- (a) As to the encroachment of the sea on various parts of the Coast of the United Kingdom, and the damage which has been or is likely to be caused thereby; and what measures are desirable for the prevention of such damage:
- (b) Whether any further powers should be conferred upon Local Authorities and owners of property with a view to the adoption of effective and systematic schemes for the protection of the Coast and the banks of tidal rivers:
- (c) Whether any alteration of the law is desirable as regards the management and control of the foreshore:
- (d) Whether further facilities should be given for the reclamation of tidal lands:

And for the better effecting the purposes of this Our Commission, We do by these Presents give and grant unto you, or any three or more of you, full power to call before you such persons as you shall judge likely to afford you any information upon the subject of this Our Commission; and also to call for, have access to, and examine all such books, documents, registers, and records as may afford you the fullest information on the subject, and to inquire of and concerning the premises by all other lawful ways and means whatsoever:

And We do by these Presents authorise and empower you, or any three or more of you, to visit and personally inspect such places as you may deem it expedient so to inspect for the more effectual carrying out of the purposes aforesaid:

And We do by these Presents will and ordain that this Our Commission shall continue in full force and virtue, and that you, Our said Commissioners, or any three or more of you, may from time to time precede in the execution thereof, and of every matter and thing therein contained, although the same be not continued from time to time by adjournment:

And We do further ordain that you, or any three or more of you, have liberty to report your proceedings under this Our Commission from time to time if you shall judge it expedient so to do.

And Our further will and pleasure is that you do, with as little delay as possible, report to Us, under your hands and seals, or under the hands and seals of any three or more of you, your opinion upon the matters herein submitted for your consideration.

Given at Our Court at Saint James', the sixth day of July, one thousand nine hundred and six, in the sixth year of Our Reign.

SPECIAL REGULATIONS respecting Open Competitive Examinations for (I.) Junior Appointments in the Supply and Accounting Departments of the Admiralty; (II.) Junior Appointments in the Royal Ordnance Factories of the War Office; (III.) The Situation of Secondclass Assistant Accountant in the Army Accounts Department; (IV.) The Situation of Examiner in the Exchequer and Audit Department. (Supplementary to the General Regulations respecting Open Competitive Examinations for situations in the Civil Service included in Schedule A of the Order in Council of 4th June 1870).

These Regulations will not come into force until after 31st December 1906.

- 1. The limits of age for these situations are 18 and 19½, the half-year being reckoned by calendar months. If an examination commences in one of the first seven months of any year Candidates must be of the prescribed age on the 1st of May of that year. If an Examination commences in one of the last five months of any year Candidates must be of the prescribed age on the 1st of November of that year.
