ALTERATION OF PARISH AREAS.

PROPOSED ORDER NO. LI.

PARISHES OF NEWBATTLE AND COCKPEN.

WHEREAS it has been jointly represented to me by the Parish Councils of the Parishes of Newbattle and Cockpen that I should issue an Order under section 51 of the Local Government (Scotland) Act, 1889, and section 46 of the Local Government (Scotland) Act, 1894, altering the joint boundary of the said Parishes so far as it passes through (1) part of a row of houses known as 190 to 199 Monkswood; and (2) two houses known as 7 and 8 Saugh's

Cottages, all situate within the village of Newton Grange;

And whereas, after consulting with the authorities concerned, I am of opinion that it is expedient to give effect to the said representation:

Now therefore I, the Right Honourable John, Baron Pentland, His Majesty's Secretary for Scotland, do, in virtue of the powers conferred upon me by the Local Government (Scotland) Acts, order as follows:—

- 1. The eastern side of the public road from Edinburgh to Galashiels, passing through the Parish of Newbattle, shall hereafter form the boundary line between the Parish of Newbattle and the Parish of Cockpen from the point where the existing boundary line intersects the said public road (as shown on the Ordnance Survey Sheet, Edinburghshire, VIII, 15, Edition of 1907) to a point one thousand three hundred and ten feet southward thereof, where it again meets the said public road; and that part of the Parish of Cockpen which lies between the existing boundary line of the said Parishes and the said public road between the said points shall cease to be part of the Parish of Cockpen, and shall form part of the Parish of Newbattle.
- 2. The Parish Council of Newbattle shall assume responsibility for, and shall relieve the Parish Council of Cockpen of all advances which the latter body may be called upon to make for or on account of any pauper whose claim is derived (1) from birth in the portion of the Parish of Cockpen transferred to the Parish of Newbattle by the operation of this Order prior to the fifteenth day of May 1912; or (2) from residence for the statutory period in the said portion of the Parish of Cockpen prior to the fifteenth day of May 1912.

- 3. The portion of the Parish of Cockpen by this Order transferred to the Parish of Newbattle shall cease to be part of the County Council Electoral Division of Cockpen and shall form part of the County Council Electoral Division of Newbattle.
- 4. Nothing herein contained shall affect the rights of creditors or of persons having vested interests; and all questions of adjustment consequent on the alteration of boundaries hereby made are expressly reserved.
- 5. This Order shall take effect on the fifteenth day of May 1912.

ALTERATION OF PARISH AREAS.

PROPOSED ORDER NO. LII.

(PARISHES OF GALASHIELS AND MELROSE.)

WHEREAS it has been represented to me by the Parish Council of the Parish of Galashiels that I should issue an Order under section 51 of the Local Government (Scotland) Act, 1889, and section 46 of the Local Government (Scotland) Act, 1894, annexing to the Parish of Galashiels that portion of the Parish of Melrose which, by the Galashiels Drainage and Burgh Order 1908, was annexed to the Burgh of Galashiels; and whereas, after consulting with the authorities concerned, I am of opinion that it is expedient to give effect to the said representation:

Now therefore I, the Right Honourable John, Baron Pentland, His Majesty's Secretary for Scotland, do, in virtue of the powers conferred on me by the Local Government (Scotland) Acts, order as follows:—

- (1) The portion of the said Parish of Melrose described in the Second Schedule to the said Galashiels Drainage and Burgh Order 1908, shall cease to form part of the Parish of Melrose, and shall form part of the Parish of Galashiels.
- (2) The Parish Council of Galashiels shall assume responsibility for, and shall relieve the Parish Council of Melrose of all advances which the latter body may be called upon to make for or on account of any pauper whose claim is derived (1) from birth in the said portion of the Parish of Melrose prior to the 15th day of May 1911, or (2) from residence for the statutory period in the said portion of the Parish of Melrose prior to the 15th day of May 1911.
- (3) Nothing herein contained shall affect the rights of creditors or of persons having vested interests; and all questions of compensation or adjustment following on this Order, except so far as herein dealt with, are expressly reserved.

(4) This Order shall take effect as from the 15th day of May 1911.

DOCKYARD PORT OF ROSYTH.

THE following Notice has been sent to the Board of Trade in pursuance of Section 9 of the Harbours Transfer Act, 1862:—

In the Matter of the Harbours Transfer Act, 1862 (25 and 26 Vic. c. 69), and in the Matter of His Majesty's Dockyard Port at Rosyth.

To the Lords of the Committee of His Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council appointed for the consideration of matters relating to Trade and Foreign Plantations.

