Proposed Regulations amending the Public Health (Foreign Meat) Regulations (Scotland), 1908.

NOTICE is hereby given, in pursuance of the Rules Publication Act, 1893, as applied by the Public Health (Regulations as to Food) Act, 1907, that the Local Government Board for Scotland propose, on the expiration of forty days after the date of this notice, to make Regulations under the Public Health (Regulations as to Food) Act, 1907, amending the Public Health (Foreign Meat) Regulations (Scotland), 1908.

### WHITEHALL, August 9, 1909.

His Majesty has been graciously pleased to bestow the Edward Medal of the First Class on Frederick Watts, under the following circumstances:

On the 29th May 1908, two miners named Frederick Watts and Isaac Tanner were at work in the Hanham Colliery. They had prepared four charges for blasting close to each other, and Tanner had just set fire to the fuses. He appears to have taken longer than he expected to light the fuses, and before he could get to a place of safety one of the shots exploded, and a falling stone broke his arm. He found himself unable to move, and called out to Watts to help him; whereupon Watts, who had left the dangerous spot, went back and dragged him to a place of safety, although he knew that any of the three charges might explode at any moment.

Tanner unfortunately died in April 1909, from the effects of this injury.

The King has also been graciously pleased to award the Edward Medal of the Second Class to Henry Benton.

On the 27th October 1908, three men named John Churms, John Green, and Henry Benton, were at work in the Cadeby Main Colliery, when a very heavy fall of roof took place. Churms was buried, and Green partly so.

Benton, who was at some little distance, heard the fall, and though the roof was obviously in a dangerous condition, rushed to their assistance and managed to pull out Green, who was fastened by the legs. All their lamps had been extinguished and the men were in the dark.

Benton placed Green, who was helpless from his injuries, in safety, and then ran for lights and assistance. On his return he found that a further heavy fall had taken place, and it was clear that there was no hope of getting Churms out alive.

Benton undoubtedly saved Green's life by his prompt and brave action and at the risk of his

own life.

These two medals were presented personally by His Majesty to the medallists on the 22nd of July 1909.
