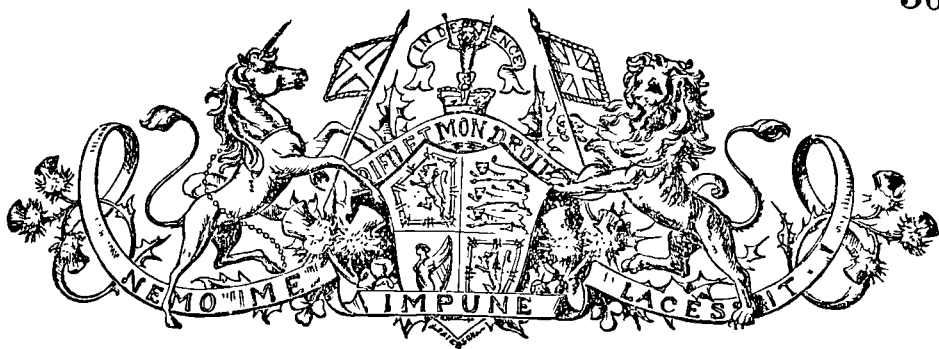

Our right trusty and right well-beloved Cousin and Councillor George William, Earl of Coventry;

Our right trusty and well-beloved Digby Wentworth Bayard, Baron Middleton;

Our right trusty and well-beloved Councillor Thomas, Baron Ribblesdale;

Our right trusty and well-beloved Councillor Henry Chaplin; and

Our trusty and well-beloved—

Sir Walter Gilbey, Baronet;

Sir John Gilmour, Baronet; and

John Bowen-Jones, Esquire; Greeting!

Whereas by Royal Warrant bearing date the third day of December, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-seven, Her late Majesty Queen Victoria, after reciting that for many years the breeding of sound horses had been

encouraged by the gift out of the Civil List of Queen's Plates, to be won at race meetings in different parts of Great Britain, and that it appeared to Her Majesty that the Royal Bounty in that form was not so effective as could be desired, and that the said Bounty should be bestowed directly for the encouragement of horse breeding, did appoint Commissioners to consider and report as to the regulations under which the said Royal Bounty might best be expended in prizes, to be bestowed by Her Majesty at the chief Agricultural Shows in Great Britain, for the purpose of encouraging the breed and maintenance of a race of sound horses, or in such other methods as Her Majesty might approve:

And whereas We have deemed it expedient that a new Commission should issue for the purposes specified in the said Warrant:

Now Know ye that We have revoked, and determined, and do by these Presents revoke and determine the said Warrant of the third day of December, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-seven; and the subsequent Warrants dated respectively the first day of September, one thousand eight hundred and ninety-two, the sixth day of June, one thousand eight hundred and ninety-five, and the twenty-fifth day of August, one thousand nine hundred and three, and every matter and thing therein contained.

And We, reposing great trust and confidence in your ability and discretion, and being heartily desirous to do what in Us lies for the furtherance of so important a national object, have authorised and appointed, and do by these Presents authorise and appoint you the said Osbert

Cecil, Earl of Sefton; William John Arthur Charles James, Duke of Portland; George William, Earl of Coventry; Digby Wentworth Bayard, Baron Middleton; Thomas, Baron Ribblesdale; Henry Chaplin; Sir Walter Gilbert; Sir John Gilmour; and John Bowen-Jones, to be Our Commissioners to consider and report to Us the regulations under which the moneys annually voted by Parliament for the purpose may best be expended in prizes, to be bestowed by Us at the chief Agricultural Shows in Great Britain, for the purpose of encouraging the breed and maintenance of a race of sound horses, or in such other method as We may approve.

And for the better and more perfectly enabling you to perform the duty entrusted to you, We are hereby pleased to declare that during the continuance of this Our Royal Commission, We will bestow any moneys which Parliament may grant, for such objects and in such expenditure for the purposes of this Our Royal Commission, as We may, upon your recommendation, approve.

