c., Dyce, to ascertain the number of the population of the area comprised

within the boundaries proposed for the said Burgh, and to report *quam primum*; and assigning as a Diet for hearing all parties interested the 4th of August next, at ten o'clock forenoon, within the Sheriff Court House of Aberdeen.

BURGH OF NORTH BERWICK.

EXTENSION OF BOUNDARIES.

A PETITION having been presented by the Commissioners of the Burgh of North Berwick in the Sheriff Court of the Sheriffdom of the Lothians and Peebles at Haddington, praying the Court, in terms of section 11 of "The Burgh Police (Scotland) Act, 1892," to extend the boundaries of the Burgh of North Berwick as follows, viz.:—

So as to embrace the site of the Slaughter-House and pertinents which the said Commissioners are at present in course of erecting, situated on the south-west side of the road leading from North Berwick to Dunbar, all as delineated and coloured pink in the plan produced with said Petition, and bounded as follows, *videlicet*:—On the south by ground belonging to Sir Walter Hamilton Dalrymple, of North Berwick, Baronet, and along which it extends from point A to the point B on said plan two hundred and sixty-five feet or thereby; on the west by ground also belonging to the said Sir Walter Hamilton Dalrymple, Baronet, along which it extends from the point B to the point C on said plan one hundred and eighty-five feet six inches or thereby; on the north by the bank dividing the said site from the mill burn, along which it extends from the point C to the point D on said plan one hundred and seventy feet or thereby; and on the north-east by the public road leading from North Berwick to Dunbar, along which it extends from the point D to the point A on said plan one hundred and sixty-two feet six inches or thereby.

Or such other boundaries as may appear to the Court just and proper, and to define, in a written Deliverance on that application, the extended boundaries of the said Burgh for the purposes of "The Burgh Police (Scotland) Act, 1892," and to grant Warrant to record that application and the Deliverance thereon in the books of Court,—his Lordship, Sheriff Rutherford, has pronounced the following Deliverance on said Petition, viz.:—

"*Edinburgh, 1st July 1897.*—The Sheriff having considered the foregoing Petition, appoints a copy thereof and of this Deliverance to be served on the Town-Clerk of North Berwick and the County Clerk of Haddington; further, appoints intimation of the import of the said Petition, with a copy of this Deliverance, to be made forthwith by public advertisement once in each of the Edinburgh Gazette, Haddingtonshire Courier, and Haddingtonshire Advertiser newspapers; further, the Sheriff appoints all concerned to meet with him within the Sheriff Court House at Haddington, on Tuesday the 27th day of July 1897, at 10.30 o'clock A.M., for the purpose of hearing parties with regard to the said application and considering any objections that may be stated thereto; and appoints the plan produced, showing the proposed extension of the Burgh boundaries of North Berwick, to remain in the hands of the Sheriff Clerk at Haddington for inspection of all concerned."
