In conformity with the provisions of the Statute 56 and 57 Victoria, cap. 66, notice is hereby given that the Secretary of State for India in Council proposes, with the advice and assistance of the Civil Service Commissioners, at the expiration of forty days from the date of this Gazette, to make alterations as shown below in the Regulations for the admission of Candidates to the Civil Service of India, under section 32 of the Statute 21 and 22 Victoria, cap. 106.

For that part of Regulation 9, which at present stands as follows, viz. :—

“The principal Vernacular Language prescribed for each Province to which Candidates are assigned is as follows:

For the United Provinces of Agra and Oudh, the Punjab and the Central Provinces	Hindustani.
For Bengal ...	Hindustani or Bengali (at the option of the Candidate).
For Eastern Bengal and Assam	Bengali (unless it is the Candidate's mother tongue).
For Burma	Burmese.
For Bombay	Marathi.
For Madras	Tamil or Telugu (at the option of the Candidate).

In Hindustani the Candidate will be required to be acquainted with both the Persian and the Nagari character.

A Candidate assigned to Eastern Bengal and Assam, whose mother tongue is Bengali, must offer for examination Hindustani; and a Candidate assigned to Madras or Bengal, whose mother tongue is either of the languages shown

against his Province, must offer the other for examination."

It is proposed to substitute the following, that is to say:—

"The principal Vernacular Language prescribed for each Province to which Candidates are assigned is as follows:

- For the United Provinces of Agra and Oudh, the Punjab, and the Central Provinces Hindustani.
- For Bengal ... Hindustani or Bengali (at the option of the Candidate).
- For Eastern Bengal and Assam Bengali (unless it is the Candidate's mother tongue).
- For Burma ... Burmese.
- For Bombay ... Marathi (unless it is the Candidate's mother tongue).
- For Madras ... Tamil or Telugu (at the option of the Candidate).

In Hindustani the Candidate will be required to be acquainted with both the Persian and the Nagari character.

A Candidate assigned to Eastern Bengal and Assam, whose mother tongue is Bengali, must offer for examination Hindustani; a Candidate assigned to Bombay, whose mother tongue is Marathi, must offer for Examination Hindustani; and a Candidate assigned to Bengal or Madras, whose mother tongue is either of the languages shown against his Province, must offer the other for examination."

It is intended that the changes shall come into force as regards candidates selected at the open competitive examinations of 1910 and subsequent years.

"1. An Examination for admission to the Civil Service of India, open to all qualified persons, will be held in London in August of each year. The date of the Examination and the number of appointments to be made for each Province will be announced beforehand by the Civil Service Commissioners."

It is proposed to substitute the following, that is to say:—

"1. An Examination for admission to the Civil Service of India, open to all qualified persons, will be held in London in August of

each year for such number of appointments to that Service as the Secretary of State may on each occasion determine. The date of the Examination and the number of appointments to be made for each Province will be announced beforehand by the Civil Service Commissioners."

Consistently with the limitations specified above, Candidates are at liberty to name any of these subjects, provided that the maximum number of marks that can be obtained from the subjects chosen is limited to 6000. If this maximum is exceeded by a Candidate's selection he will be required to indicate one of his subjects, the marks for which should, in his case, be reduced so as to bring his maximum marks within the prescribed limit. The marks so reduced will be subject to a correspondingly reduced deduction under Clause 6.

"5. The merit of the persons examined will be estimated by marks; and the number set opposite to each subject in the preceding

Regulation denotes the greatest number of marks that can be obtained in respect of it.

"6. From the marks assigned to Candidates in each subject will be made such deduction as the Civil Service Commissioners may deem necessary in order to secure that no credit be allowed for merely superficial knowledge.

"7. The Examination will be conducted on paper, and *viva voce*, as may be deemed necessary.

"8. The marks obtained by each Candidate, in respect of each of the subjects in which he shall have been examined, will be added up, and the names of the several Candidates who shall have obtained, after the deduction above mentioned, a greater aggregate number of marks than any of the remaining Candidates, will be set forth in order of merit, and such Candidates shall be deemed to be Selected Candidates for the Civil Service of India, provided they appear to be in other respects duly qualified. Should any of the Selected Candidates become disqualified, the Secretary of State for India will determine whether the vacancy thus created shall be filled up or not. In the former case the Candidate next in order of merit, and in other respects duly qualified, shall be deemed to be a Selected Candidate."

"From the marks assigned to Candidates in each subject such deduction will be made as the Civil Service Commissioners may deem necessary in order to secure that no credit be allowed for merely superficial knowledge.

"Consistently with the limitations specified above Candidates are at liberty to name any of the foregoing subjects, provided that the maximum number of marks can be obtained from the subjects chosen is limited to 6000. If this maximum is exceeded by a Candidate's selection he will be required to indicate one of his subjects, the marks for which should, in his case, be reduced so as to bring his maximum marks within the prescribed limit. The marks so reduced will be subject to a correspondingly reduced deduction.