And for the better effecting the purposes of this Our Commission, We do by these Presents give and grant unto you, or any three or more of you, full power to call before you such persons as you shall judge likely to afford you any information upon the subject of this Our Commission; and also to call for, have access to and examine all such books, documents, registers and records as may afford you the fullest information on the subject, and to inquire of and concerning the premises by all other lawful ways and means whatsoever.

And We do by these Presents will and ordain that this Our Commission shall continue in full force and virtue, and that you Our said Commissioners, or any three or more of you, may from time to time proceed in the execution thereof, and of every matter and thing therein contained, although the same be not continued from time to time by adjournment.

And We do further ordain that you, or any three or more of you, have liberty to report your proceedings under this Our Commission from time to time if you shall judge it expedient so to do.

And Our will and pleasure is that you do report to Us under your hands and seals, or under the hands and seals of any three or more of you, your opinion upon the matter herein submitted for your consideration.

And Our further will and pleasure is that on voidance of the Office of Master of the Horse by the said Osbert Cecil, Earl of Sefton, and his successors, Our Master of the Horse for the time being shall be a Member of this Our Commission.

And for the better enabling you to execute these Presents We hereby appoint Our trusty and well-beloved John Herbert Taylor, Esquire, to be Secretary to this Our Commission.

Given at Our Court at Saint James', the twenty-fourth day of March, one thousand nine hundred and six, in the sixth year of Our Reign.

WHITEHALL, March 26, 1906.

The King has been pleased to confer the Albert Medal of the Second Class upon Mr. Patrick Cullinan, an Inspector of the Great Southern and Western Railway Company of Ireland, for gallantry displayed in saving life at Ennis Railway Station, on the 6th November 1905. The ceremony of the presentation of the medal by His Excellency the Lord Lieutenant of Ireland, took place in the Throne Room of Dublin Castle, on Wednesday last.

On the evening of the 16th November 1905, between 6 and 7 o'clock, while a special cattle train was running through Ennis Station from Limerick, a woman fell between the rails in front of, and about 15 yards from, the approaching train. Inspector Cullinan, who was on the platform at the time, immediately jumped on the track, and just succeeded in dragging the woman into the six-foot way, though not before the guard of the engine had come in contact with her clothing. So little time remained for action that but for Inspector Cullinan's promptitude and great personal strength the woman's life would have been lost.

### COUNTY COUNCIL ELECTORAL DIVISIONS OF RENFREWSHIRE

#### PARISH OF RENFREW.

#### ORDER by the Secretary for Scotland.

**W**HEREAS the Order of the Boundary Commissioners for Scotland forming Electoral Divisions for the County of Renfrew was amended by an Order of the Secretary for Scotland, dated 18th October 1902, dividing the Renfrew Electoral Division into two Electoral Divisions, called the Scotstoun and Renfrew Electrical Divisions respectively, and increasing the number of County Councillors from forty-three to forty-four:

And whereas the County Council of the County of Renfrew have represented to me that a material change of circumstances has occurred in respect of the population and annual value of the said Electoral Divisions, and that it is desirable to redivide the Parish of Renfrew into four Electoral Divisions, and accordingly to alter the number of County Councillors:

And whereas I am of opinion that it is expedient to give effect to the proposal of the said County Council:

Now, therefore, I, the Right Honourable John Sinclair, His Majesty's Secretary for Scotland, do in virtue of the powers conferred on me by section 51 of the Local Government (Scotland) Act 1889, order as follows:—

1. The number of County Councillors for the County of Renfrew shall be increased from forty-four to forty-six.

2. The Order of the Secretary for Scotland, dated 18th October 1902, in so far as it created the Scotstoun and Renfrew Electoral Divisions, is hereby recalled, and the Parish of Renfrew, exclusive of the portion within the limits of the Burgh of Renfrew, shall be divided into four County Council Electoral Divisions, having the following names and contents, that is to say:—

