ORDER OF THE BOARD OF
AGRICULTURE AND FISHERIES.

(DATED 6TH MARCH 1908.)

WIGTOWNSHIRE (CONTROL OF DOGS)
ORDER OF 1908.

The Board of Agriculture and Fisheries, by virtue and in exercise of the powers vested in them under the Diseases of Animals Acts, 1894 to 1903, the Dogs Act, 1906, and of every other power enabling them in this behalf, do order, and it is hereby ordered, as follows:—

Power to make Regulations.

1.—(1.) The Local Authority of the District specified in the Schedule to this Order may, in accordance with the provisions of this Order, make Regulations, with a view to the prevention of worrying of cattle (including sheep), for requiring that dogs or any class of dogs shall, during all or any of the hours between sunset and sunrise, be kept by the owners thereof under control in manner prescribed by the Regulations.

(2.) The Regulations may apply to the whole or any part of the District, and may exempt any class of dogs either generally or under prescribed conditions.

Confirmation of Regulations.

2.—(1.) Regulations made under this Order shall not take effect unless and until they have been submitted to and confirmed by the Board of Agriculture and Fisheries.

(2.) Unless the Board otherwise direct, the following provisions shall apply—

(i.) Notice of intention to apply for confirmation of any Regulations shall be given in one

or more of the local newspapers circulating within the District in two successive issues two weeks at least before the making of the application.

(ii.) For two weeks at least before an application, a copy of the Regulations proposed to be confirmed shall be kept at the office of the Local Authority of the District, and be open during office hours thereat to the inspection of ratepayers of the District without fee or reward.

(iii.) The Clerk of the Local Authority shall on the application of any such ratepayer furnish him with a copy of the proposed Regulations on payment of sixpence.

(3.) A copy of any Regulations made by a Local Authority under this Order, signed and certified by the Clerk of that Local Authority to be a true copy and to have been duly confirmed, shall be evidence, until the contrary is proved, in all legal proceedings, of the due making, confirmation, and existence of the Regulations, without further or other proof.

Seizure of Dogs where Regulations are
Contravened.

3. Any dog in respect of which an offence is being committed against a Regulation made under this Order may be seized and treated as a stray dog under the powers conferred by section three of the Dogs Act, 1906.

Extension of Definition in Diseases of Animals
Act, 1894.

4. Dogs shall be animals for the purposes of the following sections of the Diseases of Animals Act, 1894 (namely):—

Section forty-three (powers of police);

Section forty-four (powers of inspectors);

and also for the purposes of all other sections of the said Act containing provisions relative to or consequent on the provisions of those sections and this Order, including such sections as relate to offences and legal proceedings.

Local Authority to enforce Order.

5. The provisions of this Order shall be executed and enforced by the Local Authority.

Short Title.

6. This Order may be cited as the WIGTOWNSHIRE (CONTROL OF DOGS) ORDER OF 1908.

BURGH OF KIRKCALDY.

THE Provost, Magistrates, and Town Council of the Burgh of Kirkcaldy, in virtue of the powers conferred on them by section 46 of the Tramways Act, 1870, have made the following bye-laws with respect to the Tramways belonging to and worked by them, namely:—

KIRKCALDY CORPORATION TRAMWAYS.

Bye-Laws made by the Provost, Magistrates, and Councillors of the Burgh of Kirkcaldy (hereinafter called "The Corporation"), on the 9th day of March 1908, in virtue of the powers conferred on them by sec. 46 of the Tramways Act, 1870.

As to the following matters:—

For preventing the commission of any nuisance in or upon any carriage, or in or against any premises belonging to them:

For regulating the travelling in or upon any carriage belonging to them.

1. Every passenger shall enter or depart from a car by the conductor's platform in the rear of the car, and not otherwise.

2. Every passenger shall, upon demand, pay to the conductor, or other duly authorised officer of the Corporation, the legal fare for the journey, as specified in the table of fares exhibited in the car, and a ticket corresponding thereto shall be delivered to such passenger by the conductor, and such passenger shall accept such ticket.

3. (a) Every passenger shall show his ticket to any duly authorised officer of the Corporation when required by him so to do.

(b) Any passenger failing or refusing to accept or to show his ticket, as aforesaid, shall be required to pay the fare legally demandable for the distance travelled

over by such passenger, and, in default of payment of such fare, shall be liable to the penalty prescribed by these bye-laws.

4. No person shall enter, mount, or leave, or attempt to enter, mount, or leave, any car whilst in motion.

5. A passenger, not being an artisan, mechanic, or daily labourer, within the meaning of the Acts of Parliament relating to the Corporation Tramways, shall not use, or attempt to use, any ticket or any car (except at the ordinary fare) intended only for such artisans, mechanics, or daily labourers.

6. No passenger or other person, not being an officer of the Corporation, shall travel on the steps or stairs of any car, or stand on the roof, or sit on the outside rail on the roof, of any car.

7. No person, not being an officer of the Corporation, or a passenger or intending passenger, shall enter or mount any car, or hold or hang on by or to any part of any car.

8. When any car contains the full number of passengers which it is constructed to carry, no additional person shall enter or be allowed to remain in or on any such car when warned by the conductor not to do so; and any person remaining after being so warned shall be liable to the penalty hereinafter provided.

