COUNTY COUNCIL ELECTORAL DIVISIONS OF THE COUNTY OF FIFE.

Order by the Secretary for Scotland.

**W**HEREAS the County Council of the County of Fife have represented to me that the description of the existing Electoral Divisions of Leuchars, Newport, West Wemyss, and East Wemyss, as contained in the Orders of the Secretary for Scotland dated the 15th August 1904, and the 18th October 1907, should be revised:

And whereas I am of opinion that it is expedient to give effect to the representation of the said County Council:

Now therefore I, the Right Honourable John, Baron Pentland, His Majesty's Secretary for Scotland, in virtue of the powers conferred on me by section 51 of the Local Government (Scotland) Act, 1889, do hereby order and determine as follows:—

The hereinbefore mentioned Orders of 15th August 1904, and 18th October 1907, are hereby recalled in so far as concerns the Electoral Divisions of Leuchars, Newport, West Wemyss, and East Wemyss, and the following descriptions of

the names and contents of the said Electoral Divisions shall be substituted for the descriptions contained in the said Orders.

Name of Division.	Contents of Division.
1. Leuchars	(1) The portion of the Parish of Ferryport-on-Craig outwith the Police Burgh of Tayport. (2) The Parish of Leuchars. (3) The portion of the Parish of Forgan, outwith the Police Burgh of Newport.
2. Newport	The Police Burgh of Newport.
3. West Wemyss	That part of the Parish of Wemyss which lies to the west of a line beginning at a point at the Parish boundary 150 feet north-west from the north corner of the Standing Stone Plantation, thence along the north-west side of said plantation to the Standing Stone Road, thence north-eastward along said road to the north end of Newton Farm service road, thence along said road and through Newton Farm steading till the public road from Kirkcaldy to Leven is reached, thence in a direct line to the chimney of the Michael Pit, thence southwards in a direct line to the sea at high-water mark.
4. East Wemyss	The remainder of the Parish of Wemyss outwith the Police Burgh of Buckhaven, Methil and Innerleven.