NAME OF DIVISION.	CONTENTS OF DIVISION.
I.—Scotstoun (North) Electoral Division	<p>Consisting of that part lying to the north of the centre line of Dumbarton Road of the Whiteinch Special Drainage District, as such District was constituted and enlarged by Resolutions of the First or Upper District Committee of the County of Renfrew, dated respectively 9th January 1895 and 7th May 1902, which Division is part of the Parish of Renfrew, on the north of the River Clyde, and is included within the following boundaries, viz.:—Commencing at a point on the boundary line between the Parish of Renfrew and City of Glasgow, at the junction of the road from Skaterigg Farm with the Crow Road, and proceeding thence southward, eastward, south-westward, southward, and again south-westward along the said Parish and City boundary to the point of junction with the boundary of the Burgh of Partick; thence westward and southward along the boundary line between the Parish of Renfrew and Burgh of Partick till the centre of Dumbarton Road is reached; thence westward along the centre of Dumbarton Road for a distance of 1215 yards or thereby to a point in line with the eastern boundary of field marked number 108 on the 25-inch Ordnance Survey Sheet (1894) of the Parish of Renfrew, the said field being situated in the Parish of Renfrew near Scotstounhill Station; thence in a north-north-easterly direction to the fence forming the southern boundary of the Glasgow, Yoker, and Clydebank Railway at the north-east corner of the field marked number 107 on said Survey Sheet; thence in an east-south-easterly direction along the southern boundary of the aforesaid railway till it reaches the north-eastern boundary of the field marked number 137 on said Survey Sheet; thence in a north-westerly direction for a distance of 100 yards or thereby on a curved line crossing the Glasgow, Yoker, and Clydebank Railway, and terminating at a point about 200 yards west of Windyedge Farm Steading; thence east by northward 1700 yards or thereby on a curved line passing immediately to the south of Windyedge Farm Steading and Jordanhill Mansion House, and along the centre line of the road from Skaterigg Farm Steading to the point of commencement at the Crow Road.</p>
II.—Scotstoun (South) Electoral Division	<p>Consisting of, <i>inter alia</i>, that part lying to the south of the centre line of Dumbarton Road of the Whiteinch Special Drainage District, as such District was constituted and enlarged by Resolutions of the First or Upper District Committee of the County of Renfrew, dated respectively 9th January 1895 and 7th May 1902, which Division is part of the Parish of Renfrew on the north of the River Clyde, and is included within the following boundaries, viz.:—Commencing at a point in the centre of Dumbarton Road where the boundary line between the Parish of Renfrew and the Burgh of Partick crosses the said Dumbarton Road; thence south-eastward, westward, and south-westward along the boundary line between the Parish of Renfrew and Burgh of Partick till the <i>medium filum</i> of the River Clyde is reached; thence westward along the <i>medium filum</i> of the River Clyde for a distance of 335 yards or thereby to a point in the <i>medium filum</i> of the River Clyde opposite the point on the northern side of the River Clyde where the western boundary of the ground fenced to Messrs. Meechan &amp; Sons meets the upper edge of the river dyke; thence in a north-easterly direction to said last-mentioned point; thence running in a north-easterly direction along said western boundary and continuation thereof to the centre line of South Street; thence westward along the centre line of South Street to the western boundary of the Clyde Structural Iron Works Company's ground; thence along the western boundary of those works and a continuation thereof in a straight line to a point 118 feet south of the centre of Dumbarton Road; thence westward along a line 118 feet from and parallel to the centre of Dumbarton Road to a point in line with the eastern boundary of the field marked number 108 on the 25-inch Ordnance Survey Sheet (1894) of the Parish of Renfrew, the said field being situated in the Parish of Renfrew near Scotstounhill Station; thence in a north-north-easterly direction to a point in the centre</p>

III.—Yoker and Renfrew (South)  
Electoral Division

of Dumbarton Road in line with the said eastern boundary of said field marked number 108; thence south-eastward along the centre of Dumbarton Road to the point of commencement.