9. Personal or other luggage (including the tools of artisans, mechanics, and daily labourers) not carried by hand shall in placed in such position on the car as shall be directed by the conductor; but in no case shall such luggage be placed in the interior or on the roof of any car.

10. No person shall travel in or on any car with loaded fire-arms, or with any article, instrument, or implement which may be dangerous or offensive to the passengers.

11. No person shall bring into or upon, or convey, or cause or permit to be conveyed, in or on any car, any bundle of clothing, or any article or thing, tending to communicate any infectious or contagious disease, or any dead body, or any article of an offensive or dangerous character; or of a bulk or description which may interfere with the comfort of any passenger; and such article or thing, if introduced, may, along with the person introducing the same, who shall forfeit his fare, be removed summarily from such car by the conductor.

12. No person shall take a dog or other animal into or on any car after having been requested not to do so by the conductor or other authorised officer of the Corporation. Any dog or other animal taken into or found on any car shall be removed from the car by the person in charge of such dog or other animal immediately upon request by the conductor.

13. No person shall smoke inside, or on either platform, of any car.

14. No passenger or other person shall, while riding in or upon any car, play or perform upon any musical instrument.

15. No person shall swear or use obscene or offensive language whilst in or upon any car, or spit or commit any nuisance in, from, upon, or against any car, or wilfully interfere with the comfort of any passenger; and any person so doing shall, in addition to incurring the penalty hereinafter provided, forfeit his fare, and be summarily removed from the car by, or under the direction of, the conductor.

16. No person shall cut, tear, soil, or damage any car, or the fittings thereof, break or scratch any window or panel, or remove or deface any number plate, printed notice, or writing on any car; and no person, other than a servant of the Corporation, shall change or remove the route or destination boards, or interfere with the brake or ventilators of any car. Any person acting in contravention of this bye-law shall, in addition to the penalty prescribed by these bye-laws and regulations, be liable to pay the amount of damage done in consequence.

17. No person in a state of intoxication, or affected with any infectious or contagious disease, shall enter or mount upon any car, and any such person found in or upon any car shall, in addition to incurring the penalty hereinafter provided, forfeit his fare, and be immediately removed by, or under the direction of, the conductor.

18. Any person whose dress or clothing might, in the opinion of the conductor, soil or injure a car or the fittings thereof, or the dress or clothing of any passenger, or any person who, in the opinion of the conductor, might for any other reason be objectionable to passengers, shall not be allowed to enter or remain in or on any car, and, if found in or on any car, shall, on the request of the conductor, leave the car upon the return of his fare, if previously paid, being offered to him; provided that in the case of cars specially run for artisans, mechanics,

and daily labourers, no person shall be prevented from entering or remaining in or on, or requested to leave, a car, on the ground of the condition of his dress or clothing, if such condition is solely due to the nature of his employment.

19. No person shall wilfully obstruct or impede any officer or servant of the Corporation in the execution of his duty, upon or in connection with any car or tramway.

20. All persons desiring to alight from any car shall do so before any person boards such car for the purpose of travelling thereon, and all persons desirous of boarding the car shall permit such persons to alight, as aforesaid.

21. No person, other than a servant of the Corporation, shall interfere with any points or switch connected with the tramways.

22. The conductor of each car shall, to the best of his ability, enforce these bye-laws and regulations, or prevent the breach thereof; and if any such conductor fails to enforce the same as aforesaid, he shall be deemed to have committed a breach thereof.

23. The expression "conductor" shall include any officer or servant in the employment of the Corporation having charge of a car.

24. There shall be placed, and kept placed in a conspicuous position inside of each car in use, a printed copy of these bye-laws and regulations.

The traffic on the road in which the tramway is laid:

25. All persons in charge of any animal or animals shall take or drive them out of the way, and all foot passengers shall also get out of the way of any passing car.

26. Every driver of a car, on coming in sight of any cart, carriage, or other vehicle standing on the line of tramway on which he is plying, or by the side thereof, without there being free space to pass, shall sound his bell as a signal to the drivers or persons in charge of any such cart, carriage, or other vehicle, and that for the distance of 30 yards, at least, before coming up to such cart, carriage, or other vehicle.

27. All drivers and conductors of cars shall obey all orders by any Police Officer on duty on the road or in the route travelled over, who is hereby authorised to give such directions as may be necessary for the safety of vehicles and passengers, and for securing the observance of the foregoing bye-laws and regulations in all other respects.

28. The person in charge of any vehicle or animal who shall not, as soon as possible, after the driver of any car has sounded his bell, drive or take such vehicle or animal off the tramway rails, so as to allow the car to proceed, shall be liable to the penalty hereinafter provided.

29. No person shall lay coals or other material on the streets in such a way or in such a place as will interfere with the running of the cars.

30. No person shall in any way wilfully impede or interfere with the traffic on tramways, nor shall any driver or conductor needlessly cause interruption to the ordinary road traffic.

APPLICATION OF BYE-LAWS.

31. Bye-laws Nos. 1 to 24 shall apply to all tramways belonging to or worked by the Corporation, and Bye-laws Nos. 25 to 30 shall apply to all tramways within the Burgh of Kirkcaldy.

PENALTY APPLICABLE TO ALL BYE-LAWS.

32. Any person offending against, or committing a breach of these bye-laws and regulations, or any part thereof, shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding forty shillings.
