THE following Address of the Ministers and Elders of the Church of Scotland convened in General Assembly having been transmitted by His Grace the Lord High Commissioner to the Right Honourable John Sinclair, His Majesty's Secretary for Scotland, has been by him laid before the King, who was pleased to receive the same very graciously:—

TO THE KING'S MOST EXCELLENT MAJESTY,
MAY IT PLEASE YOUR MAJESTY,—

We, Ministers and Elders of the Church of Scotland met in General Assembly, desire to renew our expression of loyalty and attachment to Your Majesty's person and throne. There are no more loyal subjects in Your Majesty's vast dominions than the Members of this National Church, and we therefore specially welcome the gracious assurance in Your Majesty's letter of Your Majesty's interest in the work and satisfaction with the success of the Church of Scotland.

We render our most grateful acknowledgement for the continuance of Your Majesty's gift of Two Thousand pounds for the religious needs of the Highlands and Islands, and we can assure Your Majesty that the money shall be carefully expended in the manner in which Your Majesty has been pleased to direct.

If an examination begins in one of the last six months of any year, Candidates must be of the prescribed age on the 1st day of September in that year.

In reckoning age for competition, persons who have served for two full consecutive years in any Civil situation to which they were admitted with the Certificate of the Civil Service Commissioners may deduct from their actual age any time not exceeding five years which they may have spent in such service.

2. Candidates will be required to satisfy the Civil Service Commissioners—

Consistently with the limitations specified above Candidates are at liberty to name any of these subjects, provided that the maximum number of marks that can be obtained from the subjects chosen is limited to 6000. If this maximum is exceeded by a Candidate's selection he will be required to indicate one of his subjects, the marks for which should, in his case, be reduced so as to bring his maximum marks within the prescribed limit. The marks so reduced will be subject to a correspondingly reduced deduction under Clause 6.

For Regulations 5, 6, and 8, which at present stand as follows :—

5. The merit of the persons examined will be estimated by marks ; and the number set opposite to each branch in the preceding regulation denotes the greatest number of marks that can be obtained in respect of it.

6. The marks assigned to Candidates in each branch will be subject to such deduction as the Civil Service Commissioners may deem necessary in order to secure that no credit be allowed for merely superficial knowledge.

8. The marks obtained by each Candidate, in respect of each of the branches in which he shall have been examined, will be added up, and the names of the several Candidates who shall have obtained, after the deduction above mentioned, a greater aggregate number of marks than any of the remaining Candidates will be set forth in order of merit, and such Candidates shall be deemed to be Selected Candidates for the Civil Service of India, provided they appear to be in other respects duly qualified. Should any of the Selected Candidates become disqualified, the Secretary of State for India will determine whether the vacancy thus created shall be filled

up or not. In the former case the Candidate next in order of merit, and in other respects duly qualified, shall be deemed to be a selected Candidate.

In the former case the Candidate next in order of merit, and in other respects duly qualified, shall be deemed to be a Selected Candidate.

It is intended that the changes should come into force for the Open Competitive Examination of 1909 and subsequent years.

* Section 8 of the Corn Returns Act, 1882, provides that where returns of purchases of British Corn are made to the Local Inspector of Corn Returns in any other measure than the imperial bushel or by weight or by a weighed measure, that Officer shall convert such returns into the imperial bushel, and in the case of weight or weighed measure the conversion is to be made at the rate of sixty imperial pounds for every bushel of wheat, fifty imperial pounds for every bushel of barley, and thirty-nine imperial pounds for every bushel of oats.

MOTOR CARS.

THE MOTOR CARS REGULATION (BURGH OF KINGHORN) ORDER, 1908. Dated 25th May 1908.

In pursuance of the powers vested in me by Section 9, as read with Section 18 of the Motor Car Act, 1903, I, the Right Honourable John Sinclair, His Majesty's Secretary for Scotland, on the application of the Town Council of the Burgh of Kinghorn, being the local authority of the said Burgh, do hereby make the following regulations:—

1.