"Moreover, if a Candidate's handwriting is not easily legible a further deduction will, on that account, be made from the total marks otherwise accruing to him.

"5. A list of the competitors shall be made out in order of their proficiency as disclosed by the aggregate marks finally awarded to each competitor, and in that order so many competitors, up to the determined number of appointments, as are found by the Civil Service Commissioners to be qualified by examination, shall be designated to be Selected Candidates for the Civil Service of India, provided that they appear to be duly qualified in other respects. Should any Selected Candidate become disqualified, the Secretary of State for India will determine whether the vacancy thus created shall be filled or not. In the former case the Candidate next in order of merit, and in other respects duly qualified, shall be deemed to be a Selected Candidate."

In consequence of the proposed alterations specified above the Regulations now numbered 9, 10, 11 and 12 will be numbered 6, 7, 8 and 9 respectively.

It is intended that the changes should come into force for the Open Competitive Examination of 1911 and subsequent years.

SIDLAW SANATORIUM (TRANSFER)

(Power to the Trustees and Executive Committee of the Sidlaw Sanatorium for Consumption to transfer their Sanatorium property to the Dundee Royal Infirmary and the said Dundee Royal Infirmary to accept and hold same: Confirmation of Agreements for or with reference thereto: Vesting of Sanatorium property in Dundee Royal Infirmary: Reservation amendment or Alteration of Charters and other purposes.)

NOTICE is hereby given, that application is intended to be made to the Secretary for Scotland by Petition under the provisions of the Private Legislation Procedure (Scotland) Act, 1899, for a Provisional Order (hereinafter called "the Order") for effecting the following or some of the following objects and purposes (that is to say):—

1. To empower the Trustees and Executive Committee of the Sidlaw Sanatorium for Consumption (hereinafter called "the Sanatorium Authority") to transfer to the Dundee Royal Infirmary, incorporated by Royal Charter (hereinafter called "the Corporation"), and the Corporation to accept and hold the Sanatorium property, generally known as the Sidlaw Sanatorium for Consumption, and the lands and buildings connected therewith, and whole furniture and furnishings thereof, all in the Parish of Auchterhouse, in the County of Forfar, presently belonging to and under the management of the Sanatorium Authority, and all endowments, rights, powers, and privileges belonging to or appertaining to or enjoyed by the Sidlaw Sanatorium, or vested in the Sanatorium Authority, whether or not freed and discharged from any trusts affecting the same or any part thereof as the Order may prescribe (all hereinafter included in the expression "the Sanatorium"), on such terms and conditions as may have been or may be agreed on between the Sanatorium Authority and the Corporation, and to sanction and confirm any agreement or agreements entered into, or that may at any time before the confirmation of the Order by Parliament be entered into between the Sanatorium Authority and the Corporation, for or with reference to such transfer, and the terms and conditions thereof, and matters incidental thereto, and to make all necessary provisions and confer all necessary powers on the Sanatorium Authority and the Corporation for carrying into effect the said transfer and the several matters aforesaid.

2. To vest the Sanatorium in the Corporation, or to provide that the Sanatorium, when the same has been acquired by the Corporation as aforesaid, shall vest in them, and to release and discharge the Sanatorium Authority from all trusts and liabilities in respect of the Sanatorium, and to provide for the dissolution of the Sanatorium Authority.

3. To alter, amend, extend, and enlarge, if and so far as may be necessary for the purposes of the Order, all or some of the powers and provisions of the Charters granted to the Corporation, one by His late Majesty King George

the Third, dated the 8th day of May, 1819, and two by Her late Majesty Queen Victoria, dated respectively the 28th day of March, 1877, and the 8th day of August, 1898.

4. To transfer to the Corporation as part of the endowment fund of the Sanatorium the benefits of all gifts, bequests, and trusts in favour of the Sanatorium Authority contained in any Deed or Will, and to make provision for altering deeds and settlements endowing or conferring benefits upon the Sanatorium Authority, so as to transfer to the Corporation the full benefits thereby given.

5. To empower the Sanatorium Authority and the Corporation, or either of them to apply their property and funds to the purposes of the Order and the payment of any expenses in connection therewith.

6. To vary or extinguish all existing powers and privileges which would or might in any manner interfere with or prevent the carrying into effect of any of the objects of the Order, and to confer all rights and privileges necessary or expedient for effecting those objects or in relation thereto.

Printed Copies of the Draft Order will be lodged with the Secretary for Scotland, at his Office, Whitehall, London, one or before the 18th day of April next, and in the Office of the Clerk of the Parliaments, House of Lords, and the Private Bill Office of the House of Commons, on or before the 16th day of April next.

The procedure subsequent to the deposit of the Petition for and the Draft Order in the Office of the Secretary for Scotland will be by way of Provisional Order unless it is otherwise decided in terms of the Private Legislation Procedure (Scotland) Act, 1899, in which case the procedure may be by way of Private Bill, and this Notice will, subject to the Standing Orders of Parliament, apply to such Bill.
