HOUSING, TOWN PLANNING, &c., ACT,

THE CITY AND ROYAL BURGH OF EDINBURGH.
FOUNTAINBRIDGE AREA.

ORDER by the Local Government Board for Scotland, authorising the Council of the City and Royal Burgh of Edinburgh to prepare a Town Planning Scheme in respect of an area of land situated wholly within the said Burgh.

Royal Burgh of Edinburgh (hereinafter referred to as "The Council"), being the Local Authority within the said Burgh under the Housing, Town Planning, &c., Act, 1909, passed a resolution on the ninth day of April 1913, applying to Us, the Local Government Board for Scotland, to authorise the Council to prepare a Town Planning Scheme in respect of land situated in the vicinity of Fountainbridge and wholly within the said Burgh, the area of which land is shown by a boundary line coloured red on a certain map marked "City of Edinburgh—Town Planning Act, 1909—Fountainbridge Area—Map No. 2," and is more particularly described in the Local Authority's advertisements of their intention to apply to Us for authority to prepare the said Scheme:

AND WHEREAS the resolution of the Council, together with the map above referred to, has been transmitted to Us, and We have enquired into the application and into the circumstances connected therewith:

Now therefore We, the Local Government

Board for Scotland, do hereby, under the provisions of subsections (2) and (3) of Section 54 of the Housing, Town Planning, &c., Act, 1909, authorise the Council to prepare a Town Planning Scheme with reference to the Land (including land already built upon and land not likely to be used for building purposes) to which the aforesaid application relates.

AND WE Do further authorise the Council in the preparation of the Scheme as aforesaid to provide therein for the demolition or alteration of any of the buildings on the land included in the area in respect of which a scheme may be prepared as aforesaid, so far as may be necessary for carrying the Scheme into effect.

## NATIONAL INSURANCE.

NATIONAL HEALTH INSURANCE.

The National Health Insurance (Membership of Approved Societies) Order, 1913, dated the 26th day of September 1913, made under Section 78 of the National Insurance Act, 1911 (1 & 2 Geo. 5, c. 55), by the National Health Insurance Joint Committee, acting jointly with the several Bodies of Commissioners, with reference to Insured Persons who have purported to join Approved Societies to Membership of which they are by reason of residence not admissible.

Whereas by Section 78 of the National Insurance Act, 1911 (in this Order called "the Act") it is amongst other things provided that if any difficulty arises in bringing Part I. of the Act into operation, the Insurance Commissioners, with the consent of the Treasury, may by Order make any appointment and do anything which appears to them necessary or expedient for bringing Part I. of the Act into operation, and any such Order may modify the provisions of the Act so far as may appear necessary or desirable for carrying the Order into effect:

And whereas by virtue of Sections 80, 81, and 82 of the Act respectively the Scottish Insurance Commissioners, the Irish Insurance Commissioners, and the Welsh Insurance Commissioners for the purpose of carrying Part I. of the Act into effect in Scotland, Ireland, and Wales respectively, have the like powers and duties as are by the Act imposed on the Insurance Commissioners:

And whereas by the National Insurance (Joint Committee) Regulations, 1912, it is amongst other things provided that the National Health Insurance Joint Committee shall exercise and perform either alone or jointly with the several bodies of Commissioners as the case may require

such of the powers and duties of those bodies under Section 78 of the Act as may be necessary to enable the Joint Committee to exercise and perform the several powers and duties of the Joint Committee under the Act and those Regulations, and that the Joint Committee may, under sub-section (2) of Section 83 of the Act make such financial adjustments as may be necessary between the several funds under the control and management of the several bodies of Commissioners:

And whereas by virtue of Section 23 of the Act the Insurance Commissioners have power to approve any society for the purposes of Part I. of the Act, and by the National Insurance (Joint Committee) Regulations, 1912, it is provided that the National Health Insurance Joint Committee alone shall exercise the power of approving for the purposes aforesaid any society and any separate section of a society which has among its members insured persons resident in more than one part of the United Kingdom:

And whereas under the above-mentioned provisions of the Act and the said Regulations a society is not entitled to accept as a member for the purposes of Part I. of the Act an insured person who is resident in some part of the United Kingdom other than that for which it has been approved:

And whereas both before and immediately after the commencement of the Act many insured persons owing to a misapprehension of the provisions of the Act and the said Regulations purported to become members of societies which had not been approved for that part of the United Kingdom in which such insured persons were then respectively resident:

And whereas it is apprehended that the admission of any such person as aforesaid to membership in the society was wholly inoperative, and that after the prescribed time for joining an approved society had elapsed such person became a deposit contributor, and that any sums paid by the society in respect of his benefits or the administration of his benefits were improperly paid:

And whereas it is inequitable that in the circumstances aforesaid such person should be deprived of the advantage of joining an approved society within the prescribed time, and by reason of the premises a difficulty has arisen within the meaning of Section 78 aforesaid:

Now, therefore, the National Health Insurance Joint Committee, acting jointly with the Insurance Commissioners, the Scottish Insurance Commissioners, the Irish Insurance Commissioners, and the Welsh Insurance Commissioners, in pursuance of the powers conferred on them by the Act and by the National Insurance (Joint Committee) Regulations, 1912, and of all other powers enabling them in that behalf, with the consent of the Treasury, hereby order as follows:—

1. Where owing to a misapprehension of the provisions of the Act and of the said recited Regulations, or otherwise, an insured person has at any time before the date of this Order purported to become a member, for the purposes of Part I. of the Act, of a society which was not approved for that part of the United Kingdom in which he was then resident, and he has not before the date aforesaid received notice either from the society or from the Insurance Commissioners for that part of the United Kingdom

that he is not a member of the society, he shall be deemed to have been validly admitted to membership of that society for the purposes aforesaid.

