[Classification of Explosives.—Order in Council No. 1 (B), Amending No. 1. Explosives Act, 1875 (38 Vict., c. 17).]

At the Court at Buckingham Palace, the 11th day of April 1913.

#### PRESENT,

The King's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS by the 106th Section of the Explosives Act, 1875 (in this Order referred to as the Act), it is provided that His Majesty from time to time, by Order in Council, may define for the purposes of this Act the composition, quality, and character of any explosive, and may classify explosives;

And whereas in pursuance of the Act an Order in Council was made on the 5th day of August 1875, classifying explosives;

And whereas the provisions of the first section of the Rules Publication Act, 1893, have been complied with:

Now, therefore, in pursuance of the abovementioned provisions of the Act, His Majesty is pleased, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, to order as follows :--

Any explosive containing a perchlorate and not included in any of the Classes 3, 4, or 5, as defined in the said Order in Council dated 5th August 1875, shall be deemed to belong to Class 2 (Nitrate-mixture Class), and all orders, rules, or regulations applying to explosive of Olass 2 shall be deemed to apply to the said explosive.

WHEREAS by the Seal Fisheries (North Pacific) Act, 1895 hereinafter called the Act of 1895), it is enacted that His Majesty in Council may by Order in Council prohibit, during the period specified by the Order, the catching of seals by British ships in such parts of the seas to which that Act applies as are specified in the Order;

And whereas by the Seal Fisheries (North Paoific) Act, 1912 (hereinafter called the Act of 1912), it is enacted that His Majesty in Council shall have the like power to prohibit the killing, taking, and hunting of sea otters within the waters to which the Act of 1895 applies;

And whereas it is further provided by the Act of 1895 that for carrying into effect an arrangement with any foreign State an Order in Council may provide that the powers under the Act of any commissioned officer on full pay in the naval service of His Majesty may, subject to any limitations, conditions, modifications, and exceptions specified in the Order, be exercised in relation to a British ship, and the equipment, unw, and certificate thereof, by such officers of the said foreign State as are specified in the Order;

And whereas it is further provided by the Act of 1895 that any such Order may contain any limitations, conditions, modifications, and exceptions which appear to His Majesty in Council expedient for carrying into effect the object of the Act;

And whereas by the Act of 1912 it is enacted that the seas with respect to which an Order in Council may be made under the Act of 1895 shall include the seas within such part of the Pacific Ocean as is north of the thirtieth parallel of north latitude, including the Seas of Behring, Kamchatka, Okhotsk, and Japan ;

And whereas a convention has been concluded between His Majesty the King, the President of the United States of America, His Majesty the Emperor of Japan, and His Majesty the Emperor of Russia, whereby British subjects and British vessels engaged in pelagic sealing in the waters to which this Order applies may be seized and detained by the naval or other duly commissioned officers of any of the parties to the said convention and delivered as soon as practicable to an authorised official of their own nation;

And whereas the provisions of the Rules Publication Act, 1893, have been complied with:

Now, therefore, His Majesty, in virtue of the above powers, and of all other powers enabling Him in that behalf, is hereby pleased, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, to order, and it is hereby ordered, as follows :--

1. From and after the commencement of this Order the catching of seals and the killing, taking, and hunting of sea otters by British ships is hereby prohibited within the waters to which this Order applies.

2. The powers under the Act of 1895 of a commissioned officer on full pay in the naval service of His Majesty may be exercised in relation to a British ship, and the equipment, crew, and certificate thereof, by a naval or other duly commissioned officer of the United States of America, or of His Majesty the Emperor of Japan, or of His Majesty the Emperor of Japan, or of His Majesty the Emperor of Japan, or of His Majesty the Emperor of Jorgen officer "), but subject to the limitations, conditions, modifications, and exceptions following, that is to say.—

(1) The said powers shall not be exercised by an authorised foreign officer, except in relation to British ships engaged in hunting seals within the waters to which the Order applies.

(2) A British ship shall not be liable to seizure or detention by an authorised foreign officer by reason of the contravention of any regulations made under section 2 of the Act of 1895.

(3) The powers under section 3 of the Act of 1895 of detaining any portion of the equipment or any of the crew, and the powers under section 4 of giving a provisional certificate in lieu of a ship's certificate which is seized and retained, or of endorsing on a certificate the ground on which it was seized, and of directing the ship to proceed forthwith to a specified port, shall not be exercised in relation to a British ship by an authorised foreign officer.

