LOCH LEVEN WATER POWER.

Incorporation of Company.—Works for Water Works, Water and Hydraulic Power and Electrical Energy, Construction of Reservoirs, Embankments, Dams, Aqueducts and other Water Works and Works in the Counties of Inverness and Argyll; Raising Level of and Impounding Water in Loch Eilde Mor and other Lochs, and the Diversion, Impounding, &c., of Water from such Lochs and from other Lochs and Streams; Purchase of Lands by Compulsion and Agreements and Consequent Powers; Stopping Up and Interference with Roads and Footpaths; Compensation Water, &c.; Lands for and Constructions of Generating Stations and Works; Apparatus for Developing Water Power and Hydraulic Power, and for Generating, Storing, and Distributing Electrical Energy; Provisions as to Superfluous Lands; Improvements in Navigation of Loch Leven; Agreements with Corporations, Local Authorities, &c.; Sale of Water in Bulk or by Measure; Confirmation of Agreements; Issue or Raising of Capital and Powers connected therewith; Incorporation, Amendments, and Repeal of Acts, &c.; Powers Necessary, Consequent, or Incident; and other Powers and Purposes.

NOTICE is hereby given that application is intended to be made to the Secretary for Scotland on or before the 17th day of April next by the British Aluminium Company Limited, whose Registered Office is at 9 Victoria Street, Westminster, London, S.W., or by a Company subsidiary thereto in connection therewith (either of whom are, save and except where specifically mentioned hereinafter, called the Company) for a Provisional Order (hereinafter called "The Order") for the following or some of the following objects, powers, and purposes (that is to say)—

1. To incorporate a Company, and to empower such Company or the British Aluminium Company Limited, to make, form, lay down, construct, maintain, use, and work, with all requisite or necessary incidental or consequential works, a Water Power or Hydraulic Power and Electrical Generating Station or Stations, at or near the head of Loch Leven, in the County of Inverness, and to authorise the Company, during or after the construction of such works, to develop, produce, generate, store, supply, distribute, and sell Water Powers and Hydraulic Powers and

Electrical Energy on the lands and within the area hereinafter mentioned.

2. To empower the Company to make, maintain, and use in the Counties of Argyll and Inverness the following Waterworks and other works or some of them, or some part or parts thereof respectively, together with all proper works and conveniences in connection therewith, including embankments, bridges, roads, approaches, fences, ways, wells, pumping works, tanks, basins, gauges, dams, weirs, sluices, waste weirs, outlets, outfalls, adits, engines, tunnels, bye-channels, cuts, dredgings, shafts, aqueducts, culverts, conduits, drains, mains, pipes, syphons, water towers, or stand-pipes, telegraphs, telephones, tramways, and other means of communication, houses, buildings, apparatus and conveniences connected with the said works or any of them, or subsidiary, incident or consequent thereto, or necessary for conducting, inspecting, maintaining, repairing, managing, and using the same (that is to say):—

WORK NO. 1.—An embankment or dam for the purpose of raising and upholding the waters of the Loch Eilde Mor and Loch Eilde Beag, and thereby submerging lands in the Parish of Kilmallie, in the County of Inverness, to be situate wholly in the Parish of Kilmallie, in the County of Inverness, to be placed across the stream known as Alt na h'Eilde, now flowing out of the south-westerly end of the existing lake (at a point distant about 800 yards south-west of the outlet of the lake), and to commence on the easterly side of the said stream at a point distant about 85 yards, measured in a south-easterly direction from the centre of the said stream, and to extend thence in a straight line in a north-westerly direction across the said stream, and to terminate on the west side of the said stream at a point distant about 80 yards, measured in a north-westerly direction from the centre of the said stream, from which embankment the waters of the lake when raised will extend to a point about 6300 yards in a north-easterly direction, measured from the centre of the said embankment at its point of intersection with the said stream.

WORK NO. 2.—An aqueduct, tunnel, or conduit, to be situate wholly in the Parish of Kilmallie, in the County of Inverness, to commence on the northern side of the embankment Work No. 1 aforesaid, at a point distant about 50 yards, measured in a north-westerly direction from the point of intersection of the said embankment with the stream known as Alt na h'Eilde, and to terminate in the stream known as Alt na Fearnna at a point distant about 1050 yards, measured in a north-easterly direction from the junction of the said stream known as Alt na Fearnna with the River Leven.