Whereas it was by the above-mentioned Act enancted in section 8 that where any special or local, or local and personal Act, or Act of a local or local and personal nature, then already passed, or to be passed before the end of the then present Session of Parliament—

- (1) Authorising or regulating the construction of a railway, or the execution of any work whatever, situated on or affecting tidal lands or the shore of the sea, or of any navigable river where, and so far up the same as the tide flows and reflows; or
- (2) Authorising or regulating the construction or improving of a harbour, dock, or pier, or works connected therewith, by any company, body corporate, commissioners, trustees, undertakers, persons, or person; or
- (3) Constituting or altering or regulating the constitution of any harbour or conservancy authority; or
- (4) Altering or regulating the powers or duties of any harbour or conservancy authority contains either expressly or by incorporation or reference or otherwise any provision for any of the purposes following:—
 - For preventing the construction or execution of any work or the doing of any thing without the consent or approval of the Admiralty, or for authorising or requiring any work to be constructed, executed, or maintained, or any thing to be done with the consent or on the requisition or to the satisfaction of the Admiralty:
 - For empowering the Admiralty to exercise any authority concerning Lifeboats, Mortars, Rockets, Tide Gauges, or Barometers to be provided by any undertakers:
 - For empowering the Admiralty to make a local survey or examination at the expense of any company, body, or person:
 - For empowering the Admiralty, in case of any work being abandoned or suffered to fall into disuse or decay, or in any other case to abate, remove, or alter any work or any part of it, or restore the site thereof to its former condition at the like expense:

For empowering the Admiralty to exercise any authority concerning lights to be maintained at night during the construction or execution of any work:

For empowering the Admiralty or the First Lord of the Admiralty to nominate or appoint a member or members of any Board or body of Trustees, Commissioners, or Conservators, or of any harbour or conservancy authority:

For empowering the Admiralty to determine any dispute or difference between or among any bodies or persons:

For empowering the Admiralty or the First Lord of the Admiralty to nominate or appoint any arbitrator, referee, or umpire, or any engineer, inspector, or officer, or any person to fill any place or discharge any duty under such Act:

or any other provision for the protection, management or regulation of harbours or navigation, or for the exercise of any control or power over or in relation to any harbour authority, or any other provision in any wise relating to conservancy, or authorising or requiring any act or thing concerning harbours or navigation or conservancy to be done by or in relation to the Admiralty,—

Then from and after the thirty-first day of December one thousand eight hundred and sixty-two, such Acts and all Enactments relative thereto should be read and construed as if in the respective provisions aforesaid the Board of Trade were named instead of the Admiralty, and the President of the Board of Trade instead of the First Lord of the Admiralty.

And whereas in the same Act was contained a provision forming section 9, whereby it was provided that where it appeared to the Admiralty that the interests of Her Majesty's Naval Service required that the whole or any part of any harbour, port, bay, estuary, or navigable river in, on, or adjoining to which there was or should be any of Her Majesty's dockyards, victualling yards, steam factory yards, arsenals, or naval stations, should be excepted, either entirely or in some respects, out of the operation of the therein last foregoing section, meaning the said section 8, the Admiralty might give notice in writing to the Board of Trade, that any such harbour, port, bay, estuary, or navigable river as aforesaid, or such part thereof as should be in the notice specified, was to be deemed so excepted, either entirely or in the respects therein mentioned; and that every such Notice should be published by the Admiralty in the London, Edinburgh, or Dublin Gazette (according as the place affected might be in England, Scotland, or Ireland), and that thereupon the harbour, port, bay, estuary, or navigable river to which such notice should relate, or the part thereof therein specified should either entirely or in the respects therein mentioned as the case might require, be and remain as if that Act had not been passed:

And whereas the Harbour of Rosyth has become a Dockyard Port within the meaning of the Dockyard Ports Regulation Act, 1865, and by an Order in Council made in pursuance of that Act and dated the fourth day of March 1911, the limits of the Dockyard Port of Rosyth within the meaning of that Act were defined for the purpose of that Act as follows, viz.:—

All the waters, bays, creeks, and rivers so far as the tide flows, excepting the Harbours

of Charlestown, South Queensferry, Port Edgar, and Inverkeithing, lying between the lines drawn as follows:—

On the East by a line drawn South (true) through the South Point of Carron Harbour in the county of Fife to the South Shore of the Forth.

On the West by a line drawn North (true) through Carriden House to the North Shore of the Forth.