(4) Where an authorised foreign officer in

exercise of the said powers stops and examines and detains a British ship or her certificate of registry, he shall as soon as possible hand over the ship, or deliver or transmit the certificate, as the case may be, either to the commanding officer of a British cruiser or to the nearest British authority, as defined by this Order, and shall then, or within a reasonable time thereafter, satisfy such officer or authority that there were reasonable grounds for the detention or seizure, and that the case is proper to be adjudicated in a British court, and also furnish to such officer or authority the evidence sufficient, in the opinion of such officer or authority. for such adjudication; and if the said foreign officer fails to satisfy such officer or authority, or to furnish to such officer or authority such sufficient evidence as aforesaid, the said officer or authority may release the ship.

3.-(1) Where the commanding officer of a British cruiser receives a British ship from an authorised foreign officer, and is satisfied that there were reasonable grounds for the detention or seizure, and that the case is proper to be adjudicated in a British court, he may exercise the powers conferred by section 4 of the Act of 1895 as if he had himself stopped and examined and detained the ship, and that section shall apply accordingly.

(2) Where the commanding officer of a British cruiser, or a British authority, receives a British ship from an authorised foreign officer, and sends the case for adjudication in a British court, he shall, for the purposes of section 76 of the Merchant Shipping Act, 1894, be deemed to have himself seized or detained the said ship.

4. Nothing in this Order shall apply to Indians, Ainos, Aleuts, or other aborgines dwelling on the coasts of the waters to which this Order applies, who carry on pelagic sealing in cances not transported by or used in connection with other vessels, and propelled entirely by oars, paddles, or sails, and manned by not more than five persons each, in the way hitherto practised, and without the use of firearms, provided that such Indians, Ainos, Aleuts, or other aborigines are not in the employment of other persons, or under contract to deliver the skins to any person.

5. For the purposes of this Order, the expression "British authority" means any officer of Customs in His Majesty's dominions, and any British consular officer having authority as such in any port or place.

"The waters to which the Order applies" means such part of the Pacific Ocean beyond the limits of territorial waters as is north of the thirtieth parallel of north latitude, including the Seas of Behring, Kamchatka, Okhotsk, and Japan.

6. The Seal Fisheries (North Pacific) Order in Council, 1895, is hereby repealed, without prejudice to anything done or suffered under that Order.

7. This Order may be cited as "The Seal Fisheries (North Pacific) Order in Council, 1913."

WHEREAS by section 3 of the Seal Fisheries (North Pacific) Act, 1912, all persons were prohibited from using any port within the United Kingdom for purposes of pelagic sealing contary to any Order in Council made under the Seal Fisheries (North Pacific) Acts, 1895 and 1912;

And whereas by section 4 of the Seal Fisheries (North Pacific) Act, 1912. the importation of the skins of seals captured in contravention of any such Order as last aforesaid was prohibited;

And whereas by section 5 (1) of the said Act it was enacted that His Majesty might by Order in Council extend the provisions of the two hereinbefore recited sections to any part of His Majesty's Dominions outside the United Kingdom, subject to such modifications and adaptations as might appear to Him to be necessary, provided that those provisions should not be so extended to a self-governing Dominion except with the consent of the Governor-General in Council or Governor in Council of the Dominion;

And whereas the Commonwealth of Australia is a self-governing Dominion for the purposes of section 5 of the said Act;

And whereas the Governor-General in Council of the Commonwealth of Australia has consented that the provisions of sections 3 and 4 of the said Act shall be extended to the Commonwealth of Australia subject to the modifications and adaptations hereinafter contained :

Now, therefore, His Majesty, by virtue and in exercise of the powers in this behalf by the Seal Fisheries (North Pacific) Act, 1912, in His Majesty vested, is pleased, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, to order, and it is hereby ordered, as follows :--

1. This Order may be cited as the Seal Fisheries (Commonwealth of Australia) Order in Council, 1913.

2. From and after the commencement of this Order sections 3 and 4 of the Seal Fisheries (North Pacific) Act, 1912, shall apply to the Commonwealth of Australia subject to the following modifications and adaptations, that is to say :--

(i) For the words "the United Kingdom" in section 3 (1) of the said Act there shall be deemed to be substituted the words "the Commonwealth of Australia."

(ii) In section 3 (2) of the said Act for the modifica words "the Secretary of State," wherever tained:

those words occur, there shall be deemed to be substituted the words "the Minister for Trade and Customs," and for the words "the Board of Trade or any Officer of the Board "the words" any Officer of Customs."

(iii) At the end of section 3 (2) there shall be deemed to be added the words "or any Act of the Parliament of the Commonwealth relating to navigation or shipping."

(iv) In section 4 of the said Act there shall be deemed to be substituted for the words "be deemed to be included in the table of prohibitions and restrictions contained in section 42 of the Customs Consolidation Act, 1876, and that section shall apply accordingly," the words "be prohibited to be imported, and shall be deemed to be included in the table of prohibited imports contained in section 52 of the Customs Act, 1901-1910, and that Act shall apply accordingly."