WORK NO. 3.—An aqueduct, tunnel, conduit, or line or lines of pipes to be situate wholly in the Parish of Kilmallie, in the County of Inverness, to commence in or at the termination of aqueduct Work No. 2, and to terminate at a point distant about 700 yards measured in a north-westerly direction from the junction of the stream known as Alt na Fearnna with the River Leven, and about 700 yards measured in a

north-easterly direction from the centre of the bridge crossing the River Leven a short distance to the eastward of the house known as Kinloch Beg.

WORK No. 4.—An aqueduct, tunnel, conduit, or line or lines of pipes to be situate wholly in the Parish of Kilmallie, in the County of Inverness, to commence in or at the termination of aqueduct Work No. 3 aforesaid, and to terminate at a point distant about 220 yards measured in a south-westerly direction from the south-eastern corner of Kinlochmore shooting lodge, and about 290 yards measured in a north-easterly direction from the north-eastern corner of the house known as Kinloch Beg.

WORK No. 5.—An embankment or dam for the purpose of raising and upholding the waters of Loch a' Bhaillidh, Lochan na Salach Uidhre and Lochan Inbhir, and thereby submerging land in the Parishes of Kilmallie, in the County of Inverness, and Lismore and Appin, in the County of Argyll, to be placed across the River Blackwater, at a point distant about 650 yards measured in a north-westerly direction from the outlet of Lochan Inbhir, and to commence in the Parish of Lismore and Appin, in the County of Argyll, at a point distant about 520 yards measured in a south-westerly direction from the centre of the aforesaid River, to extend thence in a north-easterly direction in a straight line to the North Bank of the said River at the point of crossing the same and to extend thence in a north-easterly direction in a straight line, and to terminate in the Parish of Kilmallie, in the County of Inverness, at a point distant about 500 yards measured in a north-easterly direction from the northern bank of the said River, from which embankment the waters of the lake, when raised, will extend eastward to the west bank of the Allt Cam, in the Parish of Kilmallie.

WORK No. 6.—An aqueduct, tunnel, or conduit to be situate wholly in the parish of Kilmallie in the County of Inverness, to commence at the eastern side of the embankment of dam Work No. 5 aforesaid, at a point distant about 100 yards measured in a north-easterly direction from the point of intersection of the said embankment or dam with the centre of the River Blackwater, and about 634 yards measured in a north-westerly direction from the outlet of Lochan Inbhir, and to terminate at a point distant about 970 yards measured in a north-westerly direction from the junction of the stream known as Allt na h'Eilde with the River Leven, and about 1000 yards measured in a north-easterly direction from the north-eastern corner of Kinlochmore shooting lodge.

WORK No. 7.—An aqueduct, tunnel, conduit, or line or lines of pipes to be situate in the Parish of Kilmallie, in the County of Inverness, to commence in or at the termination of aqueduct Work No. 6 aforesaid, and to terminate at a point distant about 700 yards measured in a north-westerly direction from the junction of the stream known as Allt na Fearnna with the River Leven, and about 700 yards measured in a north-easterly direction from the centre of the bridge cross-

ing the River Leven, a short distance to the eastward of the house known as Kinloch Beg.

WORK No. 8.—An aqueduct, tunnel, conduit or line or lines of pipes to be situate wholly in the Parish of Kilmallie in the County of Inverness, to commence in or at the termination of aqueduct Work No. 7, and to terminate at a point distant about 220 yards measured in a south-westerly direction from the south-eastern corner of Kinlochmore shooting lodge, and about 270 yards measured in a north-easterly direction from the north-eastern corner of the house known as Kinloch Beg.

WORK No. 9.—An aqueduct, tunnel, or conduit to be situate wholly in the Parish of Kilmallie in the County of Inverness, to commence in or at the termination of aqueducts Works No. 4 and 8 respectively aforesaid, and to terminate in the River Leven at a point near its northern shore, distant about 330 yards measured in a south-westerly direction from the south-eastern corner of Kinlochmore shooting lodge.

