This evening, about half past eight o'clock, departed this life, at Gloucester House, after a long illness, his Royal Highness William Henry Duke of Gloucester, to the great grief of their Majesties and all the Royal Family.

Orders for the Court's going into Mourning on Sunday the 1st of September next, for his late Royal Highness the Duke of Gloucester, his Majesty's Brother, viz.

The Ladies to wear black silk, plain muslin, or long lawn, crape, or love hoods, black silk shoes, black gloves, and black paper fans.

Undress, black or dark grey unwatered tabbies.

The gentlemen to wear black cloth, without buttons on the sleeves or pockets, plain muslin or long lawn cravats and weepers, black swords and buckles.

Undress, dark grey frocks.

The Earl Marshal's Order for a General Mourning for his late Royal Highness Wm. Henry Duke of Gloucester.

In pursuance of his Majesty's commands, these are to give public notice, that it is expected that, upon the present occasion of the death of his late Royal Highness William Henry Duke of Gloucester, all persons do put themselves into decent mourning; the said mourning to begin on Sunday next, the 1st day of September.
