LOCAL GOVERNMENT (SCOTLAND) ACTS.

Alteration of Parish Areas.

ORDER No. XXXIX.

Parish of Barony and City Parish of Glasgow
(New Parish of Glasgow).

WHEREAS the Parish Council of the City Parish of Glasgow recently made a Representation to me craving the issue of an Order uniting their Parish and the Parish of Barony into one Parish;

And whereas I appointed Sir John Cheyne, Q.C., to hold a local inquiry in regard to the subject matter of the said Representation, and the said Sir John Cheyne has held a local inquiry, and has made a Report to me, which I have duly considered;

And whereas by communication with the General Board of Lunacy for Scotland, I have ascertained that, in the event of the said two Parishes being united into one Parish, they would approve of the area of the United Parish being made a separate Lunacy District, and of the Parish Council of such Parish being appointed to be the District Board of such District;

And whereas I caused the proposed Order to be published in the Edinburgh Gazette of the 2nd September 1898:

Now, therefore, I, the Right Honourable Alexander Hugh, Lord Balfour of Burleigh, Her Majesty's Secretary for Scotland, do, in virtue of the powers conferred upon the Secretary for Scotland by the Local Government (Scotland) Acts, order and direct as follows:—

1. The City Parish of Glasgow and the Parish of Barony shall, from and after the date of transfer

after mentioned, cease to be separate Parishes, and shall be united into one Parish, which shall be known and designated as the Parish of Glasgow.

2. The property, assets, debts, liabilities, and servants of the Parish Council of the City Parish of Glasgow, and those of the Parish Council of the Parish of Barony, other than the Asylum property at Woodilee, and the debts, liabilities, and servants connected therewith, shall be and become, as from the date of transfer after mentioned, the property, assets, debts, liabilities, and servants of the Parish Council of the Parish of Glasgow.

3. The number of Parish Councillors for the Parish of Glasgow shall, until otherwise lawfully determined, be thirty-one, and of these twenty-seven shall be elected for the burghal portion and four for the landward portion of the Parish. The Landward Committee, which falls to be elected on the first Tuesday of December next for the Parish of Barony, shall, as from the date of transfer after mentioned, be the Landward Committee of the Parish of Glasgow.

4. The first election of Parish Councillors for the burghal part of the Parish of Glasgow shall take place on a day (hereinafter termed the day of election) in December next—not being earlier than the fifteenth day of said month—to be fixed by the Local Government Board for Scotland, and shall be conducted by such person as the Parish Councils of the City of Glasgow Parish and the Parish of Barony may, at a joint meeting to be held prior to the fifteenth day of November next, appoint to be Returning Officer, or, failing such appointment, by such person as may be named by the Local Government Board for Scotland. The Parish Councillors so elected, together with the Parish Councillors duly appointed for the landward portion

of the Parish of Barony, shall, as from the date of transfer after mentioned, be the Parish Council of the Parish of Glasgow.

5. The five Parish Wards into which the City Parish of Glasgow is at present divided, and the nine Parish Wards into which the burghal portion of the Parish of Barony is at present divided shall be held and deemed to be Parish Wards of the Parish of Glasgow, but that without prejudice to the power of the Town Council of Glasgow at any time after the issue of this Order, to redivide the burghal portion of the Parish of Glasgow into such and so many Parish Wards as they may by Order under their seal determine, and to assign the number of Parish Councillors to be elected by the Parish electors in each Parish Ward, provided always that, if any alteration of the Parish Wards is to be made so as to take effect at the first election of Parish Councillors, it shall be made not later than the 1st day of November next. In the event of New Parish Wards being formed in the burghal portion of the Parish of Glasgow on or prior to the last mentioned date, the City Assessor shall, within fourteen days from the date of the Town Council's Order, arrange in the Parish Wards as defined in the Order the names of the persons qualified to be Parish electors therein respectively, and shall publish the lists of qualified electors so arranged in the same manner as the lists of municipal electors are published. He shall also furnish to the Returning Officer a sufficient number of copies of such lists for the purposes of the election, and the expenditure incurred by him in the discharge of the duties hereby laid upon him shall be a charge upon the poor rate levied in the Parish of Glasgow.

6. The Parish Council of the Parish of Glasgow shall enter into office on the Tuesday first occurring after the day of election, which Tuesday shall be held to be the date of transfer under this Order. The present Parish Councillors for the City Parish of Glasgow, and the burghal portion of the Parish of Barony, shall continue in office until the said date of transfer.

7. A meeting of the Parish Council of the Parish of Glasgow shall be held on the date of transfer before mentioned at such place and hour as shall be determined by the Returning Officer appointed under this Order, and intimated by him in writing to each Parish Councillor, and such meeting shall be deemed to be the statutory meeting of the Parish Council for the current year.

8. Every rate imposed, and every requisition for sums of money made by or on behalf of the Parish Council of the City Parish of Glasgow or the Parish Council of the Parish of Barony, prior to the date of transfer before mentioned, may be levied and enforced as if the rate had been originally imposed and the requisition had been originally made by or in name of the Parish Council of the Parish of Glasgow.

9. From and after the date of transfer before mentioned, the City of Glasgow Lunacy District and the Barony Lunacy District, both constituted by Order of the General Board of Lunacy, dated 6th July 1888, and approved by the Secretary for Scotland on the 25th July 1888, shall be united and form one Lunacy District, to be known and designated as the Glasgow Lunacy District; the Parish Council of the Parish of Glasgow shall be the Board of said new District; and the

property, assets, debts, liabilities, and servants of the City of Glasgow Lunacy District Board, as well as the Asylum property at Woodilee, presently belonging to the Parish Council of the Parish of Barony, together with the debts, liabilities, and servants connected therewith, shall be and become the property, assets, debts, liabilities, and servants of the Glasgow Lunacy District Board.

10. Nothing contained herein shall affect the rights of creditors or of persons having vested interests, or shall render the area included within the Parish of Glasgow liable in a greater proportion of the assessment for Asylums in the original Glasgow Lunacy District than is contributed therefrom at present.