3. To empower the Company to raise the level of the water in Loch Eilde Mor and Loch Eilde Beag, Loch a' Bhaillidh, Lochan na Salach Uidhre, and Lochan Inbhir, and to take, appropriate, impound, store, use, collect, abstract, divert, and distribute, for the purposes of the intended Order, the waters of the Blackwater River and the following streams flowing into it, or into the lochs through which it passes, that is to say:—Allt Molach, Allt an Ime, Allt a'Chait, Allt Coire Dubhbhig, Caochan an Daimh, Allt Cam, Allt an Lagain, Allt Coire, Dubh-mhoir, Allt nan Stop, Allt a' Mhadaidh, Allt Gob na Guileige, Allt nan Creige Nodha, Allt a' Choire Bhric Mhoir, Allt nan Losgann, Allt na h'Achlaise, Allt an Aighe, Ciaran Water Allt nam Fuaran, Allt a'Bhrich, Allt nan Cradh Leathad, Allt na Roinne Deirge, Allt an Inbhir, Allt a'Choire Chruaidh, Allt Choire Ghaiebh, Allt Lagan na Feithe, Loch Eilde Mor, and Loch Eilde Beag, and the following streams and their tributaries flowing into those lochs, that is to say, Allt na Slochdaich, Allt na Creige Deirge, Allt a' Choire Dhuibh Bhig, Allt a' Choire Odhair, Allt a' Mhill Bhig, Allt Riabhach, Allt Riabhach Beag, Allt Coire an Laoigh, Allt Leacann na Faire, Allt Seileach, Allt Slochdach Beag, and Allt na h'Eilde flowing out of Loch Eilde Mor, and all brooks, water springs, streams, and tributaries flowing into or arising within the said lochs and streams, or any of them, and flowing into or within the site of the intended reservoirs and other waterworks hereinbefore described.

4. To authorise the Company to deviate laterally from the lines of the several works hereinbefore described to the extent shown on the plans to be deposited as hereinafter mentioned, or as may be provided by the intended Order, and to deviate vertically from the levels shown on the sections to be deposited as hereinafter mentioned to any extent which may be provided by the intended Order, and also temporarily or permanently to use, cross over, or break up, alter, divert, and stop up highways and other roads, bridges, footpaths, bridle roads, sheep and cattle tracks and creeps, rivers, streams, brooks, drains, sewers, watercourses, telegraphic and telephonic apparatus, and gas, water, and

other pipes, and to carry conduits, aqueducts, pipes, and other works through, over, under, across, along, upon, or into the same within the parishes and places aforesaid as far as may be necessary or expedient for the purposes of making, maintaining, and using the several works before mentioned, or any of them, or any of the works and conveniences connected therewith, or of the intended Order.

5. To discontinue as public highways and to vest in the Company the site and soil of the portions of all public roads and footpaths shown upon the deposited plans as intended to be diverted or stopped up under the powers of the intended Order, and to extinguish all rights of way and other rights in or over any lands which shall be taken under the powers of the Order, and in the case of public roads and footpaths to provide for the maintenance and repair of the new or substituted portions of roads and footpaths by and at the expense of the Road Authorities or other persons respectively, who are for the time being legally liable for the repair and maintenance of the respective portions of roads and footpaths so diverted, or otherwise as may be prescribed by the intended Order.

6. To empower the Company to take and acquire compulsorily or by agreement, and to use and hold temporarily or permanently, lands, houses, rivers, lochs, waters, streams, burns, brooks, and other property or rights therein in the parishes and places aforesaid, or some of them, which may be required for the said works, and for sites for dwelling-houses and cottages for the officers and servants of the Company and the other purposes aforesaid, and of the intended order or rights of user thereof, easements, servitudes, privileges, powers or authorities in, over or under the same, and to empower the Company and owners of and other parties interested in such lands, houses, lochs, waters, streams, brooks, burns, and other property, and any companies, corporations, commissioners, trustees, and other bodies or persons, whether under legal disability or not to contract and agree for the acquisition by the Company of such lands, houses, lochs, waters, streams, brooks, burns, and other property or rights of user thereof, easements, servitudes, privileges, powers or authorities in, over or under the same absolutely or by way of disposition, feu, contract of ground annual, lease, in perpetuity, or otherwise, at such price to be paid if the Company see fit by the issue of fully paid shares in the capital of the Company, and subject to such feu duty, ground annual or rent, and for such other consideration as may be fixed upon, and to enter into and carry into effect all agreements, conveyances, dispositions, contracts of feu and of ground annual, leases and other deeds necessary for these purposes.

7. To make provision for compensating persons from whom water may be abstracted, or whose interests may be otherwise prejudiced by the works or operations of the Company, or some of them, by providing for the supply of compensation water; or in such other way or manner as the intended Order may prescribe, or as may be agreed on as suitable and convenient.

8. To authorise the Company at any time to discharge water from any of the works or lands into any available stream or watercourse, or into any stream or watercourse with which any of the works aforesaid may, or are intended to communicate; or into any stream or watercourse

crossed by an aqueduct or conduit, or line of pipes, and to make provisions for compensating all persons for any damage which may be caused by the exercise of such power.

9. To enable the Company to establish and maintain posts, wires, telegraphic, telephonic, or other apparatus, either upon their own undertaking, or in or upon any road adjacent thereto, or leading to or from the same, for the transmission of messages and communications, wholly or partially by means of electricity to, along, and through their works.