3. This Order shall come into operation on such date as shall be fixed by the Governor-General in Council.

And whereas the Colony of Newfoundland is a self-governing Dominion for the purposes of section 5 of the said Act;

And whereas the Governor in Council of Newfoundland has consented that the provisions of sections 3 and 4 of the said Act shall be extended to Newfoundland subject to the modifications and adaptations hereinafter contained:

Now, therefore, His Majesty by virtue and adaptations as might appear to him the in exercise of the powers in this behalf by the Seal Fisheries (North Pacific) Act, 1912, in His Majesty vested, is pleased, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, to order, and it is hereby ordered, as follows :-

1. This Order may be cited as the Seal Fisheries (Newfoundland) Order in Council, 1913.

2. From and after the commencement of this Order sections 3 and 4 of the Seal Fisheries (North Pacific) Act, 1912, shall apply to Newfoundland, subject to the following modifications and adaptations, that is to say :-

(i) For the words "Within the United Kingdom" in section 3 (1) of the said Act there shall be deemed to be substituted the words "in the Colony of Newfoundland."

(ii) In section 3 (2) of the said Act for the words "Secretary of State," wherever such words occur, there shall be deemed to be substituted the words "Colonial Secre-tary," and for the words "The Board of Trade or any officer of the Board" the words " any Officer of the Customs."

(iii) In section 4 of the said Act there shall be deemed to be substituted for the words "section 42 of the Customs Consolidation Act, 1876," the words "Schedule C. of the Customs Tariff," and for the word "section" in the last line of the said section 4 there shall be deemed to be substituted the word "schedule."

3. This Order shall come into operation on such date as may be fixed by the Governor in Council.

WHEREAS His Majesty, by virtue of the authority conferred on Him by the Copyright Act, 1911, and having regard to the provisions of the Berlin Copyright Convention, was pleased to make an Order in Council, dated the 24th day of June 1912 (hereinafter called the Principal Order), extending the protection of the said Act to certain classes of works to which protection is guaranteed by the said Convention;

And whereas by Orders in Council dated the 17th day of March 1913, the provisions of the Principal Order were extended, subject to certain modifications, to Denmark and the Netherlands;

And whereas the Kingdom of the Netherlands has acceded on behalf of the Netherlands East Indies and the Colony of Curaçao, to the said Berlin Copyright Convention subject to the reservations mentioned in the Schedule to this Order :

Now therefore, His Majesty, by and with the advice of His Privy Council and by virtue of the authority conferred upon Him by the Copyright Act, 1911, is pleased to order, and it is hereby ordered as follows :---

(1) The Principal Order shall extend to the Netherlands East Indies and the Colony of Curaçao as if they were amongst the foreign countries of the Copyright Union therein named, subject to the following modifications :—

(a) The provisions of Article (2), Proviso (iii.) (b) and of Article (2), Proviso (iii.) (c) of the Principal Order shall apply as if the Netherlands East Indies and the Colony of Curaçao were included amongst the foreign countries named in those provisions.

(b) In the application to works of which the country of origin is the Netherlands East Indies or the Colony of Curaçao of section 1 (2) (d) and 19 of the Copyright Act, 1911, the date of this Order shall be substituted for the commencement of the Act in sections 19 (7) and 19 (8) wherever that expression occurs and the 1st April 1913 for the passing of the Act.

(d) In the application to such works of the provisions of section 24 of the Copyright Act, 1911, the date of this Order shall be substituted for the commencement of the Act wherever that expression occurs in sub-section (1) (a) and for the 26th July 1910 in sub-section (1) (b).

(d) In the application to such works of the provisions of Article 3 of the Principal Order, the date of this Order shall be substituted for the commencement of the Principal Order.

And the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury are to give the necessary Orde s accordingly.

REGULATIONS RESPECTING OPEN COMPETITIVE · EXAMINATIONS FOR THE SITUATION OF FEMALE Typist in the General Post Office, London, and in the Inland Revenue Department in London.

# These Regulations are liable to alteration from time to time.

1. The limits of age for this situation are 18 and 30. If an Examination begins in one of the first four months of any year, Candidates must be of the prescribed age on the 1st day of January in that year. If an Examination begins in one of the second four months of any year, Candidates must be of the prescribed age on the 1st day of May in that year. If an Examination begins in one of the last four months of any year, Candidates must be of the prescribed age on the 1st day of September in that year.

In reckoning age for competition, persons who have served for two consecutive years in any Civil situation to which they were admitted with the Certificate of the Civil Service Commissioners, may deduct from their actual age any time, not exceeding five years, which they may have spent in such service.

2. At each Examination the number of Candidates to be selected will be such as may from time to time be fixed.

3. Candidates will be required to satisfy the Civil Service Commissioners—

(a) That they are unmarried, or widows.
