TENDERS FOR LOANS ON TREASURY BILLS.

1. 4. The Bills will be issued and paid at the Bank of England.

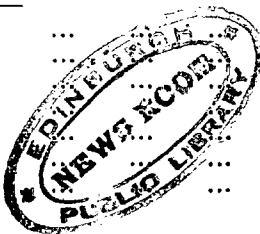

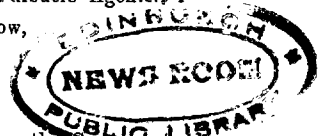

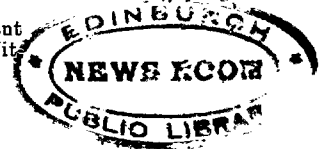
