Notice is hereby given that His Majesty The King will hold Levées at St. James' Palace, on Friday, 19th May, and on Friday, 26th May next, at twelve o'clock noon, and that for these and all future Levées Cards of Admission will be required, as the numbers at each of these Ceremonies must be limited.

The following are the rules to be observed:—
ATTENDANCES AND PRESENTATIONS.

All Officers, whether on the active or retired lists, of the Royal Navy and the Royal Marines, of whatever rank, will communicate with and obtain their cards from the Private Secretary to the First Lord of the Admiralty. All Civil Officers of the Admiralty will follow the same rule.

Deputy Lieutenants of Counties and all Officers, whether on the active or retired lists, of the Army, Militia, Yeomanry, or Volunteers, of whatever rank, except those on the Indian and Colonial Establishments, will communicate with and obtain their cards from the Private Secretary to the Inspector-General at the Horse Guards,

Whitehall; but Officers of the Household Cavalry or the Brigade of Guards should communicate with the Lord Chamberlain at St. James' Palace.

All Officers of the Indian Civil Service and of the Indian Army, of whatever rank, whether on the active or retired lists, will communicate with and obtain their cards from the Private Secretary to the Secretary of State at the India Office, Whitehall.

All Officers of the Colonial Service and Colonial Forces, of whatever rank, whether on the active or retired lists, will communicate with and obtain their cards from the Colonial Office, Whitehall, with the exception of Officers of the local Forces of the Colonies possessing responsible Government, who will apply to the Private Secretary to the Inspector-General at the Horse Guards, Whitehall, for their cards for attendance or for presentation by the Inspector-General. The application must in all cases be supported by a credential from the Governor or Officer commanding the local Forces of the Colony.

Similarly, all Gentlemen connected with the Foreign Office, the Home Office, or any Government Department, will communicate with and obtain their cards for attendance or presentation at Levées from the Department under which they serve.

Judges, Law Officers, King's Counsel, and all Legal Officials holding appointments under the Crown, are requested to make their applications through the Private Secretary to the Lord Chancellor.

Peers, Bishops, Members of Parliament, Officials connected with the Houses of Parliament, Clergy of all Denominations, and all Gentlemen other than the above-mentioned, will be good enough to communicate with the Lord Chamberlain at St. James' Palace, when they will each be furnished with a card of admission for use at the Levée.

The names, both for attendance and presentation, must be received at the various Offices above indicated not later than eight days prior to the date of each Levée.

Acknowledgment of applications will not be made, but cards of admission will be sent as soon as possible to the addresses given.

Whereas, Her late Majesty Queen Victoria by Letters Patent under the Great Seal of the United Kingdom, bearing date the fourteenth day of April one thousand eight hundred and forty-seven, did give directions for the method of appointing Members of the Most Honourable Order of the Bath.

And whereas We are desirous of making certain alterations in such method of appointment.

Now know ye that We of Our especial grace, certain knowledge, and mere motion do hereby direct and ordain that, notwithstanding anything in the said Letters Patent contained, the signification of Our pleasure by Our signature on a submission made to Us in the manner heretofore accustomed and notified to Our Central Chancery of the Orders of Knighthood, shall be the full and final authority to the Great Master of the said Order to prepare the Grant of Dignity to the Member of the said Order.

<sup>\*</sup> Section 8 of the Corn Returns Act, 1882, provides that where returns of purchases of British Corn are made to the Local Inspector of Corn Returns in any other measure than the imperial bushel, or by weight or by a weighed measure, that Officer shall convert such returns into the imperial bushel, and in the case of weight or weighed measure the conversion is to be made at the rate of sixty imperial pounds for every bushel of wheat, fifty imperial pounds for every bushel of bailey, and thirty-nine imperial pounds for every bushel of oats.

They must satisfy the Civil Service Commissioners that they have actually served for at least three years under a firm of Electrical or Mechanical Engineers of good standing. These Regulations are liable to alteration for future Examinations.

- 1. Candidates will be required to satisfy the Civil Service Commissioners—
  - (a) That their age on the day of the Examination is not less than 15 nor more than 18.
  - (b) That they are unmarried or widows.
  - (c) That they are duly qualified in respect of health and character.
  - (d) That they are natural-born or naturalised British subjects.
- 2. At each Examination the number of Candidates to be selected will be such as the Postmaster-General may from time to time fix.

3. The Examination will be in the following

subjects, viz.:—
1. English Composition (including Writing

and Spelling).

2. Arithmetic (first four rules, Simple and Compound, including English and Metrical Weights and Measures, Reduction, Vulgar Fractions and Decimals, excluding Recurring Decimals).

3. Geography (general).

Candidates who fail to obtain such an aggregate number of marks as may indicate, in the judgment of the Civil Service Commissioners, a competent amount of general proficiency, will not be regarded as qualified.

4. No Candidate will be admitted to examination who does not, at such time as may be fixed by the Civil Service Commissioners, produce an undertaking, signed by her parent or guardian, that she will, if successful, reside either with her parents or guardians, or with relations or friends approved by such parents or guardians.

5. Candidates must be at least 5 feet in height.
6. Persons who may have accepted a situation as Learner in any London office will not be eligible to compete. Other persons holding situations in the Civil Service must obtain the written permission of the authorities of their Department to attend the Examination before the commencement of the competition.

7. Application for permission to attend an Examination must be made at such time and in such manner as may be fixed by the Civil Service Commissioners.

8. A fee of 3s, will be required from every Candidate attending an Examination.

The Civil Service Commissioners further give notice that an Open Competitive Examination for situations as Female Learner in London in the Department of the Postmaster-General will be held in London, under the foregoing Regulations, on the 2nd June 1905.

# ORDER OF THE BOARD OF AGRICULTURE AND FISHERIES.

(DATED 14TH APRIL 1905.)

The Board of Agriculture and Fisheries, by virtue and in exercise of the powers vested in them under the Diseases of Animals Acts, 1894 to 1903, and of every other power enabling them in this behalf, do order, and it is hereby ordered, as follows:—

1. Until the first day of June, including that day, the production of the declaration prescribed by Article 4 (2) of the Sheep-Scab (Regulation of Movement) Order of 1905 shall not be necessary for the granting of a licence to move out of the area described in the schedule hereto to a specially authorised market, fair, or saleyard, sheep which have been previously marked by the painting or stamping with an indelible composition of red colour of a broad line down the back, and another broad line across the loins of each sheep, thus+, each line being not less than nine inches long.

2. Sheep marked in accordance with the preceding Article may be moved from a specially authorised market, fair, or saleyard if accompanied by a licence authorising such movements

granted by an Inspector of the Local Authority, to any lair, field, or other enclosed premises appropriated for the sole purpose of the detention of sheep so moved, and approved for that purpose by the Local Authority; and the sheep, notwithstanding anything in Article 4 (3) of the said Order, may at any time be moved from such premises to a slaughter-house without being previously dipped, provided that they are accompanied by a licence authorising such movement granted by an Inspector of the Local Authority.