10. (a) That area of ground situated partly at the east and partly on the north side of Loch Leven, part of the estate of Callart and Mamore, in the Parish of Kilmallie and County of Inverness, and which area of ground is bounded as follows, viz.:—On the north side by other parts of the estate of Callart and Mamore, along which it extends in a straight line in a westerly direction from the centre of Allt Coire na Ba on the north side of the bridge carrying the road leading past Kinlochmore, for a distance of about 1400 yards or thereby to a point distant about 15 yards or thereby from the north side of the road aforesaid, whence it extends in a straight line in a southerly direction at right angles to the last named boundary, to the centre of Loch Leven, whence it passes in an easterly direction along the centre of the said loch and the centre of the River Leven, to a point distant about 250 yards or thereby measured in a south-easterly direction in a straight line from the centre of the bridge crossing the said river to the eastward of the house known as Kinloch Beg, whence it extends in a northerly direction to a point distant about 300 yards or thereby measured in a straight line from the centre of the River Leven, and about 350 yards or thereby measured in a south-easterly direction in a straight line from the south-eastern corner of Kinlochmore shooting lodge, whence it extends in a north-easterly direction in a straight line for about 480 yards or thereby to a point on the Allt na Fearn, distant about 667 yards or thereby measured in a northerly direction from the point where the said stream joins the River Leven, extending thence along the centre of Allt na Fearn to a point distant in a straight line about 165 yards or thereby up the stream, whence it extends in a south-westerly direction for a distance of 517 yards or thereby measured in a straight line to a point distant about 315 yards or thereby in a straight line measured in an easterly direction from the

south-eastern corner of Kinlochmore shooting lodge, whence it extends in a north-easterly direction for a distance of about 140 yards or thereby to a point on the fence of the policies of Kinlochmore shooting lodge, distant about 350 yards or thereby measured in a north-easterly direction from the south-eastern corner of the said lodge, whence it extends in a north-westerly direction in a straight line for a distance of about 433 yards or thereby to the point where the road from the said lodge through Bealach Cumhann crosses a small stream, whence it follows the centre of the said stream in a westerly direction to its point of junction with Allt a' Bhealaich Chumhainn, whence it follows the centre line of Allt a' Bhealaich Chumhainn to its point of junction with Allt Coire na Ba, whence it follows the centre line of Allt Coire na Ba to the bridge first herein-before mentioned.

- (b) That area of ground situated partly at the east end and partly on the south side of Loch Leven, part of the Estate of Appin, in the Parish of Lismore and Appin, and County of Argyll, and bounded as follows, viz.:—On the east by other parts of the Estate of Appin, along which it extends 150 yards or thereby, measured in a straight line due south from a point in the centre of the River Leven, situated 160 yards or thereby, measured in a straight line in an easterly direction from the bridge crossing the said river a short distance to the east of the said Kinloch Beg House; on the south by other parts of the Estate of Appin, along which it extends westward in a straight line 450 yards or thereby to a point on a stream 200 yards or thereby from its junction with the River Leven, and 170 yards or thereby, measured in a south-easterly direction from the south-eastern corner of Kinloch Beg House aforesaid; thereafter in a southerly direction for 150 yards or thereby, measured from point to point on the said stream; thereafter in a circular line westwards and north-westwards for a distance of 320 yards or thereby to a point 235 yards or thereby, measured in a south-westerly direction from the south-east corner of Kinloch Beg House aforesaid, and thence westwards in a straight line for a distance of 1500 yards or thereby to a stream near Creag Innis Torrain at a point 100 yards or thereby distant from the junction of the said stream with Loch Leven; on the west by other parts of the Estate of Appin, along which it extends down the said stream to its junction with Loch Leven, and thence prolonged to the centre of the loch in a north-westerly direction; and on the north by the centre line of Loch Leven and the River Leven.

To provide that the said lands shall be the area within which the Company may distribute, sell and supply on such terms and conditions as may be agreed upon between the Company and the Purchasers, water and water or hydraulic power and electrical energy for all purposes, and

to authorise the Company on such lands to construct, erect, maintain, and use houses, buildings, manufactories, wharves, landing places, piers, lay byes, and works, and a station or stations and plant for the development of water power and for generating and producing electrical energy, with all necessary engines, turbines, dynamos, apparatus, works, and conveniences.

