WESTMINSTER, MARCH 1, 1805.

This day the Lords being met, and the Commons attending, the Royal Assent was given to an act for amending an act passed in the last Session of Parliament, for granting additional annuities to the Proprietors of Stock created by two acts, passed in the 37th and 42d years of his present Majesty.

An act for allowing vessels employed in the Greenland whale fishery to complete their full number of men, at certain ports, for the present season.

Copy of a Letter from Admiral Lord Gardner; Commander in Chief of his Majesty's ships and vessels on the coast of Ireland, to William Marsden, Esq. dated at Cork, the 21st February, 1805.

SIR,
Enclosed I transmit to you, for the information of the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty, a letter I have this day received from Captain Lake, of his Majesty's ship Topaze, acquainting me of his having captured, on the 3d instant, in the latitude 48 deg. 22 min. N. longitude 15 deg. West, the

French privateer General Angereau, mounting fourteen twelve-pounders carronades, and eighty-eight men, belonging to Bayonne, which vessel had been cruising forty-seven days without making a capture. I am, &c.

His Majesty's ship Topaze, at sea, Feb. 13, 1805, lat. 48 deg. 22 min. long. 15 deg.

MY LORD,
I have the pleasure to acquaint your Lordship, that his Majesty's ship under my Command, has this day captured the French privateer General Angereau, Ketch-Rigged, mounting fourteen twelve-pounder carronades, and eighty-eight men on board. She is the same vessel that has been so frequently heard of, and that boarded and carried the William Heathcote West Indiaman. This cruise she has been out forty-seven days without making a capture.

Copy of a letter from Sir John Orde, Bart. Vice-Admiral of the Red, &c. to William Marsden, Esq. dated on board his Majesty's ship Glory, off Cadiz, the 5th Feb. 1805.

SIR,
Enclosed I send for their Lordships information, a copy of a letter received from the Hon. Captain Bouverie, commander of his Majesty's ship Mercury, under my orders, acquainting me with the capture of El Fuerte de Gibraltar, a Spanish gun-boat that had been driven from the land, in her passage from Cadiz to Algeiras, the evening before she was taken.

This vessel, copper-bottomed, newly equipped, and completely stored, seems well calculated for the service of Gibraltar. I am, &c.

JOHN ORDE.
His Majesty's ship Mercury, at sea, February 4, 1805.

SIR,
I have the honour to inform you, that I this morning fell in with and captured El Fuerte de Gibraltar, a Lateen-rigged Spanish gun-vessel, which sailed yesterday morning from Cadiz bound to Algeiras; she is armed with 2 long 12-pound-

ers, 2 16-pound carronades, several swivels, and a large quantity of small arms and cutlasses, and commanded by Signior Don Ramon Eutate, Lieutenant de Frigate, and had on board fifty-nine men. I am, Sir, &c.
