WHEREAS His Majesty, by virtue of the authority conferred on him by the Copyright Act, 1911, and having regard to the provisions of the Berlin Copyright Convention, was pleased to make an Order in Council, dated the 24th day of June 1912 (hereinafter called the Principal Order), extending the protection of the said Act to certain classes of works to which protection is guaranteed by the said Convention.

And whereas by Orders in Council, dated the 17th day of March 1913, and the 11th day of April 1913, the provisions of the Principal Order were extended, subject to certain modifications, to Denmark, the Netherlands, the Netherlands East Indies, and the Colony of Curação.

And whereas the Kingdom of the Netherlands has acceded on behalf of the Colony of Surinam to the said Berlin Copyright Convention, subject to the reservations mentioned in the Schedule to this Order:

Now therefore, His Majesty, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, and by virtue of the authority conferred upon Him by the Copyright Act, 1911, is pleased to order, and it is hereby ordered, as follows:—

- (1) The Principal Order shall extend to the Colony of Surinam as if it were amongst the foreign countries of the Copyright Union therein named, subject to the following modifications:—
  - (a) The provisions of Article (2), Proviso (iii.) (b), and of Article (2), Proviso (iii.) (c), of the Principal Order shall apply as if the Colony of Surinam were included amongst the foreign countries named in those provisions.
  - (b) In the application to works of which the country of origin is the Colony of Surinam of Section 1 (2) (d) and 19 of the Copyright Act, 1911, the date of this Order shall be substituted for the commencement of the Act in Sections 19 (7) and 19 (8) wherever that expression occurs, and the 1st April 1913, for the passing of the Act.
- (c) In the application to such works of the provisions of Section 24 of the Copyright Act, 1911, the date of this Order shall be substituted for the commencement of the Act wherever that expression occurs in subsection (1) (a) and for the 26th July 1910 in subsection (1) (b).

d) In the application to such works of the provisions of Article 3 of the Principal Order the date of this Order shall be substituted for the commencement of the Principal Order.

And Treasure the date of this Order shall be substituted for the Principal Order.

And the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury are to give the necessary orders accordingly.

WHEREAS by Section 3 of the Seal
Fisheries (North Pacific) Act, 1912, all
persons were prohibited from using any port

within the United Kingdom for purposes of pelagic sealing contrary to any Order in Council made under the Seal Fisheries (North Pacific) Acts, 1895 and 1912.

And whereas by Section 4 of the Seal Fisheries North Pacific) Act, 1912, the importation of the skins of seals captured in contravention of any such Order as last aforesaid was prohibited.

And whereas by Section 5 (1) of the said Act it was enacted that His Majesty might by Order in Council extend the provisions of the two hereinbefore recited sections to any part of His Majesty's Dominions outside the United Kingdom, subject to such modifications and adaptations as might appear to him to be necessary, provided that those provisi ns should not be so extended to a self-governing Dominion except with the consent of the Governor-General in Council or Governor in Council of the Dominion.

And whereas the Dominion of New Zealand

is a self-governing Dominion for the purposes of Section 5 f the said Act.

And whereas the Governor in Council of New Zealand has consented that the provisions of Sections 3 and 4 of the said Act shall be extended to New Zealand subjet to the modifications and adaptations hereinafter contained.

Now, therefore, His Majesty, by virtue and in exercise of the powers in this behalf by the Seal Fisheries (North Pacific) Act, 1912, in His Majesty vested, is pleased, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, to order, and it is hereby ordered, as follows:—

- 1. This Order may be cited as the Seal Fisheries New Zealand Order in Council, 1913.
- 2. From and after the commencement of this Order Sections 3 and 4 of the Seal Fisheries (North Pacific) Act, 1912, shall apply to New Zealand subject to the following modifications and adaptations, that is to say—
  - (i.) For the words "within the United Kingdom" in section 3 (1) of the said Act there shall be deemed to be substituted the words "in the Dominion of New Zealand."
  - (ii.) In Section 3 (2 of the said Act for the words "Secretary f State" wherever such w rds occur, there shall be deemed to be substituted the words "Minister of Marine" and for the words "the Board of Trade or any Officer of the Board" the words "any Officer of the Marine Department or of Customs."
  - (iii.) In Section 4 of the said Act there shall be deemed to be substituted for the words "section 42 of the Customs Consolidation Act, 1876," the words "Section 91 of the Customs Law Act, 1908."
  - 3. This Order shall come into operation on such date as may be fixed by the Governor in Council.

#### FOREIGN OFFICE, June 14, 1913.

With reference to the notification published in the London Gazette of the 4th April last, His Majesty's Minister at Sofia has reported to His Majesty's Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs that, according to a telegram received from the British Vice-Consul at Cavalla, that port has been closed for a month, and still remains closed. With the permission of the harbour-master, however, vessels laden with provisions may call and discharge them at Cavalla, but they may not unload or load other cargo or land or embark passengers, and must enter the port by day.

#### FOREIGN OFFICE, June 16, 1913.

His Majesty's Minister at Sofia has reported to His Majesty's Secretary of State for Foreign

Affairs, by telegraph, that he has received a communication from the Bulgarian Government to the following effect:—

Pending the removal, which is proceeding as quickly as possible, of the mines laid at Rodosto, Tchantadere, and Sharkeui, their positions are being marked by red pyramidal buoys. Ships passing should keep '5 kilom. off the shore. Rodosto and Sharkeui have been opened, but ships calling must whistle for a pilot on arrival in sight of port. The entrance channel in both cases passes between one pair of black pyramidal buoys bearing at Rodosto south 65° east of the pier and at Sharkeui due west of the town. Varna has been opened on the following conditions:—Pilotage is compulsory within an area bounded by the coast-line, longitude 28° 10' Greenwich and latitude 43° 5' and 43 18'. Vessels must await pilot in Baltchik Bay. The port must be entered and left in daylight only.

<sup>\*</sup> Section 8 of the Corn Returns Act, 1882, provides that where returns of purchases of British Corn are made to the Local Inspector of Corn Returns in any other measure than the imperial bushel or by weight or by a weighed measure, that Officer shall convert such returns into the imperial bushel, and in the case of weight or weighed measure the conversion is to be made at the rate of sixty imperial pounds for every bushel of wheat, fifty imperial pounds for every bushel of barley, and thirty-nine imperial pounds for every bushel of oats.
