ORDER OF THE BOARD OF  
AGRICULTURE.

(DATED 1ST OCTOBER 1896.)

The Board of Agriculture, by virtue and in exercise of the powers in them vested under the Diseases of Animals Acts, 1894 and 1896, and of every other power enabling them in this behalf, do order, and it is hereby ordered, as follows:—

1. The sale or exposure for sale of any swine in or at J. Swan & Sons' sale-yard, in the Burgh of Perth, is hereby prohibited.

2. If a pig is sold or exposed for sale in or at the said sale-yard at Perth in contravention of this Order, the owner and the lessee and the occupier thereof, and the owner or consignee of each pig so sold or exposed, and the person so selling or exposing the same, and the auctioneer, if any, or other person conducting the sale at such sale-yard, and the purchaser thereof of any pig so sold or exposed in contravention of this Order, such purchaser knowing the pig to be sold or exposed for sale in contravention as aforesaid, shall, each according to and in respect of his own acts and defaults, be deemed guilty of an offence against the Diseases of Animals Act, 1894.
