FACTORY AND WORKSHOP ACT, 1901.

The Secretary of State for the Home. Department hereby gives notice, pursuant to section 80 of the Factory and Workshop Act, 1901, that he has certified the processes of loading, unloading, moving, and handling goods in, on, or at any dock, wharf, or quay, and the process of loading, unloading, and coaling any ship in any dock, harbour, or canal, to be dangerous, and that he proposes to make regulations to apply to all docks, wharves, quays, and ships.

Copies of the regulations proposed to be made may be obtained at the office of the Chief Inspector of Factories, Home Office, London, and at the local offices of the Inspectors of Factories.

Objections to the draft regulations by or on behalf of any persons affected by the regulations must be sent to the Secretary of State within forty days from the date of this notice.

^{*} Section 8 of the Corn Returns Act, 1882, provides that where returns of purchases of British Corn are made to the Local Inspector of Corn Returns in any other measure than the imperial bushel, or by weight or by a weighed measure, that Officer shall convert such returns into the imperial bushel, and in the case of weight or weighed measure the conversion is to be made at the rate of sixty imperial pounds for every bushel of wheat, fifty imperial pounds for every bushel of barley, and thirty-nine imperial pounds for every bushel of oats.