11. To empower the Company to stop up so much of the road leading from North Ballachulish to Kinlochmore Lodge as is situate within the area of supply above described, and to extinguish all rights of way over the site of the same, and to vest the site thereof in the Company, and to stop up and discontinue all public and private foot-paths, bridle paths, drove paths, or other tracks or roads on, over, or across any of the lands to be acquired by the Company under the powers of the intended Order, or which will be submerged by the construction of the embankments, dams, or other works to be authorised by the intended Order, and to vest the site thereof in the Company and extinguish all public and private rights of way over the same.

12. To empower the Company to hold any lands which they may acquire under the authority of the intended Order, free from provisions of the Lands Clauses Consolidation (Scotland) Act, 1845, with respect to superfluous lands, and notwithstanding section 18 of the Water Works Clauses Act, 1847, to acquire by compulsion or agreement any mines or minerals under any lands which they may acquire, lease, or use, or through which any of the said works may pass, and also by agreement additional lands for the purposes of the intended Order.

13. To empower the Company to erect houses, buildings, wharves, landing places, and other works, and cottages on, and to sell, lease, or otherwise dispose of any lands and houses for the time being belonging to them, and to provide, and to make, and from time to time manufacture, sell, or let machinery, plant, and apparatus for the production, storage, regulation, use, and supply of water or hydraulic power and electrical energy, and to acquire and use patent rights for producing, storing, controlling, distributing, and measuring, or otherwise relating to the distribution of water or hydraulic power and the supply of electrical energy, or any processes in which electrical energy may be employed or utilised.

14. To empower the Company, with the consent of the Board of Trade, to dredge, widen, deepen, or to in any wise alter or vary any part of the tidal portion of Loch Leven, or to make, execute, and maintain any works therein which will or may be connected with the improvement of the navigation of the tidal waters of the said Loch.

15. To authorise the Company, on the one hand, and any local or sanitary authority, county, district, or parish council, corporation, company, trustees, bodies, persons or person (corporate or not corporate), on the other hand, to enter into or carry into effect and to vary or rescind contracts and agreements for the sale or supply of the Company from the intended works of water in bulk, by measure, or otherwise to any such authority, corporation, company, trustees, bodies, persons, or person for use either within or beyond the present or extended limits for the supply of water and water or hydraulic power or electrical energy on such terms and conditions as may be agreed between them or as the Order may prescribe,

and to authorise the Company to levy rates, rents, and charges, as may be prescribed by the Order.

16. To empower the Company to purchase, subscribe for, and hold shares or stock in any Company taking or agreeing to take lands or a supply of water power, hydraulic power, or electrical energy from the Company, or establishing any works on any of the lands of the Company, or to lend money on mortgage, bonds, or otherwise, to any corporation, company, firm, or person, taking or agreeing to take any such lands or supply, or establishing any such works, and to apply the capital of the Company for all or any of the purposes aforesaid.

17. To confer on the Company all such powers as may be necessary or useful for the carrying out of the purposes for which the Company is established, or as may be incidental thereto.

18. To confirm any agreement or agreements that have been or may be entered into for the acquisition of lands, water, water rights, or other property, or in connection therewith, and to authorise the Company to adopt, take over, and perform the same.

19. To empower the Company, on the one hand, and any Corporation, Local Authority, Company, or person, on the other hand, to enter into agreements with respect to all or any of the purposes of the intended Order.

20. To authorise the Company to raise Capital by the creation and issue of ordinary and preferential or other classes of shares or stock, and the issue of debenture stock, and by borrowing on mortgage or by all or any of those means.

21. To authorise the Company to issue and allot to the British Aluminium Company Limited, such ordinary, preferential, or other class or classes of shares or stock or debenture stock as consideration for the promotion of and obtaining the intended Order, and for the supervision of the construction of the works authorised thereby and for other services rendered by them from time to time as may be agreed in, about, or connected with the undertaking, or for the management of all or any of the affairs of the said undertaking as may be prescribed by the Order.

22. To enable the Company, out of moneys to be raised by them under the powers of the Order, to pay interest to shareholders on the sums which may be from time to time paid on the shares in the undertaking allotted to them, anything in the Companies Clauses Consolidation (Scotland) Act, 1845, or any other Act to the contrary notwithstanding.

23. 26. The petition for the Order and printed copies of the Draft Order will be deposited on or before the 17th day of April next, in the office of the Secretary for Scotland, Whitehall, London.

The subsequent procedure will be by way of Provisional Order, unless it be otherwise decided in terms of the Private Legislation Procedure (Scotland) Act, 1899, in which case the procedure may be by way of Private Bill; and this Notice will, subject to the Standing Orders of Parliament, apply to such Bill.
