LORD CHAMBERLAIN'S OFFICE, ST. JAMES' PALACE, February 9, 1908.

TOTICE is hereby given that His Majesty
The King will hold a Levée at St. James'
Palace on Wednesday the 19th of February, at
12 o'clock noon, and that for this and all future
Levées Cards of Admission will be required, as
the numbers at each of these Ceremonies must
be limited.

The following are the rules to be observed:

ATTENDANCES AND PRESENTATIONS.

All Officers, whether on the active or retired lists, of the Royal Navy and the Royal Marines, of whatever rank, will communicate with and obtain their cards from the Private Secretary to the First Lord of the Admiralty. All Civil Officers of the Admiralty will follow the same rule.

Deputy Lieutenants of Counties and all Officers, whether on the active or retired lists, of the Army, Militia, Yeomanry, or Volunteers, of whatever rank, except those on the Indian and Colonial Establishments, will communicate with and obtain their cards from the Private Secretary to the Inspector-General at the Horse Guards, Whitehall; but Officers of the Household Cavalry or the Brigade of Guards should communicate with the Lord Chamberlain at St. James' Palace.

All Officers of the Indian Civil Service and of the Indian Army, of whatever rank, whether on the active or retired lists, will communicate with and obtain their cards from the Private Secretary to the Secretary of State at the India Office, Whitehall.

All Officers of the Colonial Service and Colonial Forces, of whatever rank, whether on the active or retired lists, will communicate with and obtain their cards from the Colonial Office, Whitehall, with the exception of Officers of the local Forces of the Colonies possessing responsible Government, who will apply to the Private Secretary to the Inspector-General at the Horse Guards, Whitehall, for their cards for attendance or for presentation by the Inspector-General. The application must in all cases be supported by a credential from the Governor or Officer commanding the local Forces of the Colony.

Recorders, Metropolitan Police Magistrates, and other Stipendiary Magistrates, and all Gentlemen connected with the Home Office, are requested to make their applications through the Private Secretary to the Home Secretary.

Judges, Law Officers, King's Counsel, and all Legal Officials holding appointments under the Crown, are requested to make their applications through the Private Secretary to the Lord Chancellor.

Similarly, all Gentlemen connected with the Foreign Office, Civil Staff of the War Office, or any Government Department, will communicate with and obtain their cards for attendance or presentation at Levées from the Department under which they serve.

Peers, Bishops, Members of Parliament, Officials connected with the Houses of Parliament, Clergy of all Denominations, and all Gentlemen other than the above mentioned, will be good enough to communicate with the Lord Chamberlain at St. James' Palace, when they will each be furnished with a card of admission for use at the Levée.

The names, both for attendance and presentation at this Levée, must be received at the various Offices above indicated not later than Saturday the 15th instant.

Acknowledgment of applications will not be made, but cards of admission will be sent as soon as possible to the addresses given.

 - (I.) Junior Appointments in the Supply and Accounting Departments of the Admiralty;

- (II.) Junior Appointments in the Royal Ordnance Factories of the War Office;
- (III.) The Situation of Second Class Assistant Accountant in the Army Accounts Department:
- (IV.) The Stuation of Examiner in the Exchequer and Audit Department;
- (V.) Appointments as Second Class Clerk in the Estate Duty Office of the Inland Revenue Department;
- (VI.) Appointments as Junior Clerk in the Ecclesiastical Commission.

N.B.—These Regulations are liable to alteration far future Examinations.

- 1. The limits of age for these situations are 18 and 19½, the half-year being reckoned by calendar months. If an Examination commences in one of the first seven months of any year, Candidates must be of the prescribed age on the 1st of May of that year. If an examination commences in one of the last five months of any year, Candidates must be of the prescribed age on the 1st November of that year.

Both the subjects in Class I. must be taken up. No Candidate will be eligible who fails to pass a qualifying examination in Arithmetic and English.

From Classes II. and III. Candidates may select subjects, one of which must be a language, carrying marks up to a maximum of 10,000, making with the subjects in Class I. 14,000 in all. The same subject may not be selected both in Class II. and in Class III.

- 3. Application for permission to attend an Examination must be made in the writing of the Candidate, at such times and in such manner as may be fixed by the Civil Service Commissioners.
- 4. A fee of £3 will be required from each Candidate attending an Examination.

ORDER OF THE BOARD OF AGRICULTURE AND FISHERIRS.

(Dated 8th February 1908.)

MIDLOTHIAN AND DISTRICT (FOOT-AND-MOUTH DISEASE) ORDER OF 1908 (No. 2).

The Board of Agriculture and Fisheries, by virtue and in exercise of the powers vested in them under the Diseases of Animals Acts, 1894 to 1903, and of every other power enabling them in this behalf, do order, and it is hereby ordered, as follows:

Movement for Slaughter into Edinburgh, Leith, and Musselburgh.

1. Notwithstanding anything in the Midlothian and District (Foot-and-Mouth Disease) Order of 1908 an animal may be moved by railway from outside the District defined by the said Order to a railway station in the city of Edinburgh or burgh of Leith or Musselburgh; and an animal so moved into the city or either of the said burghs may be moved from the railway station to a slaughter-house within the city or burgh, if accompanied by a Movement Licence granted by the Local Authority of the city or burgh. The animal shall be moved to the slaughter-house by the route described in the Licence, and after arrival at the slaughter-house shall be there detained and shall be slaughtered within four days from the date of its arrival in the city or burgh.

Short Title.

2. This Order may be cited as the MIDLOTHIAN AND DISTRICT (FOOT-AND-MOUTH DISEASE) ORDER OF 1908 (No. 2), and shall be read with the Midlothian and District (Foot-and-Mouth Disease) Order of 1908.

^{*} Section 8 of the Corn Returns Act, 1882, provides that where returns of purchases of British Corn are made to the Local Inspector of Corn Returns in any other measure than the imperial bushel or by weight or by a weighed measure, that Officer shall convert such returns into the imperial bushel, and in the case of weight or weighed measure the conversion is to be made at the rate of sixty imperial pounds for every bushel of wheat, fifty imperial pounds for every bushel of barley, and thirty-nine imperial pounds for every bushel of oats.