Consisting of—

(a) that part of the Parish of Renfrew lying to the south of the River Clyde, exclusive of the portion included within the limits of the Burgh of Renfrew, and

(b) that part of the Parish of Renfrew on the north of the River Clyde (including the Yoker Special Drainage District as constituted by Resolution of the First or Upper District Committee of the County of Renfrew, dated 10th August 1904), which last-mentioned part is included within the following boundaries, viz.:—Commencing at the point in the *medium filum* of the River Clyde opposite the point on the northern side of the River Clyde where the boundary between the Estates of Scotstoun and Elderslie meets the upper edge of the river dyke, and thence running in a north-easterly direction to the said last-mentioned point and along the said boundary to the north-west corner of the plantation marked number 126 on the 25-inch Ordnance Survey Sheet (1894) of the Parish of Renfrew; thence in a north-north-easterly direction along a straight line from the point last described to the north-west corner of the field or enclosure marked number 47 on the said Survey Sheet; thence in an east-north-easterly direction along the fence forming the northern boundaries of the fields or enclosures marked numbers 47, 48, 52, and 24 respectively on said Survey Sheet to the boundaries between the Counties of Renfrew and Dumbarton; thence north-westward, westward, and south-westward along the boundary between the said Counties to the *medium filum* of the River Clyde, and thence in a south-easterly direction along the *medium filum* of the River Clyde to the point of commencement first described.

IV.—Scotstounhill and Jordanhill  
Electoral Division

Consisting of the remainder of the Parish of Renfrew on the north of the River Clyde, and including the Scotstoun and Jordanhill Special Drainage District, as constituted by Resolution of the First or Upper District Committee of the County of Renfrew, dated 10th August 1904.

3. The County Councillor elected to represent the Scotstoun Electoral Division at the Election held in December 1904, shall, during the remainder of his term of office, represent the Electoral Division of Scotstoun (North), constituted by this Order, and the County Councillor elected to represent Renfrew Electoral Division at the Election held in December 1904, shall, during the remainder of his term of office, represent the Electoral Division of Scotstounhill and Jordanhill, constituted by this Order.

4. The County Council of the County of Renfrew shall appoint two County Councillors to represent the Electoral Divisions of Scotstoun (South) and Yoker and Renfrew (South), constituted by this Order, in the manner provided by section 33 of the Local Government (Scotland) Act, 1889, for the filling up of casual vacancies.

5. The foregoing provisions shall come into effect as from the date of this Order.

WHITEHALL, March 26, 1906.

The King has been graciously pleased to award the Albert Medal of the First Class to Mr. Leslie Urquhart, British Vice-Consul at Baku, for conspicuous gallantry in saving the lives of four British workmen who, in September last, during the outbreak which occasioned serious losses to the Petroleum Industry at Baku, were surrounded by the insurgents in an isolated position at Balachani Zabrat and were in imminent danger of losing their lives, a fate which shortly after their rescue befell all the persons remaining in the buildings where they had been shut up. The four Englishmen had already been isolated for some time when news of their perilous position reached the British Embassy at St. Petersburg, and Mr. Urquhart, accompanied by two Cossacks and several Tartars from the village of Mushtagee, started to relieve the beleaguered men. The district was full of armed Tartars, and in such a state of unrest that when Mr. Urquhart started upon his expedition it was not expected by the remainder of the British Colony in Baku that he would live to return.

On the night of his departure Mr. Urquhart proceeded to a farm which he possessed in the neighbourhood, where he hoped to be able to get help from his own farm hands, who were Tartars, and also to collect supplies, and not

withstanding that the party was stopped and fired on from time to time the supplies were collected and a start was made early the next morning for Balachani.

Mr. Urquhart's courageous and spontaneous action was rewarded with success. He got through and found the four Englishmen in a dreadful condition, especially on account of want of water, and after feeding them he persuaded them to go with him in carts which he had brought, with as many Armenians as they could bring with them. Immediately afterwards the whole of the buildings were carried by storm and everyone found therein put to death.

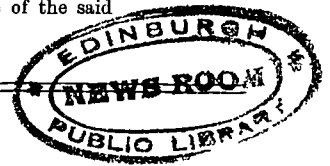