- 2.—(1) Any sums paid by a society in respect of the benefits or the administration of benefits of an insured person who under the provisions of this Order is deemed to have become a member of the society shall be deemed to have been as properly paid as if the person had in fact become a member of the society.
- (2) Any sums credited or debited to a society in respect of such insured person as aforesaid in the National Health Insurance Fund of the part of the United Kingdom for which the society is approved shall be deemed to have been as properly credited or debited, as the case may be, as if the insured person had been a member of the society and had been resident in that part of the United Kingdom.
- 3. This Order may be cited as the National Health Insurance (Membership of Approved Societies) Order, 1913.

#### CIVIL SERVICE COMMISSION, October 7, 1913.

The Civil Service Commissioners hereby give notice that the following Regulations are published with the consent of the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury, viz. :-

REGULATIONS respecting Open Competitive Examinations for the situation of Woman Clerk in the National Health Insurance Commission, Ireland.

These Regulations are liable to alteration from time to time.

1. The limits of age for this situation are 18 and 20. If an Examination begins in one of the first six months of any year, candidates must be of the prescribed age on the first day of March in that year. If an Examination begins in one of the last six months of any year, candidates must be of the prescribed age on the first day of September in that year.

In reckoning age for competition, persons who have served for two full consecutive years in any Civil situation to which they were admitted with the Certificate of the Civil Service Commissioners may deduct from their actual age any time not exceeding five years which they may have spent in such service.

Persons transferred to situations in the Post Office from a Telephone Company or Municipal Telephone Undertaking, on the absorption of such Company or Undertaking by the Post Office, may reckon, as if it were service in a situation to which they were admitted with the Certificate of the Civil Service Commissioners, their continuous service in the Post Office, as well as so much of their previous continuous service in the Telephone Company or Undertaking (or in any Telephone Company or Municipal Telephone Undertaking previously absorbed by it) as was rendered in situations for which a Civil Service Certificate is ordinarily required.

- 2. Candidates will be required to satisfy the Civil Service Commissioners-
  - (a) That they are unmarried, or widows.
  - (b) That they are duly qualified in respect of health and character.
  - (c) That they are natural-born or naturalised British subjects.
- 3. At each Examination the number of candidates to be selected will be such as the Irish Insurance Commissioners may from time to time
- 4. The Examination will be in the following subjects, viz.:-
  - 1. English Composition (including Writing and Spelling). 2. Arithmetic. ...
    - 3. Geography.

- 4. Latin, or French, or German, or Irish.5. Précis Writing.
- 6. English History.
- 7. Mathematics.
- 8. One of the Languages, Latin, French, German, Irish, which is not offered as subject 4.

Not more than one of the subjects numbered 6 to 8 may be offered.

Candidates who fail to obtain such an aggregate number of marks as may indicate in the judgment of the Civil Service Commissioners a competent amount of general proficiency will not be regarded as qualified.

- 5. No candidate will be admitted to Examination who does not, at such time as may be fixed by the Civil Service Commissioners, produce an undertaking, signed by her parent or guardian, that she will, if successful, reside either with her parents or guardians, or with relations or friends approved by such parents or guardians.
- 6. Candidates must be at least five feet in height.
- 7. Persons holding situations in the Civil Service must obtain the permission of the authorities of their department to attend the Examination, dated before the commencement of the competition.
- 8. Persons who have entered upon or completed a course of education or training for the occupation of teacher, on account of which grants are payable from the Exchequer, will not be qualified to receive appointments until the consent of the Board of Education in England, the Committee of Council on Education for Scotland, or the Commissioners of National Education, Ireland, as the case may be, given in conformity with rules sanctioned by the Lords of the Treasury, has been notified to the Civil Service Commissioners.
- 9. Application for permission to attend an Examination must be made at such time and in such manner as may be fixed by the Civil Service Commissioners.
- 10. A fee of 15s. will be required from every candidate attending an Examination.

<sup>\*</sup> Section 8 of the Corn Returns Act, 1882, provides that where returns of purchases of British Corn are made to the Local Inspector of Corn Returns in any other measure than the imperial bushel or by weight or by a weighed measure, that Officer shall convert such returns into the imperial bushel, and in the case of weight or weighed measure the conversion is to be made at the rate of sixty imperial pounds for every bushel of wheat, fifty imperial pounds for every bushel of barley, and thirty-nine imperial pounds for every bushel of oats.
