Local Government (Scotland) Acts.

COUNTY COUNCIL ELECTORAL DIVISIONS OF FIFE.

Order by the Secretary for Scotland.

WHEREAS the Contents and Boundaries of the Electoral Divisions of the County of Fife comprised in the Parish of Beath were determined by an Order under the hand and seal of the Secretary for Scotland dated 25th March 1901 :

And whereas the County Council of the County of Fife have represented to me that it is desirable to divide the area comprised by the said Parish of Beath into three instead of two Electoral Divisions, and accordingly to alter the number of the County Councillors.

Now therefore I, the Right Honourable John, Baron Pentland, His Majesty's Secretary for Scotland, do, in virtue of the powers conferred on me by section 51 of the Local Government (Scotland) Act, 1889, order as follows :—

1. The number of County Councillors for the County of Fife shall be increased from 61 to 62.
2. The Order of the Secretary for Scotland dated 25th March 1901, dealing with the Electoral Divisions of the County of Fife is hereby recalled in so far as it relates to the Parish of Beath in the County of Fife, and from and after this date the said Parish of Beath shall be divided into three Electoral Divisions having the following names and contents, that is to say :

Names of Electoral Divisions.	Contents of Electoral Divisions.
Cowdenbeath	The whole area in the Police Burgh of Cowdenbeath.
Beath, North	That part of the Parish of Beath which lies to the north of the following line, viz., a line from the eastmost point of the boundary between the Parishes of Beath and Ballingry which is touched by the Lochfilty Burn, following westwards the course of the said Burn to the Bridge near Muirtown Farm on the road between Cautsdam and Kingseat, thence in a straight line north-westwards to the entrance gate at Whitehouse Cottage on the road leading from Oakfield to Gask, thence in a straight line to Wattiesford Bridge on the road leading from Gask to Nivenston, thence up the Drumnagoil Burn to the boundary between the Parishes of Beath and Dunfermline.
Beath, South	That part of the Parish of Beath which lies to the south of the line above mentioned except the portion thereof which is included within the Police Burgh of Cowdenbeath.
