Education (Scotland) Act, 1908.

PROPOSED ORDER BY THE SCOTCH EDUCATION DEPARTMENT.

SCHOOL BOARD OF NEWBURGH.
SCHOOL BOARD OF ABDIE.

WHEREAS it has been represented to the Scotch Education Department (hereinafter called "the Department") by the School Board of Newburgh that it would be expedient that a part of the adjacent district of the School Board of Abdie, being the part hereinafter referred to and defined, should be united with the district of the School Board of Newburgh, so as for all purposes to constitute a district under one School Board :

And whereas on the 30th day of July 1909 the Department issued an Order bearing to annex a part of the parish of Abdie (being that part now included within the burgh of Newburgh in terms of a deliverance of the Sheriff of Fife dated the 21st day of July 1907) to the district of the School Board of Newburgh :

And whereas doubts have arisen as to the competency of the said Order, and it is expedient that these doubts should be removed and the representation of the School Board of Newburgh aforesaid given effect to :

And whereas the Department have consulted with the authorities concerned and, after due inquiry into the circumstances, are of opinion that it is expedient that the said part of the district of the School Board of Abdie should be united with the district of the School Board of Newburgh, so as for all purposes to constitute a district under one School Board.

Now therefore the Department in pursuance of section 22 of the Education (Scotland) Act, 1908, hereby Order as follows :—

1. The part of the Parish of Abdie annexed to Burgh of Newburgh by deliverance of the Sheriff of Fife as aforesaid, being part of the district of the School Board of Abdie, shall be united with the district of the School Board of Newburgh so as for all purposes to constitute a district under the said School Board of Newburgh.

2. In respect of the foregoing arrangement the School Board of Newburgh shall pay annually to the School Board of Abdie in satisfaction of all competent claims, and as one of the terms on which this Order is pronounced, the sum of one guinea for five years. Such payment shall be made in equal half-yearly instalments of ten shillings and sixpence, payable on the 11th November and 15th May in each year, the first instalment being payable on the 11th November 1909.

3. Notwithstanding the date hereof, this Order shall be held to have taken effect as from the 30th day of July 1909.
