TENDERS FOR LOANS ON TREASURY BILLS.

1. The Lords Commissioners of H.M. EXPLOSIVE SUBSTANCE.

ORDER OF SECRETARY OF STATE, No. 4 (B), DATED MARCH 4, 1912, RELATING TO THE CONVEYANCE OF EXPLOSIVE IN A MECHANICALLY DRIVEN CARRIAGE OR BOAT.

Explosives Act, 1875 (38 Vict., c. 17).

Whereas by Part I. (section 37) of the Explosives Act, 1875 (hereinafter referred to as the Act), it is provided that a Secretary of State may from time to time make, and when made, rescind, alter, or add to, byelaws for regulating the conveyance, loading, and unloading of gunpowder, in any case in which byelaws made under any other provision of the Act do not apply:

And whereas by Part II. (section 39) of the Act it is declared that, subject to the provisions subsequently in Part II. of the Act contained, Part I. of the Act relating to gunpowder shall apply to every other description of explosive in like manner as if the provisions of such Part I. were re-enacted in such Part II. with the substitution of that description of explosive for gunpowder:

Now, therefore, I, one of His Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, hereby order that the byelaws made by virtue of the powers aforesaid, known as Order of Secretary of State No. 4, shall be altered as follows:—

For clause (m) of byelaw 3 of the aforesaid Order the following shall be substituted, viz. :—

(m) In the case of a carriage or boat conveying explosive exceeding 100 lbs. due provision shall be made for preventing the introduction into such carriage or boat of fire, lucifer matches, or ~~any substance or article~~ likely to cause explosion or fire, or the introduction of any iron, steel, or grit, so as to come into contact with such explosives. This regulation shall not prevent the introduction of an artificial light of such construction, position, or character, or of safety matches of such character as not to cause any danger of fire or explosion; nor shall it prevent the conveyance of explosive in a mechanically driven carriage or boat subject to such conditions as may be approved by the Secretary of State.