And whereas it appears to the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty that the interests of His Majesty's Naval Service require that the Dockyard Port of Rosyth as defined by the above Order in Council should be entirely excepted out of the operation of section 8 of the Harbours Transfer Act, 1862.

Now therefore, the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty do by this writing, in pursuance of the Harbours Transfer Act, 1862, and by virtue and in exercise of the powers thereby vested in them, and of every other power enabling them in this behalf, give you, the Lords of the Committee of His Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council, appointed for the consideration of matters relating to trade and foreign plantations, notice,

That the Dockyard Port of Rosyth as defined by the said Order in Council is to be deemed entirely excepted out of the operation of section 8 of the Harbours Transfer Act, 1862. Provided always and it is hereby expressly declared by the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty that nothing in this notice shall be deemed to affect any estate, right, title, interest, prerogative, royalty, jurisdiction, or authority of or belonging to His Majesty the King, His heirs or successors, in right of His Office of Admiral, or to affect any right, duty, power, jurisdiction, or authority vested in or performed or exercised by or capable of being performed or exercised by the Lord High Admiral of the United Kingdom or the Commissioners for executing his office, otherwise than under or by virtue of any such provisions as aforesaid contained (either expressly or by incorporation or reference or otherwise) in any such special or local or local and personal Act or Acts of a local or local and personal nature (passed before the end of the present session of Parliament) as in section 8 of the Harbours Transfer Act, 1862, is described, it being the true intent and object of this notice only to limit the operation of that section in pursuance of the power in that behalf reserved to the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty in and by section 9 of the same Act, and not in anywise to abandon, abridge, restrict, or define any right, duty, power, jurisdiction, or authority belonging or attaching to the Lord High Admiral of the United Kingdom or the Commissioners for executing his office independently of any such provisions as aforesaid, all which rights, duties, powers, jurisdictions, and authorities it is hereby expressly declared shall remain and be in all respects and to all intents and purposes whatsoever as if this notice had not been given.

THE MOTOR CARS REGULATION (COUNTY OF RENFREW) ORDER, 1911. Dated August 23, 1911

In pursuance of the powers vested in me by section 9, as read with section 18 of the Motor Car Act, 1903, I, the Right Honourable John, Baron Pentland, His Majesty's Secretary for Scotland, on the application of the County Council of the County of Renfrew, being the local authority of the said County, do hereby make the following regulations:—

1. This Order may be cited as "The Motor Cars Regulation (County of Renfrew) Order, 1911," and the regulations hereby prescribed shall take effect within the limits or places referred to therein on and after the respective dates at which, for the purpose of giving effect thereto, the local authority shall, in terms of section 10 of the Motor Car Act, 1903, place notices in conspicuous places on or near such limits or places.

A person shall not drive a motor car at a speed exceeding ten miles per hour within the limits or places specified in the schedule to this Order.

^{*} Section 8 of the Corn Returns Act, 1882, provides that where returns of purchases of British Corn are made to the Local Inspector of Corn Returns in any other measure than the imperial bushel or by weight or by a weighed measure, that Officer shall convert such returns into the imperial bushel, and in the case of weight or weighed measure the conversion is to be made at the rate of sixty imperial pounds for every bushel of wheat, fifty imperial pounds for every bushel of barley, and thirty-nine imperial pounds for every bushel of oats.

INDIA OFFICE, LONDON, August 16, 1911. RULES PUBLICATION ACT, 1893.

In conformity with the provisions of the Statute 56 and 57 Victoria, cap. 66, notice is hereby given that the Secretary of State for India in Council purposes, with the advice and assistance of the Civil Service Commissioners, at the expiration of forty days from the date of this Gazette, to make an alteration as shown below in the Regulations for the admission of candidates to the Civil Service of India, under section 32 of the Statute 21 and 22 Victoria, cap. 106.

For that part of Regulation 9 which at present stands as follows, viz.:—

"No person will be admitted to the examination from whom the Secretary to the Civil Service Commissioners has not received on or before the 1st July (or, if that date should fall on a Sunday or public holiday, then on or before the first day thereafter on which their office is open) in the year in which the examination is to be held, on application, in the handwriting of the candidate, on the prescribed form."

It is proposed to substitute the following, that is to say:—

"No person will be admitted to the examination from whom the Secretary to the Civil Service Commissioners has not received on or before the 1st June (or, if that date should fall on a Sunday or public holiday, then on or before the first day thereafter on which their office is open) in the year in which the examination is to be held, on application, in the handwriting of the candidate, on the prescribed form."

It is intended that the change should come into force for the Open Competition Examination of 1912 and subsequent years.
