The Lady who proposes to present another must send in writing the name of such Lady to the Lord Chamberlain's Office, not later than *two days* previous to the Drawing Room, in order that the Lord Chamberlain may submit the name to Her Majesty, when, if it be approved, Presentation Cards will be forwarded.

Printed Forms for this purpose can be obtained at the Lord Chamberlain's Office.

ORDER OF THE BOARD OF AGRICULTURE.

(DATED 23RD APRIL 1900.)

FOREIGN ANIMALS AMENDMENT ORDER OF 1900 (No. 2).

The Board of Agriculture, by virtue and in exercise of the powers in them vested under the Diseases of Animals Acts, 1894 and 1896, and of every other power enabling them in this behalf, do order, and it is hereby ordered, as follows:—

Disinfection of Persons and Clothes in certain cases.

1. Every person before landing in Great Britain from a vessel in which there is, or during the voyage has been, any animal affected with foot-and-mouth disease, shall, unless he lands at a Foreign Animals Wharf, effectually wash and disinfect himself, and change or effectually disinfect his clothes, so as to prevent the introduction or spreading of foot-and-mouth disease by him or his clothes.

Order to be read with Foreign Animals Order of 1896.

2. This Order shall be read as part of the Foreign Animals Order of 1896, and Article 31 (Offences) of that Order shall apply to offences against this Order.

Short Title.

3. This Order may be cited as the FOREIGN ANIMALS (AMENDMENT) ORDER OF 1900 (No. 2).
