And whereas Resolutions for the creation of redeemable stock under the said Acts were adopted by the County Council of the County of Lanark at a meeting held on the 4th day of August 1897, and were confirmed by the said County Council at a subsequent meeting held after the Resolutions had been published in the prescribed manner, and after the expiration of the prescribed time, on the 15th day of September 1897.

And whereas these Resolutions have been submitted to me for confirmation, with or without modifications, in terms of the aforesaid Acts.

Now, therefore, I, the Right Honourable Alexander Hugh, Lord Balfour of Burleigh, Her Majesty's Secretary for Scotland, do hereby confirm the said Resolutions in the form in which they appear in the Schedule appended to this Order.
