THE Queen has been pleased, by Warrant under Her Majesty's Royal Sign Manual, to appoint George Wardlaw Burnet, Esquire, Advocate, M.A., B.L., to be Sheriff-Substitute of the Sheriffdom of Aberdeen, Kincardine, and Banff, in the room of William Alexander Brown, Esquire, resigned.

The Queen has been pleased to order a Congé d'Élire to pass the Great Seal of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland empowering the Dean and Chapter of the Cathedral Church of Bangor to elect a Bishop of that See, the same being void by the resignation of the Right Reverend Father in God Doctor Daniel Lewis Lloyd, late Bishop thereof, and declared vacant by Her Majesty's Order in Council; and Her Majesty has been pleased to recommend to the said Dean and Chapter the Very Reverend Watkin Herbert Williams, D.D., Dean of the Cathedral Church of St. Asaph, to be by them elected Bishop of the said See of Bangor.

## FACTORY AND WORKSHOP.

DAINGEROUS TRADES:—THE GLAZING OF BRICKS WITH USE OF LEAD.

Certificate of the Secretary of State, dated the 17th December 1898, under the Factory and

Workshop Act, 1891, that a certain Process is Dangerous or Injurious to Health.

WHEREAS by Section 8 (1) of the Factory and Workshop Act, 1891, it is enacted that—

“ Where the Secretary of State certifies that in his opinion any machinery or process or particular description of manual labour used in a factory or workshop (other than a domestic workshop) is dangerous or injurious to health, or dangerous to life or limb, either generally or in the case of women, children, or any other class of persons, or that the provision for the admission of fresh air is not sufficient, or that the quantity of dust generated or inhaled in any factory or workshop is dangerous or injurious to health, the Chief Inspector may serve on the occupier of the factory or workshop a notice in writing, either proposing such special rules, or requiring the adoption of such special measures, as appear to the Chief Inspector to be reasonably practicable and to meet the necessities of the case.”

Now, I, the Right Honourable Sir Matthew White Ridley, Baronet, one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, do hereby certify that, in my opinion, the process of—

GLAZING BRICKS WITH THE USE OF LEAD is dangerous or injurious to health.
